While Allen was handling the pitching chores, the Pirates topped across three runs in the push of the fourth inning to take the lead for good.

The Pirates moved out in front 1-0 in the first inning, only to see the Bulldogs score twice in the third. Sutherlin moved to within one run of the leading Pirates with a single counter in the sixth, but the invaders clinched the win with two insurance runs in the seventh.

Allen struck out 11 Bulldogs and walked three while limiting the home team to two singles. In addition to pitching the win, Allen was one of the top Glendale hitters with two base blows in four times at bat. Catcher Hubert Stewart was also 2-4 at the plate for the winners, while Nick Derseid's double was the only extra base rap of the game.

Oregon State coach Sam Bell is less well fortified, but he is expected to enter at least one standout, Dale Story, in the mile and two-mile.

Bowerman has warned his ace sprinter, Harry Jerome, that Oregon State's Lynn Eves can give him real competition in the 220.

## Powerhouse Works Again

Slump-ridden Willie Mays has kicked the habit and reformed the National League's No. 1 power combine with Orlando Cepeda for the streaking San Francisco Giants, back on top of the league standings after their sixth consecutive victory.

Both Mays and Cepeda continued their slugging Monday, each tagging a homer to support the four-hit pitching of rookie Gaylord Perry as the Giants knocked off Pittsburgh 4-1 and topped the Pirates from first place.

Over that span Mays and Cepeda have reactivated the potent 1-2 punch that gave the Giants 86 homers and 265 runs batted in during the 1961 campaign. Mays now has seven homers, tops in the majors, plus 16 RBI, while Cepeda has hit six homers and knocked in 21 runs.

Mays was hitting a woeful .203 until he began to unlimber the big bat that accounted for 40 homers and 123 RBI last year. A 6-for-19 performance, including three homers in the last four games, has pulled him up to .250.

Cepeda, NL slugging king last season with 46 homers and 142 RBI, stepped up the pace when Mays started to connect and has hit at a .444 clip over the last six games, boosting his mark up to .338. He's third in the league in runs batted in.

While the Giants were extending their streak, Philadelphia snapped one, beating Milwaukee's Warren Spahn 6-4 for their first victory over the veteran lefthander since May 23, 1959. In the only other games scheduled, Stan Williams' five-hitter gave the Los Angeles Dodgers a 3-1 triumph over Chicago's Cubs.

The American League had a day off.

Mays got the Giants started with a bases-empty homer in the first inning off Vinegar Bend Mizel (1-1). But the Pirates came back to tie it in the second when Don Hoak singled, stole second and came across on Bill Mazouzi's single. San Francisco went back out front in the third when Tom Haller walked, took second on Perry's sacrifice and scored on Mickey Mota's single. Cepeda's two-run homer, after Mays had walked in the fourth, put it out of reach.

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
