

Trade Expansion Bill Gets 'Let's Get Tough' Feature

WASHINGTON (AP) — A let's-get-tough feature has been written into President Kennedy's trade expansion bill and the action may win votes for the measure in the House.

Basic Rule Violator Found Guilty At Trial

James George Wiemals was found guilty of violation of the basic rule on trial before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich Wednesday. The case was appealed from a District Court conviction.

The trial opened at 10:20 a.m. and was over at 11:30. The judge fined him \$25, which was taken from the bail he had posted.

Woman Pistol-Whipped In Robbery Of Tavern

PORTLAND (AP) — The proprietor of a Northeast Portland tavern was pistol-whipped Thursday afternoon by a gunman who escaped with an undetermined amount of cash, police said.

The victim was Mrs. Ann C. Fredson, 58, authorities said. She was hospitalized with severe scalp wounds and shock from loss of blood.

Police said she told them a man came in about 3:30 p.m. armed with a small pistol. She said he took her cash, then forced her into the living quarters in the rear of the building.

He tied her up and struck her on the head with the pistol, she said.

The adopted version was toned down from the original draft, sponsored by the American Farm Bureau Federation which contends European countries have all but locked their doors against many U.S. farm goods.

Even the modified version, however, was accepted only reluctantly by the administration. Some officials had told the committee the original proposal would probably kill any chance of the close partnership with the European Common Market that Kennedy seeks.

But committee members said the modification makes it easier for the bill to pass in the House.

The provision is aimed at such things as quotas, government-tolerated cartels, and the no-collaring variable taxes some European countries impose on imported agricultural products that compete with their own subsidized farms' output.

The amendment as adopted would assure public airing of complaints by U.S. industries that foreign countries practice discrimination.

Expert Testifies In Boehme Trial

PORT ORCHARD, Wash. (AP) — A Tacoma toxicologist testified Friday that samples of Mrs. Dorothy Boehme's blood showed a condition usually indicating a disease process or poisoning.

Dr. Alan Egelson testified in the trial of Dr. Robert Boehme, Port Orchard physician accused of trying to poison his wife.

The defense objected, contending the state had failed to show that any substance had been injected.

A long legal argument ensued in absence of the jury. Two officers testified Thursday that Dr. Boehme had told them his wife became ill almost immediately after he withdrew a hypodermic needle from her arm last September.

Boehme, 42, is on trial on a charge of first degree assault with intent to kill. He is accused of injecting poison in his wife's arm in pretense of taking a blood sample for a diabetes test. The prosecution contends the doctor became romantically involved with Mary Boehme, his former sister-in-law.

Sheriff Dean Jones and one of his detectives, Charles Wolfe Jr., were the officers who testified. The sheriff said the doctor told him that within minutes after the needle of a vacuum syringe was removed, that his wife, Dorothy, became ill.

Dorothy has stood by her husband, scoffing at the accusation against him.

Wolfe said the doctor told him it was impossible to force anything into a blood vessel with the vacuum device—that it is designed to withdraw blood automatically after insertion of the needle.

The detective said Dr. Boehme told officers he threw away the blood sample he obtained.

Merely Players Now Corporation

Delay Is Called In Carpenter Launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The attempt to launch astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter into orbit around the earth, scheduled for May 17, has been delayed, informed sources reported today.

There were indications the delay would be several days. There was no immediate word from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The informant said the delay was necessary to correct troubles in the attitude control system of the capsule, which is in place atop the Atlas booster on launch pad 14.

The attitude control system caused some trouble on astronaut John H. Glenn Jr.'s orbital flight on Feb. 20.

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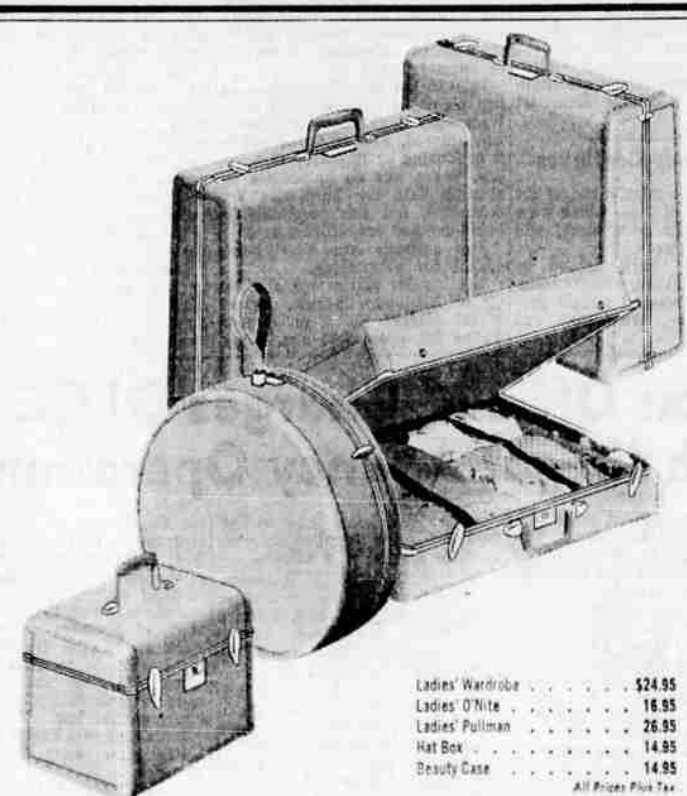
