

LBJ To Push Button Wednesday To Start Snake Dam Power Flow

PASCO, Wash. (AP) — The touch of a button by Vice President Lyndon Johnson starts power flowing Wednesday from the \$130 million Ice Harbor Dam, first in a chain of Snake River development.

Civilian and military officials headed a crowd of visitors from three Northwest states who assembled at the dam site nine miles east of here in advance of the noon dedication ceremonies.

The dam's three generators will produce 270,000 kilowatts initially for the Northwest Power Pool, and twice that amount when more facilities are added in the future.

It is expected to put out more than \$11 million worth of power

annually, and provide substantial benefits in a three-state area in navigation, irrigation and recreation.

Ice Harbor, a federal project, which took six years to build, is the first of four dams planned between the mouth of the Snake and Lewiston, Idaho. Work already has started on the next one, Lower Monumental.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., says the dedication of Ice Harbor "will stimulate Snake River development as Bonneville Dam construction skyrocketed Columbia River development in the 1930s."

Ice Harbor, about eight miles from where the Snake empties into the Columbia River, extends slack water navigation 35 miles beyond. The reservoir, named Lake Sacajawea for the Indian woman who guided explorers Lewis and Clark to the Northwest, covers a burial ground for which the government had to pay the Indians.

On the south shore are ladders for migratory fish. On the north is the 103-foot high navigation lock, called the highest single lift lock in the world. (The lock at John Day Dam on the Columbia

will be higher when finished).

Ice Harbor got its name from a small alcove or harbor, just above site of the present dam. Early day rivermen used it as a shelter.

The area near the dam once was the scene of much Indian activity and Indians set up a five-dwelling village for public inspection during Wednesday's ceremonies.

Miss Brenda Bearchum, Miss Indian America of 1961, came from McNary, Ore., to give Vice President Johnson a blanket.

Unemployment Drops In April

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unemployment dropped by 430,000 in April and went below the four-million figure for the first time this year, Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg announced today.

Although the improvement was normal for the season, Goldberg said the decline—and a simultaneous rise in employment to an April record—was an encouraging sign of continued business expansion.

The unemployment rate, remained at 5.5 per cent of the civilian labor force, the same as in March as against the 6.9 per cent of a year earlier.

The rate is based on seasonal adjustments, and remained unchanged this month because the drop was expected.

The number of long-term unemployed—those out of work 15 weeks or longer—was unchanged at 1.5 million, Goldberg said.

He told a news conference: "The country can do better and will do better."

With the drop in unemployment, the total counted as jobless in April was 3,952,000.

The number of employed increased by 711,000 over the month to an April all-time high of 67,027,000.

The latter figure was 1,293,000 greater than the number holding jobs a year earlier.

Woman Bystander Shot In New Lisbon Rioting

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — A woman bystander was shot dead and 10 persons were injured Tuesday night in the second bloody antigovernment outburst in Lisbon in a week. Police arrested 100 persons and charged that snipers had fired on them from rooftops.

Heavy security guards patrolled downtown Lisbon today, but the city was quiet. No trouble was reported elsewhere in Portugal.

Witnesses said the demonstrators called out by the underground Communist party used new tactics Tuesday night. Instead of massing, they mingled with home-ward bound shoppers and workers, shouting and hurling stones at police.

Police fought back with clubs and fired rifles.

A judicial statement said police fired in the air to warn the demonstrators. Police also said they fired at rooftops after being fired upon by hidden snipers. No police casualties were reported.

Eugene Man Heads Police Association GRANTS PASS (AP)—L. Oakley V. Glenn of Eugene was elected president of the Oregon Association of City Police Officers Tuesday as the organization's three-day annual conference ended.

Cottage Grove was chosen as the site of the 1963 conference. The date was not set.

Other officers elected included assistant chief Jim Goodman, Corvallis, first vice president; Capt. John E. Smith, Grants Pass, second vice president, and L. Robert Mason, Salem, re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Resolutions were passed backing a proposed law to permit arrests on "reasonable grounds for belief" that a driver was in violation in accident cases. The same would apply to circumstantial evidence in drunken driving cases. Now the officer must see the violation or have a complaint from an eye witness.

Another resolution endorsed legislation which would establish the posted speed as a maximum speed, with the basic speed law to apply below the established maximum. The resolution noted that prosecution of "basic rule" cases is sometimes difficult under the present law.

A third resolution favored establishing minimum standards for seat belts and brake fluids.

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Signals, Film May Give Reason For Failure Of Centaur Rocket

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) —Radio signals and telescopic camera films were analyzed today by technicians seeking the cause of the in-flight explosion of the first Centaur high-energy space rocket.

The study was watched closely by Project Mercury officials for any clue which might force a delay of the orbital space flight of

astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter, scheduled for May 17.

The 105-foot Centaur blew apart 30,000 feet above the Atlantic Ocean 55 seconds after it was fired on its maiden flight Tuesday.

The spectacular failure dealt a severe blow to U.S. plans to descending heavyweights payloads into earth orbit and to the moon, Mars and Venus.

Mercury officials were concerned lest the trouble be traced to the Centaur's Atlas first stage. There were indications that the Atlas was at fault.

A similar Atlas missile is on a launching pad here being prepared to lift Carpenter into space on a three-orbit mission similar to that made by Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr. on Feb. 20.

The Atlas is a complex vehicle with more than 300,000 moving parts. If the Centaur failure is traced to the Atlas system, then that part of Carpenter's booster would be checked thoroughly before a green light would be given to his space ride. Analysis of the data may take two or three days.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration had hopes for a successful first flight of the Centaur to help reduce nearly a year of frustrating delays in launching the rocket. The main problem stems from developing high-energy liquid hydrogen as a propellant for the second stage.

Controlling this tricky, supercold fuel, which must be kept at a temperature of 423 degrees below zero to remain liquid, is the key to Centaur's extra muscle.

SEC Asks Added Time For Probe Into Securities

By FRANK CORMIER WASHINGTON (AP) — The Securities and Exchange Commission asked Congress today for more time and money to complete its investigation of the securities industry.

Rep. Peter F. Mack Jr., D-Ill., said he was introducing, at the agency's request, a bill that would give the commission an extra \$200,000 for its inquiry and extend by three months the deadline for a final report.

Congress last year authorized \$750,000 for the investigation, which it wanted completed by Jan. 3, 1963.

The inquiry moved from behind closed doors this week as the SEC began public hearings on the training, fitness and sales practices of mutual fund salesmen and brokerage employees.

Mack called it "the broadest and most penetrating investigation of securities markets since the early 1930s." In a speech prepared for delivery to the House, he said the SEC should be allowed to complete its work "in order to maintain full investor confidence."

"I have every reason to believe," Mack said, "that the commission is conducting its study and investigation in a very serious, diligent and responsible manner."

The public hearings so far have dealt with the operations of mutual funds. Favorites with small investors, these firms are corporations which buy stock of other companies, assigning proportionate interests in their portfolios to those who buy fund shares.

Investigators heard testimony Tuesday about what was called a universal fund practice of throwing "reciprocal business" shares to the public.

Fire Destroys Two-Story Barn The Roseburg Fire Department answered a call to 345 W. Military Ave. at 11:57 p.m. Tuesday when an old two-story barn caught fire.

The blaze was well under way, and the walls and roof about ready to cave in by the time firemen arrived on the scene. The building was practically destroyed. It was owned by Ora Welker.

The barn was not believed to have been in use, and the principal loss was the salvage value, according to Fire Chief LeRoy Seibold. Cause was not determined.

Seibold said response of off-duty and volunteer firemen was very gratifying. He said 24 men, in addition to firemen on duty, turned out. They kept the fire confined.

Shortly after coming to Bay City in 1908 from Ohio, Hogue shared in the building of Reed College and helped build the footbridge across Multnomah Falls.

Death occurred about 40 days before a planned 50th wedding anniversary celebration.

Surviving are Hogue's wife, Esther of Roseburg and a daughter, Emma L. of Portland.

M. C. Extends Time For Paying Of Assessments

The Myrtle Creek City Council Tuesday night decided to extend the time limit for paying of assessments for the Water Improvement District No. 5, recently completed.

The reason given is that some of the property has changed hands and some of the rightful owners have not been contacted. Notices are to be published and further effort made to locate the property owners to give them adequate time to make arrangements to pay the costs.

The city water superintendent reported nine new service connections have been made in the district.

On request from the Green Valley Lumber Co., the city decided to provide city water to the company, if it would agree to pay one-half the cost of installing a four-inch main from the corner of North Myrtle and Madrone streets, the approximate one-half mile distance.

John Westwang's inquiry about locating a trailer court at the corner of Division Street and North Myrtle Highway was referred to the building committee to investigate.

The city engineer reported cost of installing a storm drain and replacing a two-inch water main with a four-inch main on Rice St. would be \$2,200. The council voted to advertise for bids.

The council will meet May 15 for preparation of the proposed new city budget.

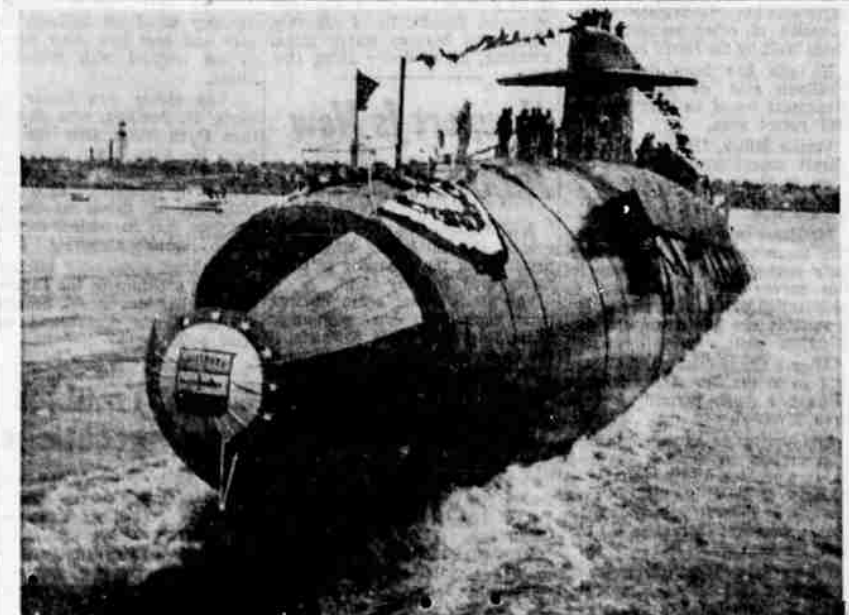
Burnett was driving a car that smashed into a steel pole on the Clay Street ramp off Harbor Drive in downtown Portland.
