

Primary Vote Shows Rural Folk Still Pack A Wallop

WASHINGTON (AP) — Politicians had new evidence today that the country folks still have a potent voice in states where voting reapportionment is an issue.

But this was about the only trend discernible in Tuesday's gubernatorial primary elections in Alabama and Oklahoma.

Former Gov. Raymond Gary of Oklahoma, who openly opposed a reapportionment plan to give urban voters of that state a bigger voice, drew heavy support in the rural areas to lead a 12-man field in the Democratic primary.

Good Harvest

And in Alabama, former Circuit Judge George C. Wallace, an ardent segregationist, harvested a substantial share of his votes in rural areas to lead in the Democratic primary.

Both men meet the runners-up in runoff elections later this month, and it is uncertain where the urban votes, spread over sev-

eral candidates Tuesday, will go.

Another former governor trying to return to public life, James E. Folsom of Alabama, was losing his battle with State Sen. Ryan deGraffenried for the runoff spot opposite Wallace. Folsom, who ran behind in the cities, appeared unable to make up enough ground on deGraffenried as results from rural ballot boxes trickled in.

Meets Atkinson

Gary, who gained national attention by supporting the unsuccessful bid of then Gov. W. Averell Harriman of New York for the 1956 Democratic presidential nomination, will meet W. P. Bill Atkinson, millionaire homebuilder, in the May 22 runoff.

The winner will take on Republican Henry Bellmon in November. A Republican has never been elected governor of Oklahoma.

The fate of a third former governor and two incumbents who hope to stretch their tenure in office to lengths unprecedented in their states will be determined later this month.

In Arkansas, former Gov. Sid S. McMath got into a May 29 primary race that Gov. Orval Faubus hopes will bring him a record fifth term in the statehouse.

They Also Run

McMath, tabbed a liberal, indicated he will attack Faubus' actions in the Little Rock school integration controversy. Rep. Dale Alford, a militant segregationist, also is in the race.

Gov. Price Daniel tests in a Saturday primary the sentiment of the voters on his attempt to become Texas' first four-term chief executive. His principal opponent seems to be John Connally, former secretary of the Navy.

There will be a runoff June 2 if none of the several candidates gets a majority. Entries include

Edwin A. Walker, the former Army general who was admonished for his troop indoctrination program.

Although Sen. John G. Tower proved there is plenty of conservative strength when he was elected in 1961 as the first Republican senator from Texas since reconstruction days, Walker is not expected to cut any figure in the race.

Mrs. J. A. Colbrunn To Head Committee

Mrs. Arch Colbrunn of Roseburg was named today to head a "Women for Walton Committee" for the county.

She will work in support of Dudley C. Walton, a Roseburg attorney seeking the Republican nomination for state representative. He is unopposed in the primary.

The announcement was made today by campaign Chairman Bill Strader. He also reported that Lauren Loveland had been appointed service group coordinator and Estel Shike as labor union coordinator.

Walton will make a campaign appearance at the Farm Bureau "meet your candidate" meeting tonight and will be featured speaker May 10 at a Reedsport Rotary Club meeting.

Cost Of Welfare Climbs In State

SALEM (AP) — The costs of public welfare in Oregon have climbed — particularly in the medical care section — over the past 10 years, but not as fast as the costs of government in general.

The legislative fiscal office released revised figures Wednesday showing that welfare's share of the total 1961-63 budget was 10.12 per cent of the total.

Welfare's share of the total state budget in the 1953-55 biennium was 11.9 per cent.

The overall budget has climbed, too. It was \$103,386,652 when the legislature okayed it for 1961-63. This is 60.1 per cent more than in 1953-55.

Oregon's gross income also climbed — from \$2.748 billion to \$4.005 billion, or 45 per cent, U.S. Commerce Department figures showed.

New Gym Plans Talked At Glide

A special meeting of the Glide School Board was called this week, reports Mrs. Arthur Selby, correspondent.

Purpose of the session was to meet with architect John Briscoe of Eugene and discuss with him the progress in the design of the new elementary building at Glide.

In other business, the board accepted resignations of Jerry Lemert, junior high school science instructor, and Gene Rosaschi, journalism and world geography instructor at Glide High School for the past five years.

Marion Danielson was hired to teach in the elementary school. Mrs. Danielson was graduated from Western Washington College of Education at Bellingham, Wash., N.D. Mr. and Mrs. Danielson and their three children will arrive in Glide in June, said Mrs. Selby.

Also hired to teach in the elementary school was Charles Jacquot, currently a teacher in the Roseburg school system.

MEDFORD (AP) — Injuries suffered in an accident April 19 caused the death Wednesday of Eldon Knight, 58, Mariposa, Calif. The crash also claimed the life of Mrs. Harold Fortier, 33, Panorama City, Calif.

The pickup truck in which the two victims and Mrs. Fortier's husband were riding skidded on wet pavement, then rolled end over end down the Pacific Freeway eight miles north of Grants Pass, police said.

County Medical Society Makes Dry Run On Administering Sabin Polio Vaccine

The Douglas County Medical Society and cooperating agencies in the Sabin Oral Sunday operation made a dry run at a meeting at Roseburg High School Wednesday night.

Dr. Louis Michalek, general chairman of the committee, said plans were made to use about 12 Jay-C-Ettes, 20 members of the Mercy and Douglas Community hospital auxiliaries, 30 members of the Umpqua District Nurses' Association, 12 pharmacists and eight to 12 Junior Chamber of Commerce members.

Duties Outlined

Their duties were outlined at the meeting and methods of administering the Sabin oral vaccine were worked out. Michalek said the groups are mobilizing to handle as many as 66 per minute through the Roseburg clinic. Other such clinics

are scheduled at Tri-City, Winston and Sutherlin.

A doctor will also be on hand to act as a supervisor and to answer questions at each of the clinics. The sponsoring Medical Society is planning to handle total numbers up to 4,000 in Winston, 3,500 in Sutherlin, 4,000 at Tri-City and 16,000 at Roseburg, Michalek said.

Lane County Set

On the same weekend (both Saturday and Sunday) Lane County is conducting its clinics to combat polio. It is preparing 120,000 doses for administration.

Michalek also emphasized that although the clinics will open at 11 a.m. Sunday, the Medical Society is encouraging people to attend church first. He said churches have indicated cooperation in the project. The clinics will remain in operation until 6 p.m.

Angler's Cafe Receives Award

The Angler's Cafe on SE Jackson St., Roseburg, Wednesday was awarded the second certificate from the Health Department signifying that all of its employees have food handler certificates from the department.

Dr. John Donnelly, health officer, said the Bide-A-Wee Cafe, Sutherlin, was the first to receive such a certificate.

The restaurant certificate is a part of the county's Food Service Health Card program.

Restaurants, Donnelly said, may receive such a certificate by sending a list of its employees to the Health Department. The department then checks the list against the names of those with food handler certificates. All recipients of the food handler certificates have been tested for tuberculosis.

Guilty Plea Made By Accused Trio

Three young people Wednesday pleaded guilty to charges involving forgery of worthless checks on appearance before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

Carl Gene Liles, 20, of Eufaula, Okla., pleaded guilty to forgery, and his bail was set at \$3,000 pending a pre-sentence investigation.

Wife Pleads Guilty

His wife, Janis LaDonna Liles, 19, pleaded guilty to uttering a forged instrument, and bail was set at \$1,500 pending pre-sentence investigation, and Barbara Ellen Helt, 20, Lebanon, pleaded guilty to possession of a forged instrument with intent to pass same. Sentencing was deferred until Friday.

Each waived Grand Jury action and went before the judge on the district attorney's information on the respective charges growing out of the passing of a forged check passed at Montgomery Ward & Co. store April 27. The check, made out to Barbara E. Turner, was signed Charles A. Horne.

Attempts were made to pass checks at at least two other places in Roseburg, according to investigating city police.

The three told the judge in court they were on their way from Oklahoma to Lebanon and had run out of money. The four children of the Liles have been turned over to the welfare department pending disposition of the case.

Attorney Requested

Lawrence Emery Roberts, 23, of Tacoma, Wash., brought here to face a Drain Justice Court warrant charging burglary not in a dwelling, asked to see an attorney when arraigned before Judge Woodrich. Dudley Walton was \$5 pointed by the court. He had been bound over to the Grand Jury from the court of Warren DeLaVergne in connection with the burglary of a combination service station and store north of Drain.

Handicapped Committee Considers Job Survey

The Douglas County Employ the Handicapped Committee is considering the possibilities of making a survey of possible positions available for handicapped persons in the county.

The matter was introduced at the last meeting of the committee. No final decision was reached on the proposed project, but it will be given consideration at future meetings.

Also discussed was the possibility of getting support for introduction of clauses in union contracts providing special consideration for handicapped persons. Members of the committee will contact union business agents on the subject.

In other business, a citation for outstanding service for the Roseburg Veterans Administration Hospital was discussed. It was decided to endorse the recommendation and submit the citation to the governor's committee for further action.

The next meeting of the committee will be held May 25 at noon in the Umpqua Hotel.

Kennedy Names Robert Duncan

President Kennedy reported today he had appointed Robert Duncan of Medford, speaker of the state House of Representatives, to the Advisory Commission on Inter-Governmental Relations.

He is the lone member of the commission from Oregon and one of three state legislators in the U.S. appointed to it. The remainder of the commission is made up of cabinet secretaries Dillon, Goldert and Ribicoff, several governors, Mayors, U. S. senators and representatives. It was created by act of Congress to give continuing study to relationships among the federal and various state and local governments.

Problems typical of those selected for study by the commission are structure and improvement of real property taxes, coordination of state and federal taxes and state constitutional and statutory restrictions on local governments.

Duncan is scheduled to leave tonight for a flight to Washington. After the two-day conference, he will return to Douglas County to continue his campaign for the Democratic nomination for Congress. He was in Roseburg and Myrtle Creek Wednesday and will be back for an IWA meeting Sunday.
