Workmen's Compensation Group Being Reactivated In Oregon

Reactivation of the industry-wide Committee for Competitive Workmen's Compensation has been announced by Jerry Butler, chairman of Stayton cannery executive.

The group, claiming board representation of Oregon business and industry, will seek reforms in the Oregon workmen's compensation system which Butler described as "an oddity among the states."

Butler said legislation proposed by the committee will guarantee protection of all Oregon workers regardless of occupation; simplify present appeals procedure to permit injured workers an inexpensive review of any complaints; inaugurate a debit-credit rating system in which the individual employer's costs will be related more closely to his safety record; and permit employers to satisfy their obligations to injured workmen through state, private or self insurance under a state-supervised workmen's compensation system.

Similar objectives were contained in the so-called "three way" bill sponsored by the same committee during the 1961 legislative session. The reform measure, one of the most controversial bills introduced last session, passed the senate narrowly but later died in the house labor and industries committee.

"Shortcomings of the Oregon workmen's compensation system still exist," Butler said. "Upwards of 250,000 workers presently are denied the protection of industrial accident coverage, and employers are required to deal with a single monopolistic state agency which acts as the trustee of funds, the administrator of the law, the maker of rates, the giver of benefits,

the judge and jury. The committee is pledged to correct these deficiencies."

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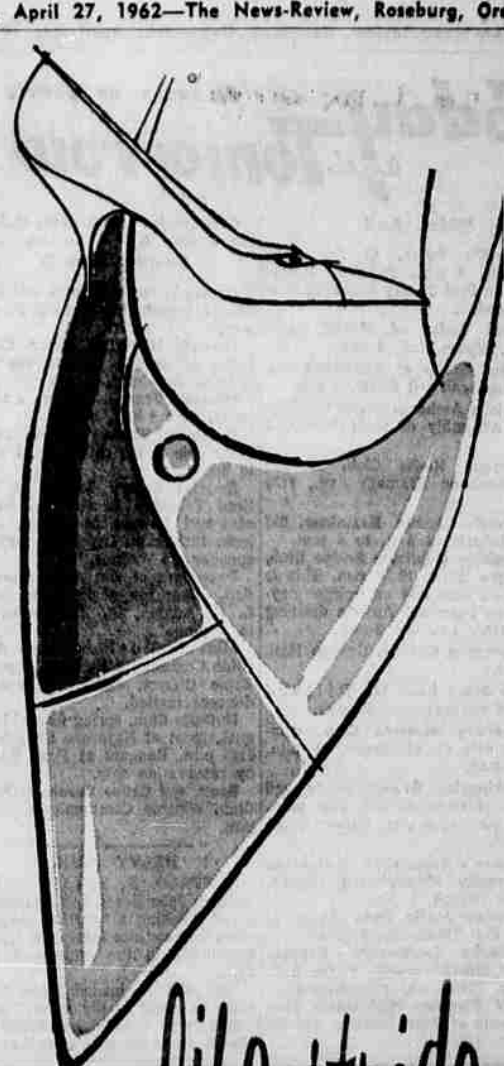
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
