

Most Of Oregon Can Expect Sunshine As Polls Open Tomorrow For Primary

There will be clouds over Oregon election day, but rain is expected only on the coast, the Weather Bureau said today.

Most of the state can expect some sunshine Friday. The forecast is for partly cloudy skies. Even on the coast, where a light drizzle is expected in the morning, some sunshine is expected later.

Riddle Man Faces Grand Jury Action

James Doyle Harper, 27, of Riddle, has been bound over for Grand Jury action in connection with a complaint charging him with threatening commission of a felony.

Douglas County District Judge Gerald R. Hayes ordered that Harper be held to answer to the charge following a preliminary hearing Wednesday. Harper was arraigned Tuesday and requested the hearing.

He was represented by Eldon Caley, Roseburg attorney. The complaint by the defendant's wife, Judy M. Harper, charges the defendant made a threat to kill her on May 4. Bail was continued at \$2,500.

On a motion by the district attorney, a charge of larceny from an auto against James Robert Hayes, 18, a Marine, was dismissed. Hayes is stationed at Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Ronald Floyd McAboy, 25, of Powers, was sentenced to two days in the Douglas County jail and fined \$125 and costs after pleading guilty in District Court to a charge of driving on a suspended operator's license. McAboy was charged in connection with a complaint issued April 21 by Roseburg state police.

Also in District Court, Charles Vilhelm Olsen, 77, of Glendale, was fined \$25 for "angling by prohibited method." A Roseburg state police complaint charged Olsen with fishing on the North Umpqua River using an unattended rod.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., local time.

The candidates were getting in their final campaign licks today. Much of the interest was in the contest for the Republican nomination for the U. S. Senate and the Democratic nomination for governor.

The Republican winner of the Senate race is expected to face Sen. Wayne L. Morse, D-Ore., in the fall election.

The Democratic gubernatorial nominee is expected to face Gov. Mark Hatfield in the fall.

Six candidates were competing for the Republican Senate nomination: U. S. Rep. Edwin R. Dunn of Medford, Harold Livingston and Glenn Brixey of Corvallis, Jim Bacon of Portland, and R. F. Cook of Scotts Mills.

The Democratic contest for governor featured Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton, state Sen. Walter J. Pearson of Portland, Dan N. Cox and M. A. (Cap) Yegge of Eugene. There also are these contests for congressional nominations:

4th District—Robert B. Duncan of Medford and three Eugene candidates, ex-Rep. Charles O. Porter, state Sen. Robert W. Straub and Patrick M. Flynn, Democrats. Carl Fisher of Eugene is unopposed on the Republican side.

There also is a statewide contest for Democratic nomination for labor commissioner. Incumbent Norman Nilsen is opposed by Vic Davis of Portland. Alfred (Pat) Pendleton, Calif.

PTA Committee Hears Speakers At Meeting

Election of officers for 1962-1963 was held. Virginia Marr was elected president; Irene Sanders, vice president; and Dolly Dear-dorff, secretary-treasurer.

Mrs. Marr presented a gift to Darlene Snider from the past committee members in appreciation of her leadership of the group for the past two years.

Blair of Salem is unopposed on the Republican side.

There are two judicial contests—Circuit Judge Arno H. Denecke of Portland vs. Circuit Judge Lyle R. Wolff of Baker for a Supreme Court seat, and incumbent Peter Gunnar vs. Raymond L. Jones of Portland for the state tax court.

Voters also will decide on two statewide measures—a proposal to do away with the provision that property taxes cannot be increased more than 6 per cent in a year—unless there is a special vote—and a proposal to let the legislature set the pay for legislators.

Salinger Ends Tour Of Soviets

MOSCOW (AP)—White House press secretary Pierre Salinger today wound up a swing around the Soviet Union during which he collected Premier Khrushchev's views on crucial issues.

"We disagreed amiably," Salinger said when asked how the Russians responded to his plugging of American-style freedom of the press. But, he added, the talks were the most useful part of his trip except for two lengthy conversations with Khrushchev.

Salinger had hoped to make arrangements for an exchange of television interviews between President Kennedy and Khrushchev. However, he admitted over coffee at Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson's residence nothing much has come of this idea.

He arrived on the overnight train from Kiev and met with reporters before going on to inspect Moscow's television facilities and attend a Foreign Ministry luncheon.

Summing up what he told his Soviet hosts—who were led by Alexei Adzhubei, editor of the government paper Izvestia and son-in-law of Khrushchev, Salinger said:

"I favor as many Soviet correspondents coming to our country as possible and as many American correspondents as possible coming here. The more that come and go from both sides, the better for understanding between the Soviet Union and the United States."

Salinger is due in New York Friday.

Senate Orders Probe Today On Explosive Estes Deals

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate investigations subcommittee voted unanimously today to stage a full-scale public airing of the scandals flowing from the Billie Sol Estes case.

Chairman John L. McClellan, D-Ark., pledged a full, thorough and complete investigation of alleged influence deals by the Texas financier.

He said there was no sign of partisan discord among the subcommittee's members over plans to follow the trail of evidence, which could lead to the doorsteps of people high in government during the Kennedy and Dwight D. Eisenhower administrations.

McClellan said the public hearings will start just as soon as his expanded investigating staff can wade through a mountain of documentary material, but that it is impossible now to set the starting date.

He said the subcommittee, at a 90-minute meeting behind closed doors, voted unanimously to authorize the public hearings to start at such time as the staff is properly prepared.

The steadily expanding staff has been on the job for a month in a preliminary investigation which, he said, has now dug up evidence from which it became apparent

that the facts as they had developed were developing warranted a full, thorough and complete investigation.

McClellan said Estes, whose complex financial manipulations in government farm programs and other fields built a fortune, will be a witness but that it is questionable how much information Estes will give.

Estes is awaiting trial on federal and state fraud charges growing out of the collapse of his financial empire.

McClellan said he has the impression that Estes' lawyer is advising him to cooperate in some phases of the inquiry, but that under the lawyer's instructions in most areas he would not be likely to cooperate without doing violence to his defense in the criminal cases pending.

Both McClellan and Sen. Karl E. Mundt of South Dakota, the subcommittee's senior Republican member, have declared they hope partisanship will not be a problem.

McClellan and Mundt also teamed up in requesting the usual authority for the chairman to order bawky or questionable witnesses to be quizzed in closed door session in advance of public hearings. They explained this is a precaution not used very often, but valuable in cases of witnesses who, as Mundt put it, seem prone to "spread a lot of names in the record without any evidence."

Both senators have said they want the hearings to be objective, with no punches pulled.

Since April 17 the subcommittee has had an expanded staff, now totaling 30, exploring the allegations of influence dealing which flowed from the indictment of Estes, 37, in Texas on fraud charges.

The Pecos man built a fortune of \$50 million out of dealings in the government's farm program and an attempt to corner the ammonia fertilizer market in West Texas. His sprawling, intricate financial manipulations reportedly extended from coast to coast before they collapsed and he declared himself bankrupt.

Mundt said Estes surely would be called to testify in public hearings and might be questioned first in closed door session. He has been subpoenaed.

Hotel Employees Return To Work

NEW YORK (AP)—Service employees returned to their jobs at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel today after a one-day walkout.

Banquet waiters reported at 11 a.m. as scheduled to complete the complement of service workers who staff the plush Park Avenue hotel.

They were preceded by cooks, bellhops, maids, doormen, elevators, operators, chefs and dishwashers.

Thomas J. Kane, resident manager, said everything was normal and that the hotel's five public restaurants and two private clubs are open or will open on schedule today. Full banquet schedules will be maintained, he added.

A meeting of union officers and shop stewards was to be held later today to discuss the case of eight waiters who were fired by the hotel after a 90-minute waiters' walkout on Sunday.

The dismissals led to a second strike on Tuesday. Other service workers then walked out in sympathy with the waiters, who were disgruntled over the tipping system.

Elkton Board Awards Gas And Oil Contracts

The Board of Directors of Elkton School District at its regular meeting this week awarded the gasoline contract for 1962-63 to Standard Oil Co. which submitted a bid of 21.3 cents per gallon, according to Mrs. C. W. Henderer, correspondent.

The fuel oil contract was awarded to Union Oil Co. which submitted the only bid on oil.

Bids on repairing the roofs on the various school buildings were also received but were taken under advisement until a later date.

Security Payments Told For December

For the month of December, 1961, social security benefits in the amount of \$378,014 were paid to 5,661 beneficiaries in Douglas County.

The information, based on a report from the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, further states that Oregonians were paid \$151.5 million in 1961.

Oregon residents numbering 188,696 were receiving social security benefits as of Dec. 31, 1961. Of these, 179,090 were receiving regular retirement or survivors benefits, while 9,606 were paid disability benefits. For the month of December, 1961, these benefits amounted to \$12,758,999, the report states.
