Palmer Strikes Gold In Las Vegas 'Desert'

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Arnold Palmer still owns the patent on dramatic winning finishes along the golf tournament trail.

The popular helter from Latrobe, Pa., pointed toward the Colonial National Invitation at Fort Worth, Tex., next weekend after hauling in the \$11,000 winner's purse in the \$50,000 Tournament of Champions.

Palmer Suddenness

Palmer, 3-time Masters and former National Open King, did it with rounds of 69-70-69-68-276. The knockout punch came with Palmer suddenness on the final hole Sunday. He holed a 24-foot putt for a birdie three that broke a dead-heat duel with his close friend, Billy Casper Jr.

Casper, playing out of Apple Valley, Calif., got his par and matching 68 but he had to settle for a 72-hole score of 277 and \$5,800.

Casper had a 35-35 for the near 36-36-72 Desert Inn Country Club course. He batted six birdies and after the 11th hole of the final round was actually in front by two strokes.

Vikings Score Decisive Win Over Trojans

Ross Barkhurst and Bob Lucas recorded five wins Saturday in leading the Myrtle Creek Vikings to a decisive 79-44 dual meet track victory over the invading Douglas Trojans.

Barkhurst paced the field in the 100 with a :10.35 clocking, won the 220 with a :23.6 and threw the discus 135-5 for a first. Lucas won the 880 in 2:09.5 and high jumped 5-8 for the Viks.

Dan Dodd was the top winner for the Trojans emerging victorious in the high and low hurdles. Dodd won the highs in :15.5 and the lows in a creditable :20.85.

Clearing the pole vault bar at 11-6½ Malcolm Yates and Jim Byrd tied for top honors while setting a new school record for the Vikings.

The Vikings won nine first places and the Trojans picked up five wins. In the jayvee action Douglas managed only one first place. The Myrtle Creek squad posted a 100-22 win.
