Oakers Top Yoncalla Nine To Take Non-League Victory

The Oakland Oakers built up a six-run lead, then nipped a Yoncalla rally in the final frame to win a 6-3 non-league decision over the invading Eagles.

Oakland opened the scoring in the third inning with a single run. Lloyd Lewis singled and Eugene Anderson doubled to bring Lewis around. In the fourth the Oakers scored again as John Themis circled the bases after drawing a walk.

Oakers Exploded

In the fifth the Oakers exploded for four runs to clinch the victory. Singles by John Stroop, Bill Anderson, Bo Cannon, Themis and Steve Peery sparked the rally.

Yoncalla dented the plate in the top of the sixth with three runs. Jim Byron reached base on an error before three walks forced in the first run. Red Wiley and Dennis Boan singled to keep the rally alive. Peery returned to the mound for the Oakers to stop the Eagle uprising.

Peery was credited with the victory. Peery worked the first six innings for the Oakers, then gave way to Lewis in the sixth. However, the Eagles came to life against Lewis and Peery was brought back from the outfield to end the game with a strikeout.

Glide Jayvees Trip Irish Reserves, 5-3

Scoring five runs in the final two frames, the Glide Jayvees posted a 5-3 victory over the host Riddle Jayvees Wednesday.

Riddle opened the scoring in the third inning when Jack Gent walked, stole second and scored on Merle Blankenship's double. However, Glide rallied for three in the top of the fourth. Tri-City, Eugene Post NWL Victories

The Tri-City Braves, who finished last season in the Northwest League cellar, increased their league lead to a full game Wednesday night with a 7-4 win over the Wenatchee Chiefs.

Eugene's Emeralds dumped Yakima 3-1 and the win-loss combination put Eugene in second place and dropped the Chiefs into a tie with Lewiston for third. Lewiston earned the tie with a 5-4 victory over Salem in a game that went 10 innings.

Tri-City had a four-run third inning that gave the Braves a 5-0 lead. Successive doubles by Neil Martin and Bob Rudd and Gary Johnson's two-run triple were the big hits of the inning. Paul Povich and Bill Cowan each had a two-run homer to give Wenatchee a four-run fifth inning but reliever Joe Puleo put out the fire and held the Chiefs to only two hits the rest of the way.

Eugene clinched the win in the seventh inning when Yakima pitchers suffered control trouble. Four walks, a single and a sacrifice fly brought in two Emerald tallies. Yakima's lone run came in the eighth when Steve Ryder walked and came home on a sacrifice fly.

Salem lost a catcher as well as the ballgame when Gene Conaway broke his leg sliding home in the first inning. The Dodgers scored three runs before the accident to take the lead. But Lewiston pecked away with single tallies and finally tied the count in the eighth. In the top of the 10th reliever Jerry Athey singled and Norm Graham tripled to bring Lewiston victory.

Snead Ready To Protect Champ Title

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Sam Snead, veteran of innumerable golf wars, set out today in quest of his second straight victory in the Tournament of Champions and a major share of its \$58,000 purse.

The almost 50-year-old West Virginian was slated to tee off with capable Jay Hebert in the first two-hole of the initial round over the 7,000-yard par 36-38-72 Desert Inn Country Club course. The 72-hole tournament ends Sunday, with the winner collecting \$11,000.

Just behind Snead and Hebert were Mike Souhak, the 1959 winner here, and the man most everyone thinks will win this one, Arnold Palmer. Twenty-four other professionals, each having qualified to compete here by having won at least one major PGA event in the past year, will follow.

Palmer has yet to win this event. In six tries his best effort was a fifth place finish in 1960.

Pick Your Sizes, Derby Horses On Parade

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Kentucky Derby winners, like beautiful women, come in all shapes and sizes. And it doesn't figure to be any different Saturday when a hand-picked field of 3-year-old horses break from Churchill Downs' barrier in the 88 running of the \$125,000-added turf classic.

If you like your horses tall and rangy with plenty of muscle in the hind quarters and with a broad chest, then your choice for America's No. 1 glamor race should be either Mrs. Moody Jolley's Riden or Fred Turner Jr.'s Sir Ribot.

Biggest Horses

At 16 hands, two inches, they are the biggest horses in the prospective field of 18 entries and 17 starters, each weighs close to 1,100 pounds. They are built to go the Derby distance of 1 1/4 miles.

Horsemen measure a hand as

4 inches, working from the base of the foot to the top of the right shoulder.

C. T. Chenery's Sir Gaylord, the 8.5 favorite, stands around 16 hands but is not as heavy as either Riden, the 5-2 second choice, or the well liked Sir Ribot.

If you prefer a horse slightly smaller but with all the personality of a young lady capable of matching her ability against the best of the males, then look no farther than Cicada, stablemate of Sir Gaylord. She stands 15 3/4

hands. The only drawback is that she probably will not be in the starting field.

One Condition

Trainer Casey Hayes said she will be a Derby starter only if something happens to Sir Gaylord. Smallest horses in the field, outside of Cicada, probably are Verne Winchell Jr.'s Donut King and Crismom Satan, the 1961 two-year-old champ from Peter Salmen's Crismom King Farm.

As the trainers paraded into the racing secretary's office this morn-

ing bearing entry fees of \$250, but he was a chunky—more the bull dog type.

Roscoe Goose recalled the shapes and sizes of past Derby winners. Goose who has seen Derbies as a rider or trainer since 1907 and rode Donair to victory in 1913 for the highest derby win price in history—\$184.90 for \$2.

"Twenty Grand (1931) probably was the biggest Derby winner," said Goose.

"Black Gold (1924) should be considered the smallest although Clyde Van Dusen (1929) didn't have much in the way of height in 1929.

With 18 entries, and 17 starters at an additional cost of \$1,250, the Derby will have a gross value of \$164,650 with the winner picking up \$122,150. Only one winner ever banked more, \$123,450 by Needles in 1955.

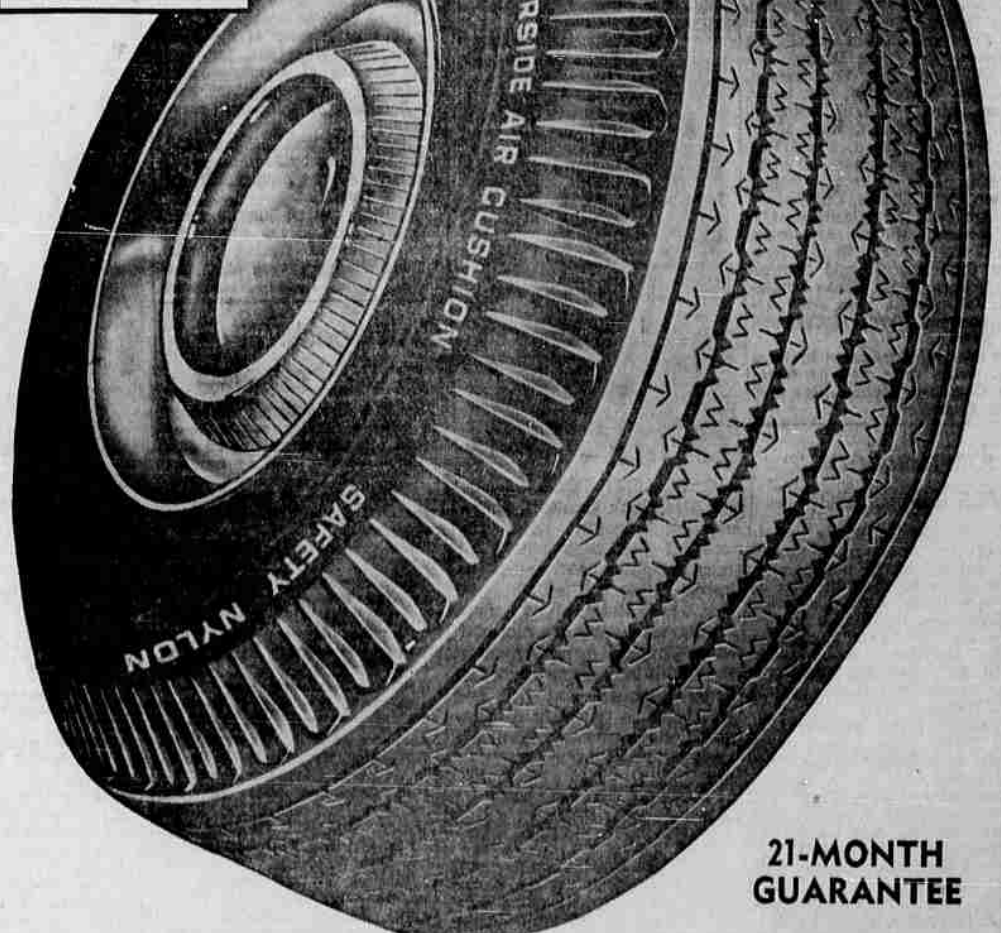
