## Groups Will Remind Voters Of Primary

Interest continues to lag in the Friday primary elections, but at least two organizations are mobilizing to remind people to come to the polls.

The Democratic Party has laid plans for a telephone campaign on a non-partisan basis in Roseburg in the southern part of the county and in the north. The party members on both Thursday and Friday will go through the telephone books calling everyone to remind them to vote.

Meanwhile, Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone Co. in Roseburg has reported it, too, will do its bit to get voters out. On both Thursday and Friday, it will conclude all PBX messages with the reminder to vote. Manager C. B. Thomas said he anticipates approximately 10,000 Oregonians will receive the message from the telephone company operators. He asked other businesses and industries to join in the move.

One candidate who has been campaigning heavily in many parts of the county said he expects "the lightest voter turnout in county history." He said "the public just doesn't seem to be interested."

## Local Youth Held For Stealing Shirt

Thomas Floyd Cantrell, 18, of Ramp Rd., after being found guilty on trial in District Court of vagrancy Monday, was promptly served with a warrant by a sheriff's deputy charging him with larceny in a building.

Cantrell had pleaded innocent to the vagrancy charge, which accused him of loitering on school property. Sentencing was deferred until Wednesday at his request. He had been arrested by Roseburg city police.

The larceny warrant, accusing him of the theft of a shirt, was issued earlier out of Circuit Court in the absence of the district court judge. He has been jailed in bail of \$1,500.

WASHINGTON (AP)—With all sides reasonably satisfied that political profit has been squeezed out of it, the Senate may shelve today the administration's voter literacy test bill.

## Chambers Set To Emcee Rodeo

Set to announce the Douglas County Pioneer Days Rodeo June 16 and 17 is Bob Chambers, Rodeo Cowboy's Association member-announcer from Pendleton.

Fred Boyer, president of the Douglas County Mounted, sponsor of the rodeo, made the announcement.

Chambers' work at the microphone at the Fairgrounds for the two-day event, will be part of a busy schedule which includes engagements at the Elgin, Oregon, Stampede; Milton Freewater Cowboy Reunion Rodeo; the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show; the Casia County Rodeo, Burley, Idaho; Gooding, Idaho; the Black Diamond Stampede, Price, Utah; and others.

Chambers, before entering the field of rodeo announcing, won his spurs as a rodeo contestant. Born in Portland, Chambers grew up and began contesting in California. In 1939 he became a professional in the bull-riding event.

Before retiring from the contestant ranks a few years ago, Chambers worked bull riding, bareback riding, and calf roping for 12 years at many of the West's top rodeos. During his career he took time out for World War II.

The war didn't soften the bull-riding veteran one bit. As a member of Gen. Frank Merrill's band of hand-picked marauders in North Burma, he was busy either fighting the Japanese or harassing stubborn pack mules most of the time.

In Pendleton, where he now lives with his family, he has been featured on the two-hour daily broadcasts of the Pendleton Round Up for the past five years.

## Pair Bound Over To Grand Jury

Maynard Fred Edwards, 34, of Los Angeles, and Armina Kim, 21, of Pasadena, Calif., were bound over to the Douglas County Grand Jury after waiving preliminary hearings in Drain Justice Court Monday.

They are accused of larceny in connection with an alleged till tap at the Drain Variety Store. More than \$1,000 was reported missing from the store. The pair had a similar amount of money on them at the time of arrest, according to state police. It has not been determined if the money was the same as that taken, they said.

They are held in bail of \$5,000.

He was a member of St. John's Catholic Church in Milwaukee and was a charter member of the Holy Name Society of Springfield, Ohio.

Survivors include a brother, Martin A. Paul, of Milwaukee; three sisters, Elizabeth Paul and Mrs. Sonna Hiney, both of Milwaukee and Mrs. Mary Louise Arnold of Medford; and a number of nieces and nephews. He was never married.

Peake Memorial Chapel of Milwaukee and Long and Shukle Memorial Chapel of Roseburg are in charge of arrangements.

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## Contributor Draws Term Of 30 Months

David Hugh Glenn, 20, of Winston, convicted of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, Monday was sentenced to 2½ years in the Oregon Correctional Institution.

His attorney, Harrison Winston, promptly served notice of appeal to the Oregon Supreme Court.

Glenn was released from custody after posting \$3,000 bail bond.

The defendant was convicted in a case which involved a 16-year-old Roseburg girl.

He appeared before Circuit Judge Don H. Sanders for sentencing at his initial arraignment. Appearing later for sentencing, he changed his plea to innocent. He was found guilty by a Circuit Court jury.

## Rural Firemen Conduct School

The Rural Fire Department Monday night burned down a house. However, rather than increasing fire insurance rates for the area, the act served to provide instruction in fighting house fires for members of the department.

The fire school was conducted at 136 NE Currier St. under the direction of Cliff Thrasher, fire chief, with 14 men and two pieces of equipment participating.

The building, a three-room house, was donated to the "school" by Mrs. Edward B. Neal, Camas Valley.

One of the firemen at the school noted that the house was well-insulated, had plaster walls with metal lathing and heavy beams. Because of the construction, the house was hard to start burning, he said. In order that the roof might burn, it was necessary to chop a hole through to it, he said.

He noted that such a building stands a better chance when a fire breaks out in it.

## Saturday Starts Shaping Up As Parade Day In Roseburg

Saturday is shaping up as a "parade day" for Roseburg.

The Roseburg City Council has granted the Pacific Racing Association and West Coast Automobile Club permission to stage separate parades in the downtown business area.

Both requests were approved by Police Chief John T. Truett. The West Coast Automobile Club plans its parade at 1 p.m. and the other group at 2:30 p.m. A small number of vehicles will be used in each event.

The council also approved a Loyal Order of the Moose request to close SE Jackson St. from SE Oak Ave. to SE Cass Ave. on June 8 and 9 for the purpose of staging a "pre-Fourth of July public auction." Moose representatives attending the meeting said new and used merchandise will be sold at the event, which has the support of downtown merchants.

A Moose spokesman said proceeds will be used to finance a fireworks display on Independence Day.

In other business, the council heard first and second readings on the city budget, but adoption was not possible due to lack of a quorum. This was also public hearing night on the budget proposals, but no protests were presented. The budget will come up for final approval at the next council meeting.

# De Gaulle Says West Must Keep Its Rights In Berlin Unaltered

PARIS (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle declared today the Western powers must keep their present rights in Berlin without change.

At a crowded news conference, he also declared anew that France must build its own atomic force for her defense and independence, and again urged the formation of a European political union but along France's ideas of a loose confederation.

De Gaulle said France does not object to the United States' probe of Soviet intentions on Berlin.

"Now is not the moment to modify accomplished facts. The statute of Berlin was established on the basis of a quadripartite accord. It must not be changed," he added.

De Gaulle asserted that in the "current international circumstances it is vain to try to settle the problem of Germany in a satisfactory manner."

"The Soviets are demanding that the West finish with the German problem and they are using the Berlin crisis for this end."

"In the current atmosphere we very much doubt that any good results can be attained," he said. He acknowledged that in case of conflict the United States would be obliged to furnish the greatest effort, and hence is entitled to conduct the probe of Soviet policy.

"As for us, we think it much more preferable to be reserved," he added.

It was at this point that De Gaulle insisted that now is not the time to change things at Berlin, or to modify the delicate balance between East and West.

Any change in the status of Berlin at this time, he said, would only aggravate the dangers of an era in which the whole world is permanently menaced with devastating destruction.

Another reason, he said, was the solidarity between France and Germany, the basis of hope for European unification.

Trying to solve the German problem with the Soviets now is, he said, like trying to square the circle.
