Provision Would Let State Staff, Teachers Serve

SALEM (AP)—State employees as well as school teachers would be eligible to serve in the legislature under a provision adopted 4-1 Friday by the legislative subcommittee of the Constitutional Revision Commission.

The provision would bar only elected or appointed officers of the state from eligibility.

Circuit Judge Herbert Schwab, Portland, made the motion after declaring: "There is no such thing as a person without any special interest. You just have to rely on personal integrity."

He said the provision would allow all but the policy making officials in the executive and judicial branches of government to be eligible for the legislature.

The dissenting vote was cast by former Gov. Robert Holmes. Holmes could see no conflict between the executive and legislative branches of government in allowing a school teacher hired by a locally elected board to serve. He said, however, there is a clear conflict when an employee of a state agency is allowed to serve.

The subcommittee voted 3-2 to allow the governor to limit the subjects that can be considered at any special session of the legislature when he calls it.

Djaelani, 40, is married and has three children. He and his wife have adopted four children of his sister, whose husband was killed in Indonesia's fight for independence in 1949. Djaelani taught mathematics and physics in high school before going to work for the government. He is employed in an administrative capacity in the head office of the department.

Both of the visitors have been greatly impressed by the amount of money spent here on vocational education. They especially like Oregon's educational system wherein both academic and vocational training are offered at the high school level. In Indonesia, students entering high school take their choice of training much as they do here on the college level. On entering the seventh grade, all students are required to take English.

Miss Soenari and Djaelani will leave for home in August. They have attended two terms at Colorado State University and will attend the summer session there. During the spring quarter they have visited vocational technical education centers in New Mexico,

Arizona and California and are now spending two weeks in Oregon.

Alex Kennedy, director of the Adult and Vocational Education program for Roseburg Public Schools, showed the visitors the local facilities.

The Indonesian visitors have been accompanied on their tour by Elmer Halstead, director of Public Service Education of the Oregon State Division of Vocational and Post High School Education.

Both Kennedy and Halstead said they enjoyed showing the visitors around in Roseburg. The two men admitted that they, in turn, learned much about Indonesia during the tour.

Miss Sastrosemito and Djaelani like American food, they said. They didn't especially care for their first sight of snow in Colorado, however.

Board Claims Mine Union Tinged Red

WASHINGTON (AP)—A government board says the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers is Communist-infiltrated and therefore cannot represent employees under the National Labor Relations Act. Union officials denied the finding and said they would file an immediate appeal.

The decision was announced Friday by the Subversive Activities Control Board. In a 97-page report, it backed the findings of board member Francis Cherry, who sat as an examiner, that the union was heavily laced with Communists or Communist sympathizers.

"The aid and support flowing to the Communist party from respondent (union) and its controlling leadership has been real, substantial and significant," the report said. "Through respondent, the Communist party has acquired and continues to have a dependable foothold in the labor movement in the United States."

In Denver, headquarters of the union, President John Clark said the board's decision "has no basis in fact. The evidence on which the board relies comes almost entirely from one man, a man who was fired by mine-mill and has since been proven to be an Army deserter and an unreliable witness."

Clark didn't identify the man. The Mine Mill and Smelter Workers Union is independent, having been expelled from the old CIO in 1950. It claimed 100,000 members in 200 locals in 1959, but its membership reportedly has declined to about 60,000. It represents workers in the copper, lead and zinc mining and refining industries.

Auto Used By Attacker Described By Witness

LAKE OSWEGO, Ore. (AP)—Police said Friday the car driven by a youth who attacked four children in Lake Oswego Wednesday was a 1949 gray Chevrolet two-door sedan.

This description was given by a witness who was in the parking lot of a doctor's office in Lake Oswego when the assailant drove up with one of his victims.

Two of the children were still reported in poor condition Friday. All were beaten about the head with a metal instrument resembling a tire iron, police said.

Influenza Incidence Takes Drop In County

Incidence of influenza in Douglas County took a big drop in the week ending April 21, the Oregon State Board of Health has announced.

A total of seven cases was reported in the period according to the board's communicable disease report. In the previous week, the county had a total of 23 such cases. In the state the number dropped from 327 cases to 293.

The report notes that the number of pneumonia cases in the county dropped from 12 to 2 while incidence of measles lessened from 17 cases to 13.

However, the state reported one case of tuberculosis in the county for the last week reported bringing the county total to nine. Two cases of infectious hepatitis were also noted bringing the county total to 13 for the year.

State Leaders Ask Aid For Lumbermen

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—A resolution calling on Congress to help Pacific Northwest lumbermen regain Atlantic coast markets lost to foreign producers carried the endorsement of the Western Governors' Conference Saturday.

Gov. Rosellini of Washington said the action "demonstrated our unity."

Earlier, as chairman of the session's economic panel, Rosellini told his colleagues: "Understanding as our state administrations might be and how actively they seek help, the solution is one which must be brought about at the federal level. It is a problem requiring specific congressional action."

The Pacific Northwest lumber industry situation was described by Robert E. Rose, director of Washington's Department of Commerce and Economic Development, and H. Dewayne Kreeger, economic consultant representing the West Coast Lumbermen's Association.

The area's lumber industry has seen sales to Atlantic coast markets shrink 50 per cent the past 10 years because of inroads by Canadian producers, Rosellini said.

Kreeger said a quota arrangement was being actively sought with Canadian producers. He said it appeared to be the only way "we can help one segment of the nation's lumber industry, the Western softwood producers, without harming another segment, the Southern pine producers."

But, he added, such a solution, if it could be obtained, would not conform with the national free trade program outlined by President Kennedy.

The conference ended with election of Gov. Paul Fannin of Arizona as chairman for 1962-63 and Gov. Edmund G. Brown of California as vice chairman.

The lumber and other resolutions were adopted on a tentative basis, pending approval of all 15 participating governors. Only five were here. The others will be polled by mail.

One other resolution urged that the Army National Guard strength be maintained at top strength, no less than 400,000 men, and the Air National Guard at not less than 72,000 men.

Doctors Pressing Move To Refuse Medicare Patients

POINT PLEASANT, N.J. (AP)—Leaders of a movement to get doctors to refuse to treat patients participating in the proposed federal medical care plan for the aged pressed for more signatures today.

More than 200 New Jersey doctors have signed such a declaration. They evoked an outburst of criticism and an announcement that a bill would be introduced in the New Jersey legislature on Monday making it a crime for a doctor to refuse to treat any patient.

The doctors' resolution, refusing to accept provisions of a measure now before Congress that would tie medical care for the aged to Social Security, has been circulated in at least five New Jersey hospitals.

Doctors at Fitkin Memorial Hospital in Neptune were the latest to join the signers. Dr. John Clark, an Asbury Park surgeon, said doctors were favoring it 2-1. The New Jersey AFL-CIO said Assemblyman John J. Kijewski, D-Hudson, would introduce a bill in the legislature Monday that would subject a doctor to a \$100 fine and a three-month jail term or both for rejecting a patient "solely because of the prospective or intended method of payment."

The state board of medical examiners would be empowered to revoke the license of any doctor found guilty of refusing treatment.

Physicians at Point Pleasant Hospital, Orange Memorial Hospital, Newark's Beth Israel Hospital and Toms River Community Memorial Hospital also signed the resolution.

Vincent S. Murphy, president of the New Jersey AFL-CIO, urged the state medical society to disavow the resolution. Murphy called it a boycott against humanity.

An official of the Golden Ring Council of Senior Citizens, told 80 delegates from 216 clubs in New York and New Jersey Friday that the action by the doctors was a desperate move and would "cause elderly patients to be discriminated against."

Oops Defendant, Not Plaintiff, Won Verdict
A news report on the outcome of the Lida B. Park vs. Mark's Inc. trial in circuit court this week appearing in Friday's News-Review should have stated the jury returned its verdict for the defendant, not the plaintiff.

A directed verdict for the defendant had been allowed by Judge Charles S. Woodrich, but on motion that the case be submitted to the jury, this was also allowed. The jury denied the plaintiff damages and ruled for the defendant. The plaintiff had asked \$55,120 general and \$3,690 special damages for injuries in a fall when she slipped on a green onion tip in the Mark's Inc. market on W. Harvard Ave.

Voters Will Decide Monday On Two District Four Posts

Two posts, both for five-year terms, will be vacant on the Roseburg School Board. Voters will decide May 7 who will fill the vacancies.

Incumbents seeking re-election are Joe Dent, 537 W. Harrison St., and Robert Kischel, 1575 NW Beaumont.

New candidates are Mrs. Earl T. Cone Jr., 2026 NW Kline St., and Ralph DeMoisy of Winchester.

Mrs. Cone feels that women should have a voice on the School Board. She says she cannot understand how such a body can function competently without a woman's viewpoint, since mothers are with the children more than any one else and have a clearer insight into the problems of schooling. Mrs. Cone says she will be looking for economy in the schools, but not "at the risk of jeopardizing the education of our children."

The Cones have four children. Mrs. Cone is a member of the First Christian Church, League of Women Voters, Beta Sigma Phi and the Daughters of the American Revolution. She is on the executive boards of Joseph Lane Junior High School and Huerfano Grade School.

DeMoisy is in favor of the continuation of businesslike efficiency in school management. He believes the school needs help, but only under the control of the local School Board policy and when managed by local school administrators.

DeMoisy is married and has four children attending four separate schools in the district. The family has resided in Winchester since the summer of 1957. DeMoisy, a member of the Oregon Board of Engineering Examiners, is a past president of the Roseburg Area Chamber of Commerce.

He has served as an assistant professor of forestry and logging engineering at Oregon State University and has engaged in managerial positions in the forest industry for the past 13 years.

Joe Dent has served a one-year term on the board. He would like to see greater architectural efficiency in the building and planning of future schools. He believes the taxpayers' dollars should be spent with care, with proper regard to economy.

Dent is married and has two daughters, one in grade school, the other in junior high school. He has been a resident of Roseburg since 1945, spending the entire period up to the present in the realty business. He is currently a partner in Roseburg Realty.

PORTLAND (AP)—Unions representing more than 20,000 workers in Western pulp and paper plants are in negotiations at Portland for a new contract.

Involved are two unions—the United Papermakers and Paperworkers and the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers.

Representing the employers at 40 mills in Washington, Oregon, California and Idaho is the Pacific Coast Association of Pulp and Paper Manufacturers.

Primary In Texas Will Test Popularity Of JFK Camp

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Texans hoist smoke signals today on the Kennedy's administration's popularity in a slam-bang primary geared to produce two June 2 runoff finalists for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Although everybody concerned was busy denying it, there seemed little doubt that if 1.5-million voters put John Connally into a second round contest with Gov. Price Daniel, President Kennedy and Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson will have won a victory.

What will happen in the runoff is regarded as being in the lap of the gods. But because Daniel is seeking an unprecedented fourth term, and because of obviously heavy financial and organization backing, Connally would be the favorite.

Connally, a 45-year-old Fort Worth attorney, served as manager for Johnson's unsuccessful bid for the 1960 Democratic presidential nomination. He left office as Kennedy's secretary of the Navy to seek the Texas governorship.

Weather ranging from clear to partly cloudy was forecast for today's balloting. Polls, opening from 6 to 8 a.m., will close at 7 p.m.

Five of the eight candidates for governor—including two Republicans contesting in only the sixth primary their party has staged in the state's history—wound up their campaigns on television Friday night.

Former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker, who quit the Army after he was reprimanded for his right-wing troop indoctrination campaign, departed from his unbending role as a champion of the anti-Communist campaign of the conservative John Birch Society.

Stationed before a revolving door at a downtown Dallas hotel, Walker accosted everybody who came in sight. He announced to one and all that he was Gen. Walker and was running for governor.

State Atty. Gen. Will Wilson fired a new blast at Kennedy's Department of Agriculture for what he said was favored treatment of Billie Sol Estes, Texas financier under a fraud indictment.

Don Yarborough, 36-year-old Houston attorney and the youngest man in the race, beat the drums for a liberal viewpoint. He found all of his opponents for the Democratic nomination so conservative as to be crusty.

Marshall Formby, who has led the attack on Connally as the
