

Young Demos Back Thornton As Primary Election Nears

The campaigning in Oregon became even more intense today as candidates got in some of their last licks before the primary election. The voting will come Friday.

In the latest of a series of primary endorsements, Young Democrats of the 3rd Congressional District jumped into the governor's race.

They said they not only endorsed Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton for Democratic nomination for governor, but would not support his opponent, state Sen. Walter Pearson, if Pearson were nominated.

The statement said Pearson was "in flat opposition to the historic ideals and principles of the Democratic Party."

Earlier U. S. Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., had endorsed Pearson over Thornton. And the Multnomah

County Democratic Central Com-

mittee had endorsed Thornton. Pearson and Thornton both spoke at the Willamette Democratic Society meeting, each saying he was the only candidate who could defeat Republican Gov. Mark Hatfield. M. A. Yegge of Eugene, also a candidate for the Democratic nomination, was present but did not speak.

Sig Unander, one of six Republicans seeking nomination for the Senate, said at Eugene that this nation has the highest debt and highest taxes in history and that the Democrats are planning more.

U. S. Rep. Edwin R. Durno, R-Ore., also seeking the Senate nomination, expressed opposition to the Kennedy administration's medicare plan, but said he deplored the stand of a group of New Jersey doctors, who pledged not to treat patients under that plan.

Hatfield, speaking at Portland, also opposed Kennedy's medicare plan, which would be financed through social security payments. Hatfield said any medicare program should be voluntary.

Blaine Whipple, a candidate for Democratic nomination in the 1st Congressional District, said at Stayton that the most vital challenges facing this country include conservation of natural resources

and building strength into the na-

tion's economy. Charles O. Porter, Democratic candidate for congressman from the 4th District, said that one of his opponents could have prevented the daylight saving bill from passing in the Oregon House of Representatives. He was referring to Robert Duncan, who was speaker of the House at the last session.

James Robert Hayes was to appear at 1 p.m. today to face a charge of larceny from an auto. He is accused of the theft of a trunk from the automobile of W. D. and Carol M. Carnley, with intent to steal.

David S. Moon, 28, Myrtle Creek, arrested by state police for being drunk on a public highway was sentenced to three days in the county jail and fined \$50 and \$5 costs by Judge Hayes.

Noel Gilbert Olander, 32, Portland, was arrested Tuesday by state and city police on a Multnomah County warrant charging contributing to the delinquency of a minor. He was arrested at a Roseburg bus station. The warrant for arrest set bail at \$5,000.

Over extension of credit can in many cases be blamed for bankruptcy filings, C. E. Luckey, referee in bankruptcy for the U. S. District Court told the Roseburg Credit Women's Breakfast Club, at their annual "bosses' breakfast" The meeting was held this morning at the Umpqua Hotel Gold Room.

The statistical curve in bankruptcy proceedings among individuals is climbing sharply, according to Luckey.

ing to Luckey. That for business is much lower. A total of 49 petitions have been filed in the six southwest Oregon counties in the first 14 days of May. Each filing, he said, has a more far-reaching effect than on the individual making the filing, as many creditors are also involved.

Conditional sales contracts and open accounts are little security when it comes to perishable items, Luckey warned. It is one thing to get a signature on a contract and another for the person to pay the account.

Wonderful Gimick

The revolving credit plan is a "wonderful gimick," he stated, but it sometimes means selling next year's coat today, and the purchaser can't afford the 20 per cent markup as credit interest he must pay, unless he gets a corresponding increase in wages.

Merchants were advised by the speaker to stop selling financing and get back to selling merchandise. He warned credit managers to get the information needed to determine whether the individual is

a good credit risk. Find out the amount of other contracts for which he is obligated. What is his take home pay? These things are important in determining the ability of a person to pay off an obligation. Over-extension of credit helps no one — the seller nor the buyer, he said.

For many persons there is no longer any stigma attached to the filing of bankruptcy. Not many of them indicate that a filing is a temporary protection and that they will pay later, he said.

Original Intent
The original philosophy behind bankruptcy, said Luckey, is, first, equal liquidation of assets among creditors, and, second, to guarantee an individual a right that he cannot be so overburdened with debts that he never can pay out, and thus give him chance for a new start.
