Philippines Leader Nixes Visit To U. S.

MANILA (AP) — President Macapagal tonight postponed his state visit to the United States indefinitely because of the U. S. House of Representatives' rejection of a long-pending Philippine war damage bill.

Macapagal, in a nationwide radio television address, said "while reiterating my gratitude for the invitation that the American president so kindly extended to me, it is with deep regret that I am constrained to postpone the date of the visit."

The president put off the visit—scheduled for next month—"until such time as the circumstances will permit me to go on a state visit, which would be most pleasant, because it would be acceptable to our people."

Macapagal explained that "the feeling of resentment among our people and the attitude of the Congress of the United States negate the atmosphere of good will upon which my visit to the United States was predicted."

"I feel that our people would never understand how, under the circumstances, at this time, I could go to the United States and dwell on the subject of good will. At this present moment, the word will sound empty."

Accidental Death Claims Ex-Lookingglass Woman

Mr. and Mrs. Grant Nielsen of Lookingglass and the latter's mother, Mrs. Eugenia Swan, were called to Carson City, Nev., recently by the tragic death of Mrs. Swan's granddaughter and her husband, John Anderson, Jr., reports correspondent Hazel Marsh.

The young couple was married last August and was living in a trailer house which had recently been purchased. The trailer was equipped with a gas heater which was still burning when the young folks were discovered asphyxiated, apparently while sleeping. Their death was estimated to have occurred 12 or 15 hours before they were discovered.

The young man was the son of John Anderson, city engineer of Carson City, and Mrs. Anderson was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lexel Swan, formerly of Lookingglass. Mrs. Anderson, the former Stephanie Reason, attended the local school and was well known in this vicinity, having visited frequently at the home of the Nielsen's and Mrs. Swan. Mr. and Mrs. Swan now reside at McCloud, Calif.

Funeral services were held in Carson City.

Moslem Maid Is Sought After Two Children Found Dead In Algiers

ALGIERS (AP) — Two Jewish children were found dead in their homes today with their throats cut and police—suspecting the killings were retaliation for the Secret Army Organization slaughter of Moslems—hunted a Moslem maid.

Three Europeans—two priests and a businessman—were reported to have vanished in Algiers and authorities said they apparently were spirited away by Moslems.

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French-U. S. Relations Skid To New Low

PARIS (AP) — France and the United States have been split by the atom. Relations between the two old allies have been skidding toward a historic low.

Outwardly the bonds of friendship are as strong as ever. But an undercurrent of reluctance, stubbornness or outright obstruction thwarts cooperation on almost any new subject that is brought up for study.

President Charles de Gaulle is expected to talk about French-American relations Tuesday at one of his rare news conferences. Foreign Minister Maurice Couve

de Murville told the National Assembly's foreign affairs committee last week, "it is clear that there are differences and divergences." But he insisted the rift was not serious.

De Gaulle's determination to make France an atomic power is at the heart of the quarrel.

The stern old general is convinced that France must have its own nuclear striking force to remain a first-rate power. He fears that if war should break out, the United States would be too busy with its own defense to worry about Europe.

U.S. policy, recently re-affirmed by President Kennedy, is against any proliferation of atomic weapons or any expansion in the number of atomic powers.

The United States can do nothing to stop France from building its own atomic bombs, but it is resolved to do nothing to help. That applies also to the planes and missiles to deliver the warheads.

The application of this policy has been galling to France. De Gaulle has been too proud and too cautious to ask for any American secrets that are guarded by the McMahon Act. But he would like to have material and information that only Britain now gets from the Americans.

France recently offered to buy from the United States a gaseous diffusion plant for manufacture of enriched uranium, blueprints for an atomic submarine, missile guidance systems and parts and propellants. The American answer was a flat no.

At one time American officials were hesitant about approving the sale of Boeing jet tanker planes to France for refueling its Mirage IV jet fighter.
