

County Will Be Well Represented At N. W. Regional Science Fair

When the Northwest Regional Science Fair opens May 5 at the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry in Portland, Douglas County will be well represented.

During oral judging of gold medal winners from last weekend's regional science fair at the Fairgrounds, 24 projects were given the nod for entrance in the Portland fair.

The oral judging was held in Joseph Lane Junior High School, Roseburg, Wednesday and Thursday night.

Roy Crain, co-chairman of the regional fair, said the quality of the projects and the oral answers was so high, Raymond E. Barrett, director of education of OMSI, had to give special permission for all 24 to be entered compiled by 38 youngsters.

Crain explained that only 12 were originally expected to be selected for eligibility for the Portland fair. A call to Barrett late Thursday brought the permission.

Pompidou Gets Confidence Vote

PARIS (AP)—The French National Assembly gave Premier Georges Pompidou a 259-128 vote of confidence today.

The vote clearly reflected criticism that deputies had expressed of President Charles de Gaulle's European unity plans and fears that the French constitution may be further changed to reduce the power of Parliament.

This was Pompidou's baptism of fire in the National Assembly. He formed his government only 10 days ago to replace the outgoing Cabinet of Michel Debre. Pompidou never has been a member of Parliament, and this was also interrupted as a rebuff for the legislature.

Only 387 of the 551 deputies cast valid ballots, and 119 abstained.

Twelve Buildings Destroyed By Fire

DEKALB, Mo. (AP)—Eight homes, a post office, a dance hall and a lumber yard were destroyed as flames wiped out a whole block in this town of 400 population near St. Joseph.

High winds drove the flames from building to building Thursday night while firemen toiled three hours to check the fire's advance.

Two persons suffered minor injuries. Only a few items were saved from the homes but all the mail was removed before the post office caught fire.

The flames started in a shed and quickly roared out of control.

Some Governors Up In Arms On Plans To Cut Guard Units

WASHINGTON (AP)—Some of the nation's governors are up in arms over an Army plan for cutting out 475 of the states' National Guard units.

A barrage of telephone calls, telegrams and statements hit the Pentagon after the Army's National Guard Bureau Wednesday sent out the plan to all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

One of the many objectors, Iowa's Gov. Norman Erbe, interpreted the action as an order and said he would not comply.

Strader Named To Head Walton's Campaign

Bill Strader of Glend has been named county chairman of the campaign of Dudley C. Walton, a Roseburg attorney, for election to the state House of Representatives.

Strader, who has been active in politics for several years, is president of the county Young Republicans, adviser to the Roseburg High School Junior Young Republicans and a member of the Republican Central Committee.

To assist him, Strader has named Leland K. Wimberly of Roseburg as organization vice chairman and Elton Jackson of Winchester as finance vice chairman.

Eugene Man Is Guilty On Drunk Driving Count

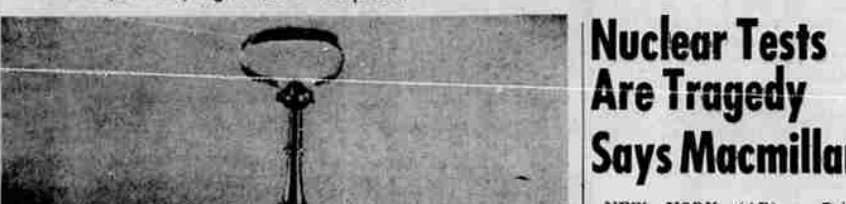

Nuclear Tests Are Tragedy Says Macmillan

NEW YORK (AP)—British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan urged the West "to be firm but patient; never to yield and never to give ground; but never to take provocative action ourselves."

He says he believes that if the free world follows this policy the Russians—in "maybe one, maybe two generations, maybe more"—will be ready for a better peace than one "preserved by mutual fear."

Calling President Kennedy's decision to resume nuclear tests in the atmosphere "a tragedy," he says "the world must realize the responsibility for the tragedy is not Kennedy's. It is Khrushchev's."

Macmillan says the test resumption is a tragic because "it means the nuclear arms race is again in full spate."

He says Britain and the United States "maintained a voluntary moratorium of three years, which was rudely broken by the Russians last autumn."

The British Conservative party leader discussed the present state of the world and looked into the future Thursday night in addressing 1,800 persons at the annual dinner of the Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers Association.

Newspaper executives and their guests joined in toasts to the health of President Kennedy and Queen Elizabeth II.

The dinner ended the city's annual press week events. Macmillan goes to Washington today for formal discussions with President Kennedy Saturday.

The prime minister was applauded warmly several times during his dinner speech—especially when he blamed Premier Khrushchev for this country's resumption of nuclear tests in the atmosphere. Macmillan was given a standing ovation at the end of his address.

Macmillan said the West should not abandon its efforts in any sphere "where we can find the possibility of some agreement between East and West to their mutual advantage and to that of the whole world."

International Satellite Launch Raises Hopes For Joint Venture

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The successful launchings of a U.S.-British satellite and an American-Japanese probe have given rise to hopes the United States and Russia will eventually combine their great resources for an all-out assault on space.

An American Thor-Delta rocket Thursday blasted a packet of British experiments into orbit as the world's first international satellite. Its purpose is to study the ionosphere and cosmic radiation.

Earlier, at Wallops Island, Va., a U.S. Nike-Cajon sounding rocket boosted instruments on a brief 75-mile-high trip to take readings in the upper atmosphere.

British Prime Minister Harold

Macmillan, speaking in New York Thursday night, named the satellite "Ariel"—high wind—and said: "This joint enterprise reflects great credit on the British and American scientists and technicians concerned. It provides a fine start to the United States program of international cooperation in space."

The launchings occurred during a day of crowded space activity. Other developments:

1. The U.S. Ranger 4 spacecraft crash-landed on the dark side of the moon after a 64-hour, 231,486-mile journey that started Monday at Cape Canaveral. Although Ranger 4 failed to carry out a number of scientific experiments because of a faulty electronic device, officials said it demonstrated the United States had the guidance capability to send a vehicle to the moon.

2. Space scientists disclosed plans to send a similar rocket toward Venus this summer. It's called Mariner and will be boosted by the same Agena B combination that aimed Ranger.

3. The Russians announced the launching of their fourth scientific satellite in six weeks. The Soviets said the vehicle, Cosmos 4, carried radiation-measuring and other scientific gear. There was some speculation the recent wave of Russian satellites have been sent up to gather data on America's series of nuclear tests in the Pacific.

4. Two secret satellites were launched by the Air Force at Point Arguello, Calif. One employed a Blue Scout booster, the other an Atlas-Agena B, which has been used primarily for Midas and Samos spy satellites. Sources at Cape Canaveral, where Blue Scouts also are launched, indicated the Blue Scout failed to place its payload in orbit. The Defense Department recently decided to withhold all information on military space launchings.

5. It was learned that at a session today of the International Association of Geodesy in Washington, some further details were to be made public on the proposed Anna satellite, which would involve use of a flashing light for visually observing earth satellites.

Blind Residents Guests Of Lions

Three blind Roseburg residents, Mrs. Samuel S. Skenzick, Elroy Jones and Harold Baxter, were guests of the Roseburg Lions Club Thursday night, in a program devoted to the work of Lions with the blind.

Edell Bryant, chairman of the club's sight conservation Foundation, Inc., set up to provide a coordinated effort that can take on projects referred to it that individual clubs could not finance.

The foundation will have a special meeting on May 19 in Salem, in connection with the state Lions convention there.

Bryant said the foundation has disbursed \$1,350 this year, and has a cash balance of \$4,733 for projects, which include support of the Devers Memorial Eye Clinic, eye bank, summer retreat for the blind and other projects.

During 1961 the Devers Clinic in Portland received 4,670 cases, many of which were Lions referrals. The foundation is assisting with the purchase of equipment for an eye bank, and more and more persons are pledging their eyes on death to the blind. A new project planned is recordings of books for use by the blind. Collection of old eye glasses not in use is now underway.

White Cane Week is May 1-7, and canes will be sold on the streets of Roseburg May 12. Mrs. Skenzick talked briefly on the appreciation of blind people for the effort in their behalf. There are 12 members of the blind association in Douglas County. She told of the benefits of the summer retreat conducted by the Lions on the upper McKenzie River each year. It has great therapeutic value, she said.

As a second program feature, George Luoma, spoke briefly on promotion of petition signatures for the proposed legislative apportionment constitutional amendment.

The Rev. Tillman Houser, missionary from Southern Rhodesia, Africa, will speak at the Calapooia Free Methodist Church tonight at 7:30.

The Rev. Mr. Houser is a former pastor of the Roseburg Free Methodist Church and the Calapooia church. He, with Mrs. Houser, will present the service which will include slides taken recently, together with other items of interest concerning Africa.
