

School Board Approves Dentists' Bid To Distribute Hygiene Kits

A request by the Umpqua District Dental Association to distribute dental hygiene materials in second grade classes of Roseburg

Riddle Names Math Teacher

At this week's meeting of the Riddle School Board a contract was approved for Joseph McClenny of Jerome, Idaho, as upper grade mathematics teacher.

McClenny is a graduate of the University of Idaho, with a master's degree and has been a teacher and administrator for several years. The McClennys and their four children will move to Riddle sometime during the summer.

Vacancies still exist in the Riddle primary, sixth grade, elementary vocal music, and high school home economics departments, according to Erma Best, correspondent.

The board authorized the preparation of bids to be opened on June 11 for the cleaning exterior windows and trim; gas and fuel oil; completing grandstand roof; and fencing the north side of the athletic field.

William E. Markham was elected chairman of the board and E. E. Daniels was elected vice-chairman. Joe Bonn, newly-elected board member, was present as a visitor. He will leave office July 1.

The board adopted a new policy entitling all board members to a vote on any measure if so desired, thus giving the chairman a full vote.

Supt. Kenneth Stuart presented each board member a copy of a report on the elementary guidance conference held recently in Corvallis.

Donald E. Brown, high school principal, appeared before the board to request additional funds for transporting the baseball team to Klamath Falls for the sub-district playoff with Henley which will take place Saturday at 1 p.m. at Gem Field in Klamath Falls.

Principal Brown also invited the board members to attend the annual high school athletes' banquet to be held May 24 in the Riddle Episcopal Parish hall.

John Briscoe, architect from Eugene, was unable to be present at this meeting so a special meeting was set for Monday, May 21.

schools next fall was approved Wednesday night by the Roseburg School Board.

Dr. Richard McDonald presented the request. He said each student would receive an educational kit stressing the importance of brushing teeth and maintaining good dental health.

In another action, the board moved to retain Van Svarverud, Roseburg architect, to prepare working drawings and specifications for a new team teaching room at Roseburg High School. Svarverud had previously provided preliminary estimates on the project at the district's request.

The board authorized an expenditure of \$370 from the district's emergency account to build movable shelves for storage of materials at the Shop Building. Purpose of the shelves will be to release a shop storeroom for use as a classroom next fall.

School officials said the step was taken to meet an anticipated classroom space problem this fall.

Stanley Holmes, district clerk, said the district anticipates a cash carryover in the balance of receipts and expenditures at the close of the school year, indicating the district will end the year in satisfactory financial condition.

Supt. M. C. Deller reported plans are in progress for the Pee Wee Baseball League and play will start a week after school close. Bill Harper will direct the program.

The board also approved contracts with eight teachers to serve in the district next fall. The new teachers are James Robinson, Salem, who will instruct boys' physical education at Fremont Junior High School; a graduate this spring at University of Oregon; Darrel Cady, Waterloo, Iowa, Roseburg High School social studies; Barbara Morgan, Salem, Roseburg High School business education; Jean Defenbach, Corvallis, senior high math, an Oregon State University graduate; Sognhild Skaarstad of Oslo, Norway, educated at Mayville (N.D.) Teachers College, Joseph Lane physical education.

The others are Norman Nesost, Fosston, Minn., also a Mayville Teachers College graduate, Joseph Lane math; William Rinio, Chino, Mont., Fremont Junior High School math, and Phyllis Lombard, Roseburg, Joseph Lane English.

The board accepted resignations from Marie Hall of Fremont, Kathleen Deedon of Hucrest, Audrey Eskelson of Riverside, Robert Moursund of Joseph Lane, Violet Scheele of Hucrest and Robert Van Vactor of Fremont.

The state Board of Aeronautics has reportedly turned a sympathetic ear to a Roseburg request for financial assistance at the Municipal Airport.

A delegation headed by Mayor Peter B. Serafin met with the board this week seeking financial help in making capital improvements at the local facility. The city requested \$12,000 for tie-down area improvements.

Serafin said the state board authorized its airport architect to come to Roseburg and go over the proposed improvement with airport operator R. C. (Bud) Good and Public Works Department chief Kenneth Meng.

"We think the board is interested in the project," Serafin reported today. "First they want to verify specifications and see that the proposal meets Federal Aviation Agency requirements."

Others in the delegation to Portland were City Manager Craig McMillen, city Airport Committee member Van Svarverud and Good.

The board indicated it would give final consideration to the Roseburg request at its June meeting, following receipt of reports from the state aeronautics director and architect.

The state board has funds available for use by airports which demonstrate an emergency need for improvements. These funds come from aviation gasoline taxes.

It was pointed out, however, the board always has more requests for projects than it has funds available. Airports which provide airline service receive priority consideration, it was reported.

Street Widening Set At Sutherlin

The city plans to widen State St. in Sutherlin before tackling sewer improvements on Valentine and State streets.

This was the report at this week's City Council meeting. It was made by City Manager George Stuber. He said a group of residents expressed interest in sewer improvements on these streets, but he said he thought the widening should be taken care of first.

Big Project Picked
The city will be improving Sixth St. this year as its major project. Fifth St. from Umpqua to Umatilla is also included in summer paving.

Ground work is now being done for storm sewer, sidewalks and paving in the district east of Umatilla as far as Sherwood. This approved, before the summer of 1963.

The city manager reported phones are being installed at the city barn and at the airport, and the house at the airport is being remodeled.

A 14-inch water main being laid along Highway 235 and south to Valentine St. is being completed. City crews are cleaning up rubbish throughout the city and trying to clean up blackberry growth.

PORTLAND (AP) — Orville W. Vandiver, a Pendleton taxicab driver, is looking for a man who he says owes him \$112.

Vandiver told Portland police Wednesday he drove the man from Pendleton to Portland, then drove him around the city while he tried to cash a large check.

The man finally left the cab in Southeast Portland, Vandiver said, saying he was going to a nearby bank. He didn't come back.

Dr. Boehme Says Poisoning Accusation Is Preposterous

PORT ORCHARD, Wash. (AP) — Dr. Robert E. Boehme says the accusation that he tried to poison his wife is "preposterous."

Boehme took the stand late Wednesday as the last defense witness in his trial on a charge of first degree assault with intent to kill his wife, Dorothy, 35, by injecting poison into her arm in the guise of taking a blood sample for a diabetes test last Sept. 20.

The state contends Boehme, 42, was carrying on a romance with Mary Boehme, 29, a pretty nurse who once was married to the doctor's brother.

There was a heated exchange between the defendant and Prosecutor Gordon Walgren before Boehme left the stand.

"Isn't it true you had considered killing your wife for some time?" Walgren asked.

"No, absolutely not," the doctor replied.

Walgren asked, "Didn't you consider this an opportune time to kill your wife?"

"That question," Boehme replied, "is about as preposterous as the charge that was filed."

The prosecutor asked, "Didn't you inject a highly toxic poison into her arm?"

The doctor replied, "I did not."

The cross examination ended about two hours of testimony, and the defense rested its case.

There was a chance the case would go to the jury of 11 men and one woman Thursday.

U. S. Lumbermen Are United In Asking Canadian Quota

WENATCHEE, Wash. (AP)—A lumber company spokesman said Thursday that American lumbermen have united in asking for an immediate quota restraint against Canadian lumber imports into the United States.

Dave James of Simpson Timber Co., Seattle, made the statement in a speech at a meeting of the Allied Daily Newspapers of Washington.

James said 17 of the largest lumber associations in the United States, all affiliated with the National Lumber Manufacturers Association, have endorsed a quota request sent to President Kennedy.

Student Poll Shows Porter Holds Lead

EUGENE (AP) — A telephone poll by political science students at the University of Oregon has shown that former Rep. Charles O. Porter holds a substantial lead in Lane County in the race for the Democratic nomination for 4th District Congressman, a Young Democratic official said Tuesday.

Brian Hodges, chairman of the 4th Congressional District council of the Oregon Young Democrats, said the poll was conducted by a bipartisan group.

He said 41 per cent of those asked said they favored Porter, who is from Eugene.

State Sen. Robert Straub, Springfield was liked by 35 per cent of those polled, Hodges said, and Speaker of the House Robert Duncan was favored by 12 per cent.

Seven per cent were for Pat Flynn, Eugene, the fourth entry in the race, while 5 per cent were undecided, Hodges said.

He said the poll takers made calls to every precinct in Lane County.

He said the independent Lumbermen's Economic Survival Committee, representing northwest sawmills which ship by water and rail, added its voice to the request for a quota curbing a meeting in Portland Tuesday.

James said a quota reduction based on 10 per cent of Canada's average lumber imports into the United States during the past 10 years would restore a market of at least one million board feet to West Coast sawmills.

"We no longer are talking about equal competition for American markets," James said. "Canada has cheapened its dollar to such an extent that American mills cannot compete. The Canadians have all the shipping advantages by rail and by vessel, lower costs of stumpage, labor and handling."

James said the United States should set a quota on Canadian lumber until the two nations negotiate terms under which lumbermen in both nations can share the U.S. market.
