Physically-Fit Boys Get Better Grades

EUGENE (AP)—Boys who attain a high level of physical fitness also tend to earn above-average grades, preliminary findings of a study of the Medford school system indicate.

H. Harrison Clarke, research professor of health and physical education at the University of Oregon, said Medford was chosen for a long-range study because the school system begins an athletic program at the fifth-grade level.

"We have too long been treating the body as if it were merely a vehicle for getting the mind to school and back," he said. "...there are strong indications that a person's learning potential for a given level of intelligence is increased or decreased in accordance with his level of physical fitness."

Clarke said an original group of 560 boys between the ages of 7 and 15 were first tested in 1956. About 300 boys will be tested yearly, he said, until the original 7-year-olds have completed high school.

He said the test results indicate that "the Medford subjects were an exceptional group from the standpoint of muscular strength and muscular endurance...physically superior to normal populations."

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Supreme Court will mark Law Day, May 1, with special ceremonies in its chambers.

The entire court will assemble with Chief Justice William McAllister presiding.

After remarks by McAllister, Justice George Rossman will present Freedom Foundation awards to area winners.

Dr. Arthur S. Flemming, University of Oregon president, will give the address.

Rossman has been a member of the Freedom Foundation board of directors since its organization 14 years ago.

He will give a check and medal to Margaret McCall, Portland, and medals to Everett G. Gressley, Monmouth; Art Bimrose, Oregonian cartoonist, Portland; and Marcella Mae Comstock, Portland.

Distinguished service awards will go to Englewood and Richmond schools, Salem; medals to Grants Pass High School, and Keizer, Leslie Junior High and Waldo Junior High School of Salem; and certificates to Elton Cross, Portland; Bush, Garfield and Oregon Blind schools, all Salem.

Commencement Set For June 3 At Oregon State

Commencement at Oregon State University has been changed to a one-day Sunday program this year, instead of the two days of the past, with more than 1800 degrees scheduled to be conferred June 3.

In years past, OSU has had baccalaureate service on Sunday morning and graduation exercises on Monday.

This year, the baccalaureate service will be dropped and the graduation exercises moved to enable more parents, relatives and friends to attend.

The 93rd annual commencement will be held in the 10,000-seat coliseum beginning at 1 p.m. PST. President James H. Jensen announced.

The number of bachelor's degrees to be conferred is second only to the record number of 1949-50, big graduation year for World War II veterans.
