Supreme Court Pumps Judicial Life Into State Reapportioning

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court pumped judicial life today into the issue of whether a state can adopt amendments to its own constitution giving rural voters greater proportionate voice in the state legislature than city voters.

It directed that the Michigan Supreme Court consider, in the light of the U.S. Supreme Court ruling March 26 in a Tennessee case, whether amendments Michigan adopted in 1962 are in violation of the federal Constitution. The Michigan Supreme Court had dismissed a complaint raising the issue.

Infante Stands Trial On Counts

NOGALES, Ariz. (AP) — The barrel-chested, self-proclaimed "provisional president" of Mexico, Marcantonio Diaz-Infante, was to stand trial today on two charges of defrauding an innkeeper.

Diaz-Infante, 39, a one-time Oregon resident, was freed on the charges after posting \$5,000 bond Saturday.

And, Saturday night, he staged a rather dull press conference in a hotel in the city of Nogales, about one mile from the Mexican border.

Before the conference, Diaz-Infante appeared before Nogales Justice of the Peace Gilbert C. Soto on charges of failing to pay his bills at two Nogales hotels. He said he'd settle the accounts.

Stanford Williams, one of the hotel managers, said his firm had been financially satisfied.

But Judge Soto ruled Diaz-Infante would stand trial on the charges.

During the conference, Diaz-Infante told a small audience, composed mostly of Americans, that there is at least one person in every government bureau in Mexico City on the Soviet embassy payroll. He then added that his "Zapata movement" is fighting communism in every respect.

The 5-6, 200-pound revolutionary said, however, that he has no immediate plans for calling a revolution.

He once was in the migrant labor department of the Oregon Bureau of Labor.

Both cases bear with variations on an issue of great controversy in numerous states: A contention that a minority of rural voters is able, through unfair apportionment of seats, to control the state legislature.

In Tennessee, there is a reapportionment act which complainants in the case contended had not been carried out.

In Michigan, the apportionment had been written by amendments into the state constitution.

In the only other action today of national implications, the high court refused to consider an appeal based on complaints against an alcohol tax agent's using a tape recorder to record a conversation by telephone with a suspected seller of bootleg whisky.

The case came from Atlanta, and the Circuit Court of Appeals had ruled there was no violation of the Federal Communications Act since the agent was simply recording something he could have testified about.

The Michigan constitution was amended in 1962 to set up state legislative districts involved in the protest.

The matter came before the U.S. Supreme Court in an appeal by August Scholle, who sued on behalf of himself and as president of the Michigan State AFL-CIO.

Scholle contended the amendments to the state constitution set up permanent districts which were grossly unequal in population.

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Senate Opens Curtain On Civil Rights Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — With House members still on Easter vacation, the Senate pulls the curtain open this week on what could become a full-blown Southern filibuster against an administration civil rights bill.

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana is committed to move early in the week to bring up a measure to abolish the literacy tests still used in some states as a qualification for voting in federal elections. Civil rights advocates contend such tests have been used to keep Negroes from voting.

Mansfield may use a parliamentary maneuver to bring before the Senate without debate a minor bill for which he then can move to substitute legislation which would establish a sixth-grade education as the sole literacy qualification for voting in federal elections.

The bill now is pending before a Senate judiciary subcommittee, which cancelled a meeting scheduled for Tuesday to consider acting on it.

Whether the Senate can act on the bill apparently will be determined by whether leaders can muster a two-thirds majority of those voting to cut off debate under the cloture rule. Mansfield has indicated he will wait at least 10 days before seeking such a limitation.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., a supporter of the administration bill, said this will provide an acid test of whether there is to be any major civil rights legislation in this session of Congress. The Senate never has invoked its debate limitation rule to force passage of a civil rights bill.

Javits predicted on a television program Sunday that "a very substantial number" of Republicans will vote to close off debate. Republican leaders hope to muster impressive strength to contrast their party's relative solidarity on civil rights with the split among Democrats on this politically potent issue.

But some Republicans — and some Democrats outside the South — traditionally oppose cloture. Their opposition makes the outcome highly doubtful.

Southern opponents can be expected to challenge the constitutionality of the administration's bill.

"The board members certainly admire the dedicated people who are willing to assume the responsibility for supplementary drives to compensate for agency financial deficits resulting from the CDUF's failure to meet its goal and supply the agencies' full needs for the past several years."

"However, we believe we have a responsibility to administer the CDUF constitution and bylaws as they were established to apply uniformly to all participating agencies and keep faith with the U.F. donors who make their pledges as an annual combined contribution to all participating agencies."

Three Lose Lives In Oregon Easter Weekend Traffic

Oregon's Easter weekend was marred by three deaths from traffic accidents, raising the state's fatality toll to 116 for the year in the Associated Press count.

The latest victim was John W. Reese, 19, who died Sunday in a Portland hospital from injuries received last week when a car in which he and five other youths hit a tree in west Portland. One of the others, Steven Robert Miller, 19, died in the crash.

Sgt. Everett Homer Riggenbach, 40, who was attached to the Air Force radar station at Condon, died in a head-on collision of his car with another automobile near Condon Saturday night. Mrs. Fred Davis, 35, riding in the other car, suffered serious injuries although she was reported somewhat improved Sunday after receiving blood transfusions at a Condon hospital.

Her husband, 35, and Mrs. J.A. Day, 32, who was a passenger in the Davis car, were injured but were released after treatment.

Joanna Hamilton, 18, Newport, was injured fatally and four other persons were hurt in another head-on collision on Highway 20 east of Newport Saturday night.

Carol Silinsky, 19, Newport, was reported in fair condition at a Newport hospital. She and Miss Hamilton were passengers in a car driven by Sharon Jacobson, 19, Newport, who was released after treatment.

The girls' car collided with one driven by Joseph Ziegler, Toledo, Ore., and occupied by Gloria Rickers, also of Toledo. They were injured and taken to a Toledo hospital.

The accidents increased the state's traffic death toll for April to 23.
