

Vice President Calls For More Development At Dam Dedication

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PASCO, Wash. (AP) — The \$130 million Ice Harbor Dam on the Snake River was dedicated by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson Wednesday and the executive used the occasion to call for further river development — without touching on the federal versus private power controversy.

Johnson, who was met by a large delegation of officials of Washington, Oregon and Idaho, told his audience:

Warrant Issued For Youth, 20

LAKE OSWEGO, Ore. (AP) — Police issued a warrant Wednesday night for the arrest of a 20-year-old Lake Oswego youth in connection with the beating May 2 of four children in woods in the southern part of the city.

Russell Thorn, Lake Oswego police chief, said the warrant was issued for Hugh Dan Hanna, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh M. Hanna of Lake Oswego.

Thorn said Hanna was identified from a photograph by one of the beaten victims, Kathy Burke, 13.

He said young Hanna has been missing since Thursday, May 3. The warrant charged him with assault with a dangerous weapon, Thorn said.

Thorn said the Burke girl's identification of the suspect was corroborated by another witness. Hanna was described by Thorn as a boy who has never been in trouble. He said the youth was a student at Clark College in Vancouver, Wash.

Besides, the Burke girl, three other children, members of the same family, were brutally beaten by a weapon described as similar to a tire iron.

The other victims were Marsha Foley, 12, and her brother and sister, Shawn, 3, and Catherine, 21 months. They are still recovering in Portland's St. Vincent Hospital from their injuries.

Marsha was described as still in poor condition Wednesday. The younger children were reported improving and in fair condition.

After the beatings, the attacker took Marsha Foley to a Lake Oswego doctor's office, told the receptionist he would be back, then disappeared.

Thorn said Hanna was believed to be driving a 1949 Chevrolet two door sedan, dark blue-gray in color, with Oregon license plate 32-7230.

The dam is the first of four federal dams on the Lower Snake planned for power, navigation, irrigation and recreation use. The project will provide slack water navigation to Lewiston, Idaho.

Washington Gov. Albert Rosellini, who also spoke at the dedication, urged more power development because "We face in the not too distant future a severe electrical brownout in the region."

Rosellini said some might think Ice Harbor Dam, which can produce 270,000 kilowatts of electricity, "should meet our needs."

"This is not the case," he said. "Power demands are increasing at the rate nearly equal to the output of one Bonneville Dam a year."

"Area rehabilitation, zoning, tourist attractions and development of the county's harbor and coastal recreation area have long needed attention from the County Court level," said the candidate.

Edwards said he feels the coastal area is underdeveloped. John Robertson, Democratic candidate for county clerk; Al Fiegel, state senator, and Edwards, were guests Tuesday morning on a breakfast club radio program in Reedsport.

Police said Estes was starting to pass a vehicle towing a trailer house when the car hit a joggle bar and went out of control. The vehicle swerved into the southbound lane and went into a ditch on the west shoulder of the road.

The accident occurred about 7:20 a.m.

Coos Bay Man Gets Two Years

When Rex Kenneth Johnston, 26, Coos Bay, came into the Douglas County Courthouse Tuesday to be sentenced on a forgery charge, sheriff's deputies arrested him for being drunk in a public building. He went before District Judge Gerald R. Hayes who sentenced him to three days in jail and fined him \$50.

Wednesday, he appeared before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich and was sentenced to serve two years in the Oregon State Correctional Institution. Johnston earlier had pleaded guilty to forgery of a check and presentence investigation had been ordered.

Mary J. Beaven, 31, Reedsport, has been committed to the Douglas County jail for 30 days and was fined \$100 on a not-sufficient-fund check charge in the court of Orin B. Collier at Reedsport.

In District Court, Clifford E. Kinley, 34, Eugene, pleaded innocent to drunken driving and a jury trial was set for 9:30 a.m. May 15.

Rona Smith, 934 NE Cedar St., also pleaded innocent to drunken driving and her trial was set for 1:30 p.m. May 21.

Thomas Floyd Cantrell, 18, of 677 SE Ramp Rd., pleaded innocent to vagrancy. Trial was set for 9:30 a.m. May 14. The complaint charged him with loitering about a school building.

Donald Lee Blackburn, 32, Washington, D. C., is being held in the county jail committed from District Court for 21 days as a fugitive from Washington, D. C., on a charge of an auto charge. He was arrested by State Police for hitchhiking and the auto larceny charge was discovered.

Transient Waves Hearing In Court

Augusta Yarber, 41, transient, waived preliminary hearing when he was arraigned before District Court Judge Gerald R. Hayes on a charge of larceny from a motor vehicle Wednesday.

He was accused in the complaint with the theft of two suitcases from the 1957 station wagon of Clarence and Rosemary Loubderback of Lynden, Wash., Monday night.

Yarber was arrested by Roseburg City Police shortly after he had checked in at a local hotel. The suitcases described by the Loubderbacks were found in the hotel, the officers reported. Some papers missing from the suitcases when searched were later found under the bed, it was reported.

The Loubderbacks told officers they had stopped in at the Lariat restaurant for dinner, and when they returned the suitcases were missing. The officers checked the vicinity, then inquired at a hotel. The desk clerk said a man with suitcases answering the description had checked in not long before.

Yarber told officers he had gotten out of the penitentiary in March and said he was a "five-time loser."

He asked to see an attorney when he first appeared in court, and Spencer W. Yates was appointed by Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodrich to represent him. He was held to answer to the Grand Jury.

PORTLAND (AP)—Wage negotiations between the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union and the Timber Operators Council will begin in Portland May 14.

The employer group disclosed today the date of the session. It will precede by two days the sessions scheduled between employers and the International Woodworkers of America.

The IWA has announced it will seek a 30-cent hourly pay increase. The LSWU has not disclosed the amount it will seek.

The negotiations will be limited to wages at this interim re-opener of two-year contracts.

Women Voters Back Move To Increase Legislators' Pay

The Oregon League of Women Voters is again supporting a movement to increase legislators' salaries, reports Roseburg League President Mrs. James Lombard.

She said the league will support ballot measure 2 in the primaries. The measure would amend the constitution by providing the state legislators' salaries be established and paid in the same manner as the salaries of other elected state officers.

Mrs. Lombard said: "Oregon still ranks among the lowest five states in the compensation provided legislators, even after taking into consideration the expense statute passed in 1961 which is designed to keep cover costs incurred by legislators for expenses related to legislative work."

She said the league has long supported the principle of "adequate compensation for legislators." In the 1958 general and 1960 primary elections, it endorsed ballot measures to provide specific changes in the present \$800 per annum.

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Six Elementary Teachers Signed For Myrtle Creek

The Myrtle Creek School Board this week hired six new elementary teachers, all graduates of Lewis & Clark College at Lewiston, Idaho.

They are William M. Hillis, fourth grade at Tri-City, and William J. Nowoy, fifth grade Myrtle Creek, both of Clarkston, Wash.; Michael Hendrickson, Anatole, Wash., sixth grade Myrtle Creek; Gilbert Wheeler, Trace River, Ida., sixth grade Tri-City; Gail R. Wilson, Pierce, Ida., third grade Myrtle Creek, and Judith Wolf, Lewiston, Ida., third grade, Myrtle Creek.

The district is still short three elementary teachers, two music, and teachers for high school English to also handle drama and one for English for remedial reading.

Bill Wirth was elected board chairman to take over at the July meeting, and Bob Taylor was elected vice chairman. The new board member to take office in July for five years is Lee Winetrou, replacing Gilbert Weaver. The board has scheduled a special meeting May 23.

Wednesday night, after much discussion and an earlier tabling of the issue, the board decided to permit the Tri-City Ministerial Alliance to sponsor the passing out of church preference cards among students when they register for school in the fall.

The Revs. Richard Rohrbaugh and Don Boldt, representing the

alliance, were at the meeting and explained that all major church denominations were represented, and the cards would be made available to every group identifiable on the cards. They reported the schools were the easiest place to obtain such information and that the plan had worked very satisfactorily in Roseburg.

The board's decision was for an experimental program for next year. The method of handling the cards would be left up to Supt. Al Neet and the alliance.

Supt. Al Neet reported the school reorganizational program currently is at a standstill. It was decided to contact the county school superintendent's office to see what could be done about getting the move rolling again.

The board decided to go ahead with plans for repairing the heating system and drafting tables of the shop building. Funds were provided in the budget. New heating fans will be installed experimentally. The board also approved fencing of the grade school grounds, as allowed in the new budget. The work will be done immediately.
