

Daffy Day Sees Mets Win, Lose

Giants Sweep Two In Game With Chicago

It should have happened in Brooklyn. The Mets-Phillies game, that is, Dizzy as the Dodgers at their daffiest. The only thing lacking was Casey Stengel letting a sparrow out of his cap.

That was the fourth inning of the New York Mets' first game with Philadelphia Sunday. New York got seven runs on four hits, two hit batters, a wild throw, two errors, a stolen base, a sacrifice fly and some incredible Philadelphia play afield.

Winning String
It put the Mets off and winging to an 8-0 triumph that extended their winning string to two. The streak was halted in the nightcap when the Phillies bombed Casey's boys 10-2.

In a more sober affair at St. Louis, Sam Musial went 5-for-6 with two homers as St. Louis split with Cincinnati, the Cards taking the first 16-3, the Reds the second 4-3. In San Francisco, Jack Sanford and Billy Pierce had a three-hit shutout as the Giants swept two from Chicago, 7-0 and 6-0. In Los Angeles, Pittsburgh regained the top spot with a sweep against the Dodgers, 6-1 and 1-0. In Houston, Roman Mejias' ninth inning homer brought the Colts a 3-2 decision over Milwaukee.

American League
In the American League, New York beat Washington twice, 3-2 and 11-6. Minnesota took two from Cleveland, 8-4 and 7-3. Chicago won a couple from Boston, 2-1 and 5-1. Detroit out-slugged Los Angeles 13-6 and Baltimore stopped Kansas City 8-3.

The Mets' fourth inning was as weird as Frankenstein and complicated as a Russian novel. It featured, among other things, the Mets putting two runners on third at the same time. All hands were safe and a run scored when the Phillies catcher tagged the wrong man and another player eventually threw the ball away.

Frank Thomas was hit by a pitched ball twice and by a thrower ball once while running the bases—all in the same inning.

First Victory
When it was over, the Mets had seven runs and rookie Al Jackson, who spaced eight hits, had his first victory. Home runs by Tony Gonzalez, Don Demeter and Wes Covington featured the angered Phils 14-hit attack off four New York pitchers in the second game. Bobby Locke, who allowed only one hit over 4 2/3 innings, got the victory in relief.

Vada Pinson and Gordy Coleman of the Reds and Musial scored home runs in each game at St. Louis. Musial's big day boosted his average to .369. Ken Boyer drove in five runs and Curt Flood had four hits in support of Larry Jackson's six-hit pitching for the Cards in the opener. Eddie Kaso's ninth-inning home run pulled out the nightcap for the Reds and gave unbeaten Bob Purkey his fourth victory.

Indian Baseball, Track Teams To Host Strong Squads Tuesday

The spotlight will be divided between the Roseburg Indian baseball and track teams Tuesday, with both hosting top powers.

In Midwestern League baseball competition the Indians will meet the league leading South Eugene Axemen at 3:30 p.m. on Legion Field. South Eugene is sporting a perfect 5-0 league record, including an opening 5-1 win over the Indians. Roseburg rests in a fourth place tie with a 2-3 District 5-A-1 mark.

Hobbs Set
Coach Bill Harper will have Tom Hobbs, strong right-hander, on the hill for the Indians. Opposing Hobbs will be lefty Don McNeal. McNeal tossed a one-hitter against the Tribe in the first meeting. A scratch single in the seventh inning prevented the ace left-hander from getting a perfect game. Hobbs has been showing stronger with each game, and, if in top form he should give the Axemen some trouble.

Roseburg's spikers will host the team many in the state consider the toughest dual meet team in Oregon—the Grants Pass Cavemen. Meet time is set for 6 p.m. at Finlay Field.

The Indians and the Cavemen have run against each other in the Roseburg Jaycee Invitational and the Grants Pass Rotary Invitational earlier in the season. The Cavemen swept both meets with the overall team power that has made them feared throughout the state.

Top Competitors
Top competitors for the Indians are miler Mike Crumican and hurdler Ray Palm. The Cavemen have an outstanding javelin thrower in the form of Steve Ausland. Ausland has tossed the spear past the 200-foot mark twice this season.

Grants Pass has strong entrants in the sprints and the field events. Since the start of the season, the Cavemen have been one of the teams figured to be in the battle for the state A-1 title at Corvallis May 25 and 26.

Roseburg's tennis team was forced to call off its second match in two days Saturday because of rains that pelted Douglas County over the weekend.

The defending state champion Indians were unable to occupy the courts against the invading Marshfield Pirates Saturday. Saturday's match was to have been the last warmup action for the Indians before the district tournament.

The Indians will take a 13-2 dual match record into the district tournament on the University of Oregon courts May 5. Both Roseburg losses have been to collegiate teams—one each to the Oregon State Rooks and the Oregon Frosh.

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Medford Overpowers Host Indians

Ignoring the temperamental spring weather, the Medford Black Tornado invaded Finlay Field Saturday to overpower the host Roseburg Indians in dual track action.

Medford, led by triple winner Jim Hill, racked up 78 points, while the Indians were scoring 44 points.

Hill was rough on the Indians winning the 100 and 220-yard dashes and the broad jump. Hill soared 22-4 1/2 for the winning broad jump, ran the 100 in :10.2 and the 220 in 23 seconds flat. In addition, the Medford star anchored the winning 880 relay team.

Top Point Winner
Ray Palm was the top point winner for the Indians. Palm edged Medford's Scott Eaton in the 120 high hurdles, then doubled up by beating teammate Bob Hohl in the 180 low hurdles. Palm was timed at :15.1 in the high, while Eaton was clocked at :15.2. In the low hurdles, Palm's winning time was :20.9.

Mike Crumican added a win for the Indians in the mile. Jon Counts placed first in the discus and Barry Grant took the honors in the 440.

Medford swept the first three places in the 100, the broad jump and the javelin throw to dominate the meet. In addition to Hill's win, Eaton leaped 21.7 and Mike Grant jumped 20-10 in the broad jump.

Jaycee Meet
In the jaycee meet the Medford squad posted a 70-41 victory.

Roseburg's varsity and jaycee teams will see action Tuesday against the Grants Pass Cavemen. Meet time at Finlay Field Tuesday is 6 p.m.
