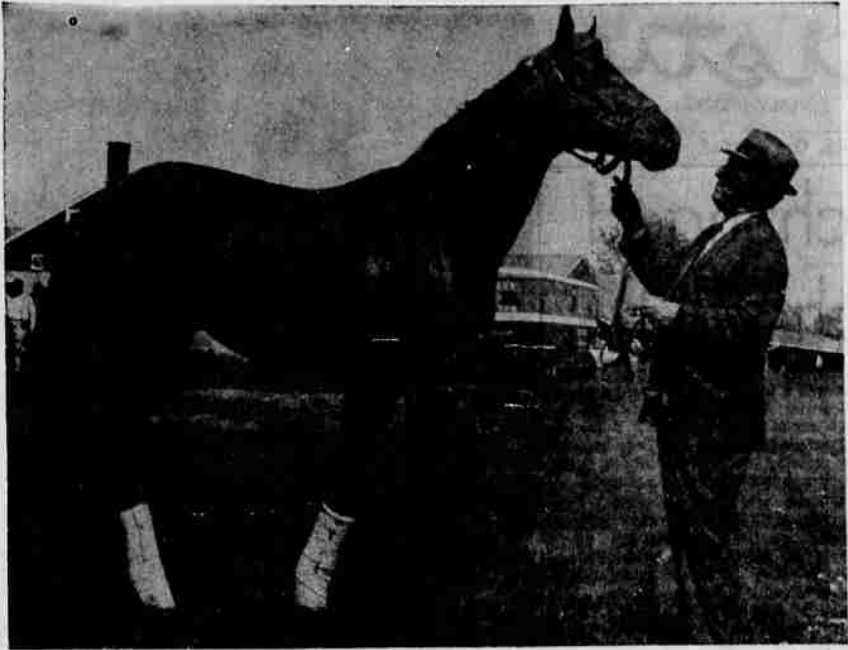

Final Standings
You must turn in an exact copy, or carbon copy of your final standings sheet, showing every man who has bowled 10 or more games in your league. Also include name and post office address of any new members who have joined your league since you sent in your list last fall. Failure to do this will work a hardship on these fellows, since they will have no official average to carry into next season, or to use in any tournaments they want to enter next season.

Also, it's a big help in getting your leagues started next fall if you hold that league meeting before you end your schedule. We suggest you make it ahead of your final match. If you wait to call the meeting after the match is finished, you won't have much of a representation.

SANDERS SET RECORDS
DUNEDIN, Fla. (AP) — Doug Sanders, who competed in more golf tournaments than any other player on the 1961 PGA tour, set another record as third leading money winner.
Playing in 40 PGA cosponsored and approved tournaments and winning five, Sanders took home \$37,428.47. He collected more in third place than any second place finisher in PGA history. Sanders and Gay Brewer were the only two players to win two straight tournaments.

OSU Squad Plans Trying For Record

Oregon State's undefeated baseball team, topping northern division play after the first week, meets Idaho here today and Thursday. Game time each day is 3 p.m.

Coach Ralph Coleman's proteges have now swept 17 straight victories in the 1962 campaign — just one short of the all-time school record of 18 set by the 1951 squad. Latest in the string was a twin-triumph over the University of Oregon last weekend by scores of 4-2 and 8-6.

Coleman undoubtedly will send veteran Cecil Ira to the mound today and come back with Jim Falk on Thursday.

Ira recorded a perfect 4-0 record against non-conference opposition, then stopped Oregon on three hits last Friday. None of the runs scored off him were earned. He also preserved the Saturday game for Falk by pitching the ninth inning against Oregon.

The Vandals split with the University of Washington in their opening conference series over the weekend. Tight defensive work and clutch hitting gave the Beavers their wins over Oregon.

Coleman probably will go along with the same lineup that functioned so well in the Oregon series. Dave Hayward will be behind the plate, with John Thomas on first, Dave Long on second, Doug Stahl at shortstop and Al Lehrer on third.

Oakland's Oakers exploded for five runs in the fifth inning to record a 6-3 victory over the invading Canyonville Tigers Tuesday in Bico-B League action.

The Oakland win moved the Oakers into a tie with the Tigers for second place in the current league standings. Both the Oakers and the Tigers sport 2-2 records.

Hits scattered
Eugene Anderson tossed the win for the Oakers, scattering eight hits among the Tigers in seven innings. Eugene Anderson walked one, hit one and struck out eight. Opposing pitcher was Brent Parsley. Parsley gave up six hits, walked four, hit one and struck out two.

Dorold Holcomb provided the Oakers with power at the plate. Holcomb was 2-3, including a three-run double in the fifth inning uprisings. Loren Powell had a perfect day at the plate for the Tigers with three hits in three appearances. Bud Olsen and Bill Croy each had two hits for Canyonville.

Oakland broke into the scoring column first with a single counter in the second inning. Bill Anderson walked and stole second. With two away Bill Anderson scored on Dave Roadman's single.

Canyonville took over in the third inning with a three-run rally. Powell was hit by the pitcher, Fred Grunt was safe on an outfield error, and John Ringen singled to load the bases with two out. Parsley doubled to drive in the three base runners and gave the Tigers a 3-1 lead.

In the fifth inning the Oakers came to life to score the winning runs. Bo Cannon led off the frame with a double and Larry Sorenson was hit by the pitcher. On an attempted sacrifice by Roadman the lead runner was cut down at third. Steve Peery worked his way for a free pass to load the bases.

Holcomb cleared the bases with a towering double, then scored when Lloyd Lewis followed with a triple. Eugene Anderson's outfield fly brought Lewis home with the final run of the game.

Friday's round of action in Bico-B action will find the Oakers winning a forfeit from the Camas Valley Hornets who do not have a field to play on. Canyonville is scheduled to host the leading Yoncalla Eagles to start the second half of league play.
