

Big Track, Field Weekend On Deck

There will be sufficient action to satiate even the most avid track and field bug in the Far West this weekend, with the spotlight centering on the Mt. San Antonio Relays at Walnut, Calif., and the University of Oregon's great team on its spring green campus at Eugene.

Oregon, already hailed as the 1962 national collegiate champion off its easy victory over the 1961 titleholders, Southern California, engages Washington State.

Southern Cal launches the busy weekend in a dual meet Friday night with Stanford at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

The Mt. San Antonio attraction begins Friday night with high school athletes performing but the main show is Saturday afternoon.

California and the Santa Clara Valley Youth Village hold a non-scoring meet at Berkeley Saturday afternoon.

The 4-minute mile is in dire jeopardy at Eugene. Coach Bill Bowerman is turning his three top milers loose.

Dyrol Burleson, the leader, has already fractured 4 minutes three times and has a best time of 3:57.6. His teammates, Archie San Román, Jr., and Keith Forman, have come close to 4 minutes.

"Coach Jack Mooberry of Washington State has agreed to let us have an extra, non-counting, extra in the mile for this meet," Bowerman said.

NEW YORK (AP) — It is becoming increasingly evident that the embroiled Houston Colts have

corroded a better team than the floundering outfit representing New York in the National League.

The younger and more energetic Colts have been galloping at a leisurely pace, winning six and tying one of their 13 games.

Not so with the Mets. Eleven defeats in 12 games have revealed Casey Stengel's crew to be just what it is—not much of a team.

The Mets are a sadly conceived aggregation of tired castoffs who can't play any more, and unproven youngsters who can't play at all.

The pitching has been horrible, the fielding wretched and the hitting spotty, to say the least. Injuries to Gil Hodges, Hobie Landridge, Charlie Neal and Elio Chacon haven't helped.

Although insisting it is too early to become panicky, club president George Weiss is making adjustments.

The most notable of his new acquisitions appears to be Sammy Taylor, a 29-year-old left-handed hitting catcher, acquired from the Cubs Thursday in exchange for outfielder Bobby Gen Smith.

The Mets also acquired catcher Harry Chitt, purchased from Cleveland, and 34-year-old pitcher Dave Hillman, bought from the Cincinnati Reds.

To make room, veteran relief pitcher Clem Labine and catcher Joe Ginsberg were dropped.

Derby Favorites Race In Weekend Spotlight

A trio of 3-year-olds who figure big in pre-Kentucky Derby calculations and Carry Back, winner of America's glimmer race last year but still seeking his first major victory of 1962, headline the chief attractions on the national horse racing program Saturday.

Derby favorite Sir Gaylord, the California Derby winner Doc Jockey and Sir Ribot are scheduled to get their final prep for the May 5 running of the \$125,000-added Derby in a 7-furlong race worth a mere \$10,000. It'll be raced, along with the \$15,000 Oaks Prep for 3-year-old fillies, at Churchill Downs, where a week from Saturday upwards of 100,000 people will gather for the Derby.

of the \$75,000-added Grey Lag handicap at Aqueduct.

With Manuel Yeaza in the saddle as part of top weight of 125 pounds, Mrs. Katherine Price's hard-hitting colt will meet such old-time rivals as Leonard P. Sasso's Globemaster and George D. Widener's Yorktown.

A victory in the Grey Lag would put Carry Back within striking distance of the million dollar mark in money earnings.

Mrs. Maddy Jolley's Ridan, who figures to be Sir Gaylord's chief opposition in the Derby, came up with an eye-raising triumph in the \$33,200 Blue Grass Stakes at Keeneland Thursday.

With Yeaza aboard, Ridan tore off the 1 1/4 miles in 1:47 3/5 and the finished out the Derby distance of 1 1/4 miles in 2:01. The Blue Grass time was one-fifth second off the track record and the 1 1/4 mile-clocking compared with the Derby record of 2:01 2/5 set by Whirlaway in 1941. Ridan beat decisively by four lengths with Roman Line third, Crimson Satan, 1961 2-year-old champion, challenged in the stretch and finished fifth back of Black Beard.

Federal Judge Now Weighs AFL Suit

BALTIMORE (AP)—U.S. Dist. Judge Roszel C. Thomsen today started tackling the weighty problem of whether the National Football League was powerful enough—and intentionally tried—to kill off a rival.

The judge said it may take two months for him to wade through volumes of testimony, arguments and briefs on a \$10-million anti-trust suit by the American Football League against the NFL.

Oral arguments ended Thursday. They had been going on intermittently since Feb. 26.

The gist of the AFL claim was that the NFL expanded from 12 to 14 teams only as countermeasures to the new loop in 1960. The NFL granted a franchise to Dallas where the AFL was formed and at the same time announced it would acquire another in Minneapolis-St. Paul the next season.
