

Pirates, Trojans In Split, Gutierrez Hurls No-Hitter

Rohalie Gutierrez tossed a no-hitter for the Glendale Pirates in the second game of a non-league doubleheader Friday to lead his team to a split with the invading Douglas Trojans.

Douglas made the most of eight hits and eight Glendale errors in the seven-inning opener to post a 6-1 win. The Pirates backed Gutierrez to the hilt for a 14-1 victory in the five-inning nightcap.

Gutierrez struck out 11 and walked four while holding the Trojans hitless. In control from start to finish, Gutierrez faced only 16 batters during the five inning tilt. Two runners were picked off base. Gutierrez started off with a bang striking out the side in the first two innings.

Trojans Win

In winning the opener the Trojans scored a single run in the first, two in the second and three in the fifth. Glendale's lone run came in the bottom of the second. Glendale broke loose for five runs in the first inning of the second game, then exploded for nine in the second frame. Douglas' run came in its half of the fifth.

Douglas drew first blood in the first game when Dan Withers singled and came around on a pair of Glendale miscues. The Trojans clinched the win in the second. Bruce Ledgerwood and Dick Davidson collected back-to-back singles. Ledgerwood scored on a fielder's choice and Archie Walker singled to bring Davidson home. Jerry Gausnell's double was the big blow in the fifth-inning rally.

Steve Walker pitched the win for the Trojans, limiting the Pirates to a lone run in the second on Bill Hubler's triple and Les Maschka's single.

Rally Begins

Glendale avenged the loss by trampling the Trojans in the second game. Chuck and Gary Tooley started the five-run first-inning rally with singles. Jim Redfield advanced the runners with a sacrifice and Hubler was hit by a pitcher's ball to lead the bases. Nick Derscheid singled to bring in the first run. Hubert Stewart connected for a two-bagger to account for two more runs. Derscheid scored on an error and Stewart came home on a wild pitch.

In the second Glendale's nine runs came on eight walks, two balks and a double by Hubler.

Drain's Warriors scored four times in the first inning to hand the host Pleasant Hill Hillbillies a 4-0 Emerald League setback Monday and earn a share of the conference championship.

The victory gives the Warriors an 11-3 final league record, the same as that sported by the McKenzie Eagles. Drain and McKenzie will stage a sudden-death play-off battle Tuesday. Arrangements for the playoff game will be made today.

To earn the tie for the title by winning the make up game the Warriors struck hard and fast in the first inning. Wes Anderson and Gary McDonald started the victory rally with walks. Gary Cox's sacrifice fly sent the runners to second and third.

Mike Blomberg singled to score Anderson and McDonald. Larry Johns followed with a triple which brought Blomberg home, then scored the fourth run on Claude Kruse's single. John Snead singled before the Hillbillies managed to put out the fire.

Drain's four runs in the first inning were enough to win the all-important game. Lefty Ran Cool limited the home team to three singles. Drain collected six hits off the combined offerings of Tom Jones and Mike Boggs—four of which the Warriors got in the first inning.

Tuesday when the Warriors and the Eagles meet it will be the third game of the season between the two. In a league doubleheader earlier in the season the two teams split. The winner of Tuesday's Playoff game will meet the winner of the Riddle-Henley game in the state A-2 quarterfinals.
