

Irish Unlimber 24 Hits To Take Two Saturday

Unlimbering their bats, the Riddle Irish belted 24 hits in two games to roll to a pair of Umpqua Valley League victories over the Sutherlin Bulldogs Saturday.

The Irish walloped the host Bulldogs 15-3 in the opener, then came back with a 13-5 win in the second game. The clean sweep of the twin bill kept the Irish in a deadlock with the Glendale Wildcats for the UVL lead. Riddle and Glide have identical 6-0 records.

In the seven-inning opener the Irish blew the game wide open with a six-run uprising in the top of the third frame. Until the third the Bulldogs had been sporting a 2-0 lead built up in the first inning.

Early Runs

Sutherlin started the scoring in the first when Ron Heaton walked and came around on three passed balls. Doug Philow was hit by the pitcher, stole second and scored on Mike Ouellette's single.

The Irish took over in the third to post the win. Gary Paetz was safe on an error, and was out trying to make third on Mike Markham's single. Mike Markham and Don Fisher were both safe on a fielder's choice, then Bill Markham singled in the first run. Tom Morrison's double put the Irish in the lead. Morrison scored on Lee Paetz's base blow, while Paetz continued around on a steal and a pair of passed balls.

Keith Hansen walked and scored on Larry Ruckel's outfield fly to put the Irish ahead 6-2. Riddle added four runs in the fifth and five in the seventh, while Sutherlin's third counter came in the fifth.

Five in First

Riddle started off the second game with five runs in the first inning. Gary Paetz was safe on an error. Singles by Fisher, Bill Markham and Hansen kept the rally alive. Lee Paetz was hit by the pitcher and Mike Markham drove in the last two runs of the frame with a double.

Sutherlin came back with two in the bottom of the first on Ouellette's single, then stayed within striking distance with three in the second. Johnny Waller drove in two in the second with a base blow and Pat Shorey singled to bring Waller home.

However, the Irish scored a single run in the top of the second, four in the fourth and three in the fifth.

Winning Pitchers

Ron Weakley was credited with the first win, while Morrison saved the second victory coming in to work on the mound in the second inning. Morrison allowed the Bulldogs just one hit in his three inning stint.

Mike Markham was the leading Riddle batter for the afternoon with five hits in eight appearances. Bill Markham was 3-3 in the second game, while Ruckel and Weakley each had two hits in the first game.

Duck Thinclads Point For NCAA Action After Breaking USC's Long Win Streak

EUGENE (AP) — The Oregon team, after ending college track's longest winning streak by beating Southern California 75-56 at Los Angeles Saturday, now will point for the NCAA championships at Eugene in June.

"I just hope we can be as ready for that one as we were for the meet with the Trojans," coach Bill Bowerman told shivering but cheering students and townspeople who stayed up until 1 a.m. Sunday to greet the Ducks at the airport.

Proud

"I can't tell you how proud I am of the way this squad performed in that meet," Bowerman said.

The Ducks will host to Washington State for a dual meet next Saturday.

Before the Saturday competition Southern Cal had been unbeaten in 104 dual meets since a loss to Cal Tech May 12, 1945.

Oregon runners dominated the track events, sweeping the half-mile, the mile and the two mile.

Pirate Nine Tops Viking Crew To Break Into UVL Win Column

Glendale's Pirates broke into the win column in Umpqua Valley League baseball action Saturday by winning a pair of counters from the host Myrtle Creek Vikings.

The Pirates swept the first game 12-2, then came back with three runs in the first inning of the nightcap to win a 3-0 decision.

Carl Burke led the Pirates at the plate with three hits in the first game, including two home runs. Burke collected two hits in the second outing. In addition to his hitting, Burke tossed a nifty one-hitter against the Vikings in the second game. Burke struck out seven and walked one as he engaged in a duel with Myrtle Creek's Bert Mason. Bob Allen won the opener on a three-hitter.

Break Ice

Myrtle Creek broke the ice in the opener with a single run in the bottom of the first inning, only to see the Pirates tie the game in the second. Glendale pushed across two runs to take the lead in the third. The Pirates added six insurance runs in the fifth and three more in the seventh.

Steve Newman doubled to right to start Myrtle Creek's opening rally. Newman came on around on a pair of Glendale errors. A single by Tony Quinn, a walk to Newman, a double steal and a passed ball gave the Vics their second run in the third.

Glendale fought back in the second as Hubert Stewart reached second on an error and scored on Chuck Tooley's single. Nick Derscheld's single in the third frame drove in two for the Pirates. Gary Tooley, Burke and Bob McDowell

were on base when Derscheld singled.

Turned On Power

Burke turned on the power in the fifth and seventh innings. The hard-hitting Pirate belted a three-run homer in the fifth and a two-run round tripper in the seventh.

The Pirates wasted little time in the second game. They capitalized on three hits and three Myrtle Creek errors to score three runs. Jim Redfield started the rally with a single. Redfield stole second and took third on Burke's base blow. Redfield scored when a pick-off play at first went astray.

Ace Bowden kept the Pirates going when he reached base on an error, and Allen followed with another of the same. Burke scored as Allen reached base. Derscheld singled to bring Bowden home.

Newman's first inning single was the only base hit for the Vics in the second game, and he was one of two baserunners.

Other top hitters for the afternoon included Chuck Tooley with 2-4 in the first game for Glendale and Myrtle Creek's Tony Quinn who collected two of his team's three hits in the opener.

Glendale now has a 2-4 league mark, while Myrtle Creek has a 4-4 UVL record.
