

Distance Races To Hold Spotlight In West Coast Relays Saturday

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — Distance races may take the limelight from the sprints at the West Coast Relays here Saturday.

The reason is Dyrrol Burleson of the University of Oregon.

Burleson will anchor his team in an assault on the world record in the four-mile relay and then he will have the option of running a special mile race or anchoring his team in the medley relay.

It is conceivable he could do all three.

Stamina Showed

The American mile champ's stamina showed here last year when he ran a 4:00.3 anchor in the four-mile and then ran a 4:00.4 in the medley relay.

The sprints usually get the spotlight because of Ratcliffe Stadium's fast clay track. The 100-yard dash here has been run in 9.3 seconds three times since 1948 with many 9.4 clockings before and after.

Featured in the 100 this year are four men who have done 9.3—Oregon's Harry Jerome, San Jose State's Dennis Johnson, Arizona's Larry Dunn and the Los Angeles Striders' Roscoe Cook.

Pole Vault

A field event, the pole vault, could take the cake as the meet's best event.

Dave Tork and John Uelses, the first men to go over 16 feet, will meet in competition for the first time.

Several other events shape up as headliners—including the 5,000 meter run and the mile relay.

Oregon State's Dale Story, NCAA cross-country champ, has a best of 14:06.0 in the 5,000 meters and is capable of bettering Max Truex' meet record of 14:04.2.

The mile relay has Arizona State's speedy squad which broke the national collegiate record with a 3:07.5. California, Southern Cal-

Howard Concentrates On Hits And Effort Brings Team Reward

NEW YORK (AP) — Elston Howard normally is a contented, pleasant-mannered, easy-going guy but Wednesday he was singing the blues as he sat slumped in front of his locker in the Yankee clubhouse before the game with the Boston Red Sox.

"Look at me," he moaned, "a 240 hitter, a lousy .246 hitter. I'm ashamed of myself. I should be hitting 100 points higher but I'm not. Know why? Because I let a few home runs go by my head. That's why."

"No more of that swinging for the fences for me. I'm just going back to meeting the ball. And I'm going to start today. Just wait and see."

True To Word

Howard was true to his word although the return to his old style of hitting didn't pay off until the seventh inning. Boston's Bill Monbouquette, after pitching six hitless innings, finally gave up a hit, a bunt single to Tom Tresh with one out in the seventh. It was a little pop over Monbo's head.

Yankee Magic Fails Clevenger

NEW YORK (AP) — That old Yankee pin-stripe magic, which is supposed to turn ordinary ball players into super-stars, worked in reverse for Clevenger.

"Wait until he puts on those pin stripes," the pundits muttered when the journeyman relief pitcher went to the New York Yankees from the Los Angeles Angels. "He'll be a killer."

But Wednesday, a year to the day after he came to the Yanks, the 29-year-old right-hander was on his way back to the minors. The Yanks couldn't find a place for him under the 25-man limit and all other 19 major league clubs passed him on waivers.

"Sure, I was upset," the dark, handsome pitcher admitted. "Who wouldn't be, knowing every club in the big leagues had waived on you? I was up until 5 o'clock this morning just mulling it over in my mind."

No one seems exactly sure what changed Clevenger from one of the most respected relief men in the league to the man who was optioned to Richmond in order for New York to make the 25-player limit.

Clevenger, who had a 1-1 mark last season, didn't pitch an inning this year.

"I had a feeling this (the option to the minors) was coming. When you've been around this game as long as I have, you can almost sense these things."

"I'm coming back, though. Deep down, I know I'll be back. Wait and see."

Sports Simmons Works On New Career With Cardinals

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Turned loose two years ago by a last-place Philadelphia club, left-hander Curt Simmons is working on "my second career—this time as a pitcher, not a thrower"—and it might surpass the first one.

Simmons stopped the hot San Francisco Giants 7-3 Wednesday night and became the first pitcher this season to go all the way against them. Curt has five straight complete-game victories, against no defeats, and has a 1.60 earned run average, best of any National League pitcher.

Catcher Carl Sawatski, who drove in four runs, said, "He's always pitched this way for us. They're just getting him some runs this year. He really works on those hitters and makes 'em hit his pitch."

Manager Johnny Keane said, "Curt has been a great man for this club. He's never pitched a bad game for us that I can recall."

All this for a pitcher who walked into a San Francisco hotel lobby on May 12, 1960 to hear roommate Robin Roberts say, "They've released you."

Simmons was stunned but the Cardinals signed Curt seven days later. The Redbirds gave him an immediate raise from his \$20,000 salary with the Phillies, and have never been sorry.

Simmons, 32, had a 9-10 record last year, but his earned run average of 3.12 was the best on the Redbird staff.

Johnson Threatens To Postpone Fight

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Harold Johnson said today he doesn't feel like the National Boxing Association light heavyweight champion that he is and threatened to pull out of his title bout against Doug Jones Saturday night as the result of a continuing court feud with his manager over money.

But Alfred M. Klein, a member of the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission, said, "There's not the slightest chance" of the bout being called off.

"We'll get it straightened out," said Klein as he prepared for a conference with attorneys for Pat Olivieri, Johnson's manager. "I'm surprised he (Johnson) talked that way. All hands will confer and we'll have it worked out."

Johnson said in an interview that regardless of the consequences he would pull out of the 15-round nationally televised bout at the Arena if his purse is held in escrow by legal action or if Olivieri is allowed to take the manager's share immediately after the fight.

Olivieri subpoenaed Johnson into court Wednesday to testify at a hearing at which the manager sought a preliminary injunction to block Johnson from going through with any matches not arranged or approved by Olivieri.

Hall Of Famer Dies

WEYMOUTH, Mass. (AP) — Frank A. (Buster) Burrell, 95, died Tuesday night two weeks after he had been named to the Baseball Hall of Fame as the oldest living major league player.

Burrell had played with the New York Giants and the Brooklyn Dodgers.

He leaves his widow, Mary.

Students Take Forestry Tour

More than 300 sixth grade students from Sutherlin, Riddle, Myrtle Creek and Camas Valley attended the School Forestry Tour at the Bert Melius Tree Farm at Tenmile Wednesday.

Despite the intermittent periods of showers and sunshine, the students spent most of the morning and afternoon learning about all phases of trees and their uses.

Upon arrival, the group was welcomed by Bob Bradley, county extension forester, in behalf of the Meliuses and the Douglas County School Forestry Tour Committee.

The students were divided into seven groups. Each group was taken to one of the seven instruction stations set up for the tour. They remained for 15 minutes at each station until signaled to move on to the next station, on a rotation basis.

The seven stations with instructors were forest products — Ken Hebard, Sun Studs, Inc., and Bill Cooke, Roseburg Lumber Co.; tree identification — Harold Toole, state Forestry Department, and Wayne Miller, Douglas Forest Protective Association; forest soils — Bob Paeth, Soil Conservation Service; commercial thinning — Jack Price and Chuck Anderson, U. S. Forest Service, Glendale; seeds and cones — John Meier and Bob Carey, U. S. Forest Service; and Dick Harms, Bureau of Land Management; pre-commercial thinning and pruning and 4-H — Bob Kischel, county Land Department, Larry Woodard, BLM, and Frank von Borstel, Extension Service; and fire control — Don Wright, state Forestry Department, and Bruce Ferguson, DFFA.

Reuther Says UAW To Seek New Gains

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—Walter Reuther said today that despite headline writers the United Auto Workers Union is going to continue a traditional policy of obtaining contract gains that don't require price increases.

Reuther, president of the UAW, responded to criticism voiced by delegates at the UAW convention this morning that some news accounts of President Kennedy's speech here Tuesday pictured the President as demanding that organized labor join the fight against inflation.

Delegates said these stories reflected on the UAW.

Reuther, remarking that reporters don't write newspaper headlines, told the convention: "Ninety-eight per cent of the papers of this country were against Franklin Roosevelt, they were against Harry Truman, they were against the UAW—but we're going right ahead no matter what the editorial writers say about it."

Reuther said the UAW policy has been and still is to win its gains from increasing productivity and profits and "not out of the pockets of consumers, and the headlines will not change that."

Reuther, 53, was elected by acclamation to his 10th straight term as head of the million-member UAW. He was unopposed.

Secretary-Treasurer Emil Mazey was re-elected without opposition. Most other officers were unopposed. The convention was due to add three new men to the executive board: Ken Bannan, Douglas Fraser and Nelson Edwards, all of Detroit. Edwards is the first Negro board member.
