

## No Conclusion Reached In Diaz-Infante Probe

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark Hatfield said Tuesday an investigation of the hiring of Marcantonio Diaz-Infante by the state Labor Bureau failed to produce a conclusion.

The investigation was demanded by state Sen. Carl Francis, R-Dayton, and the Oregon Farm Bureau after it was learned that Infante had a past criminal record.

Infante came to the attention of Oregonians when he recently proclaimed himself provisional president of Mexico. He now is in a Los Angeles jail.

Loren Hicks, Hatfield's legal advisor, checked into the hiring of Infante by the bureau four years ago.

"Mr. Hicks has completed an investigation of the circumstances under which Mr. Infante was employed by the state of Oregon," Hatfield said. "A conclusion is impossible."

"The Civil Service Commission director serving at the time of his employment, which was prior to my taking office, let the state service several years ago."

"Those staff members who are now there report Mr. Infante first was introduced to them by the Bureau of Labor, but Mr. Nilsen (Labor Commissioner Norman Nilsen) indicates the contrary was the case."

"The integrity of neither is questioned, but they do give conflicting reports."

Hatfield said a laxity did exist in the checking into the background of Infante although his qualifications appeared to be in order.

It is now known, Hatfield said, that Infante did falsify his biographical information.

### Applications To Close For Dillard Postmaster

Dillard Postmaster C. C. Fosback reported today that applications for the Civil Service examination for clerk position at the Dillard Post Office will close May 12. He said applications postmarked after midnight that night will not be accepted.

Applicants must be U. S. citizens, at least 18 years old and must reside in the delivery district of the Dillard office. Appointments of postal positions will be made from a register of eligibles established by results of the examination. Both men and women may apply.

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## Forest Service Proposes Mines Claims Limit

Associated Press Special Service WASHINGTON (AP)—The Forest Service proposed Tuesday a limitation on a proposal that occupants of invalid mining claims be allowed to buy federal land from the government.

Arthur W. Greeley, assistant chief of the Forest Service, told the House public lands subcommittee that in general the Forest Service is opposed to private ownership of land within the boundaries of national forests.

He said, however, the service would have no objection to a bill introduced by Rep. Harold T. Johnson, D-Calif., if it is amended to give discretionary authority to the secretary of agriculture.

Under that authority, he said, areas probably would be designated within which applications for purchase would be considered.

Then, he said, would include areas in which private ownership would not interfere with forest management; in which concentrations of mining claim occupants constitute community centers; where mining activity has been historically important; and where it was reasonable at the time of claim location to expect an economic return from mining sufficient to justify building a permanent home.

He estimated there are possibly 10,000 unpatented mining claims upon which homes or other structures have been erected in the national forests.

## Released Army Sergeants Got Good Treatment

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) —Two American Army sergeants released by Communist guerrillas said the Reds kept them bound during their 22 days of captivity but fed them regularly on rice. They said they suffered no brutality.

Sgt. Francis Quinn of Niagara Falls, N.Y., and George E. Groom of St. Joseph, Mo., freed in what appeared to be a May Day gesture, looked weary from their ordeal but in good shape otherwise as they arrived in Saigon by plane Tuesday night.

Denying reports they had been led through villages as propaganda exhibits, they told interrogating officers they were held the entire 22 days atop a mountain near where they were captured April 8.

Still wearing the camouflage uniforms and berets of the Army Special Forces, they were released less than five miles from the spot outside the coastal town of Da Nang where they were ambushed with two other American soldiers and 31 Vietnamese trainees.

The other Americans, Sgt. Wayne E. Marchand of Plattsburgh, Neb., and Spec. 5 James Gabriel of Honolulu, were wounded and their bodies later found two miles from the ambush scene.

Quinn and Groom said they had carried their wounded comrades for more than a mile until the Viet Cong guerrillas ordered them put down. They said they did not witness the final moments of the two, who apparently were murdered because they were slowing the Viet Cong escape.

The sergeants said the Communists gave no reason for freeing them. After their release, it took 2½ hours to make their way down the mountainside, led by a mountaineer who worked for the guerrillas.

Communist North Viet Nam Radio Hanoi said today that Quinn and Groom were released on the order of Nguyen Huu Tho, president of the "South Viet Nam National Liberation Front."

"After being given a clear account of the aim of the South Vietnamese people's struggle," the Red broadcast said, "these two Americans requested the front to pardon and release them."

## Literacy Test Debate Continues In Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—Marathon debate on the administration's literacy test bill swung into its eighth day today with Senate leaders pressing for showdown votes next week.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said he was making no advance claims that he could muster enough votes to clamp a filibuster-ending time limit on the debate being waged by Southern senators fighting the measure.

The bill seeks to prevent racial discrimination in voting in federal elections by prohibiting the states from barring the ballot on literacy grounds to any otherwise qualified citizen who has completed a sixth-grade education.

A two-thirds majority of sena-

tors voting is needed to invoke cloture—the Senate term for a debate limit. Mansfield and Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois announced to the Senate Tuesday that they would file a cloture petition Monday on a timetable which would bring it to a vote next Wednesday.

Southern senators are fighting the bill as an unwarranted and unconstitutional invasion of states' rights. Its backers contend it is needed to protect Negroes and other minorities from discriminatory, sometimes impossible tests, of their literacy.

Mansfield said he is firm in his decision against proposals that he try to wear down opposition to the bill by holding the Senate in endless session until those opposed to the measure quit talking.

"I don't believe in the use of force," Mansfield told a reporter, "and it wouldn't change any votes anyway, in my opinion."

Five Southern Democrats—John Stennis of Mississippi, Strom Thurmond and Olin D. Johnston of South Carolina, Russell B. Long of Louisiana and George A. Smathers of Florida—took turns Tuesday speaking against the bill. For the most part, backers of the measure have let Southerners carry the burden of debate.

### No Injuries Occur In Auto Accident

Heavy damage resulted to an automobile but there were no reported injuries in an accident on U. S. Route 99 at Elkhead Junction 30 miles north of Roseburg Tuesday about 4:30 p.m.

State police report the car, operated by Eilert Christian Nelson, 81, of Troutdale, was traveling south on the highway on a divided four-lane section and was passing a large freight truck. As the highway narrowed into a two-lane section at this point, the car hit the fiddle bars that divide the north and southbound lanes. Nelson lost control of the car.

The car skidded a distance of 275 feet, crossing the northbound lanes and went into the ditch on the east side of the highway, the police report stated. The car came to rest in the ditch on its right side and also smashed the top against the hillside. The car received heavy damage to its top. It was removed by McDonald's Towing, Rice Hill, Yoncalla.

With Nelson in the car was his wife, Mary Lyndell Nelson, 74.

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
