World Will Get Notice Of Test

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States will give the world's scientists about four days' notice before firing three missile-borne nuclear test devices over the Pacific in June or July.

The Pentagon said Monday advance word of the three blasts will be given so that geophysicists and other scientists can make measurements of interest to the scientific community.

Atmospheric effects of the high-altitude blasts could include auroral displays resembling the northern lights over the South Seas and interference with Pacific radio communications over a wide area.

Similar temporary effects followed a 1958 blast over Johnston Island. It produced a spectacular auroral display above Samoa, about 2,000 miles south of the test site, and interfered temporarily with high-frequency radio communications over an area extending 2,000 miles.

Distortion of the earth's magnetic field by atomic particles from the test explosion was blamed for the side effects.

The Pentagon spokesman said two of the high-altitude blasts in the Johnston Island area will be equivalent to fewer than a million tons of TNT.

He said one of these shots will be at an altitude measured in kilometers, the other at hundreds of kilometers. A kilometer is five-eighths of a mile.

The third shot will be in the megaton-yield range, and will be fired at hundreds of kilometers, the spokesman said.

Shipping and air traffic was banned from the Johnston Island test area Monday.

While the Pentagon announced some details of the planned high-altitude test shots, the United States told Japan the Pacific tests would end immediately if the Soviet Union changes its previous position and now concludes a test ban treaty.

Japan, which has protested resumption of nuclear tests in the atmosphere by the United States, charged the Johnston traffic ban is illegal. But the United States replied that use of the high seas and international air space for military exercises of all types is traditional and not unreasonable.

17 Cases Discovered
As a result 17 new cases were discovered during the year. This was a substantial increase over the 12 found the year before. One death from tuberculosis was reported in the county during the year.

Dedication Set For Ike Library

ABILENE, Kan. (AP)—Top political figures of the 1950s meet today to dedicate the new Eisenhower Presidential Library.

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, accompanied by Mrs. Eisenhower, arrived early today in a private railroad car. His three brothers and five Cabinet members from his administration also came to Abilene, Eisenhower's boyhood home.

After the ceremonies the Eisenhower railroad car was to be hooked to a special train going to Kansas City. From there, he and Mrs. Eisenhower will continue to their home at Gettysburg, Pa. They have been vacationing in California.

Former Cabinet members here included Herbert Brownell Jr. and William P. Rogers, attorney general; Neil McElroy, secretary of defense; Fred Seaton, interior, and Robert B. Anderson, Treasury. Mrs. Mabel McKay, widow of former Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay, also was here.

Eisenhower's brothers arrived Monday and toured the library. They are Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president of Johns Hopkins University; Edgar Eisenhower, Tacoma, Wash., attorney; and Earl Eisenhower, publisher from LaGrange, Ill.

The library is on a large tract including the old Eisenhower family home and the Eisenhower museum. The museum is operated by the private Eisenhower foundation.

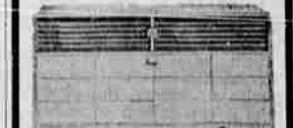

Twenty Louisiana Negroes En Route To Los Angeles

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—Some 20 Louisiana Negroes were en route to Los Angeles today, the first large group to take advantage of the segregationist Citizens Council's offer of free one-way transportation.

Their train, dubbed "Freedom Train West" by New Orleans Council director George L. Singelmann, was scheduled to arrive in Los Angeles at 5:15 p.m. Wednesday.

Another group of Negroes is en route by bus to New York. It is scheduled to arrive at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday.

The group heading for Los Angeles includes Peola Denham's family of 12 from Baton Rouge, La. The children range from 17 years to nine months.

"I don't have any promise of work but I expect things to be better in Los Angeles," Denham said.

Asked why he chose Los Angeles, Denham replied: "It's a lot warmer in California and I've got lots of kids."

Four others said they hoped to find jobs in Los Angeles. They identified themselves as Robert Therrio, 24; Washington Holley Jr., 19; Chauncy White, 22; and Fred Spamer, 22.

Singelmann saw the group off after depositing a check for \$612 with ticket seller John Keretz. Singelmann gave each Negro \$5 for expenses but gave Denham \$100—"because he has such a big family."

There was some confusion as to how many Negroes actually went on the bus to New York. Singelmann said there were 12.
