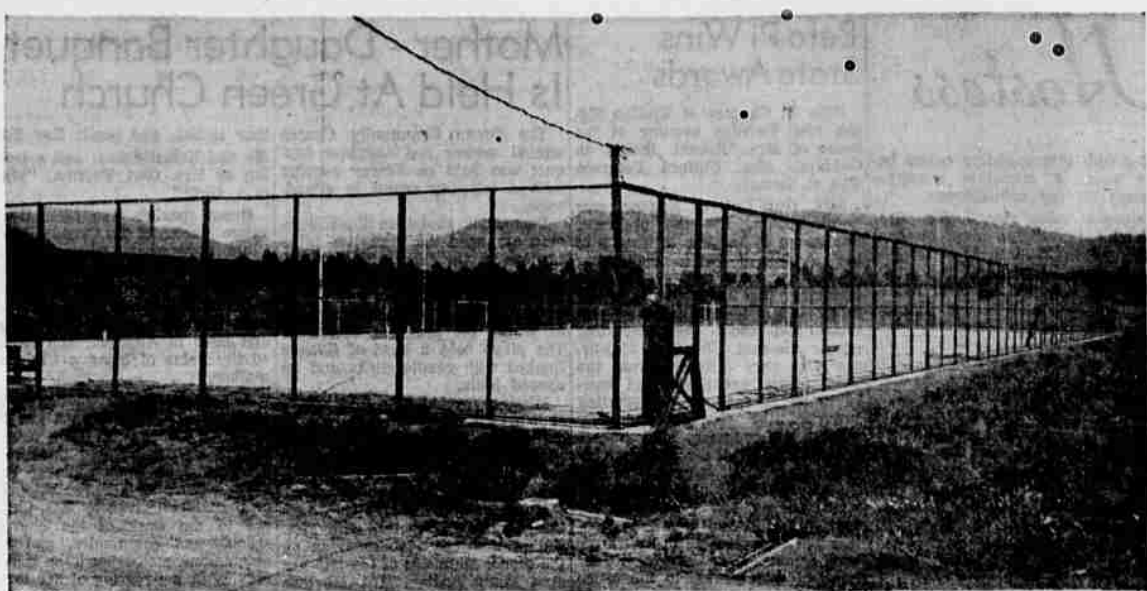

Grants Pass-Rogue River Highway Dedication June 1

A nine-mile section of the Pacific Freeway that sweeps through the picturesque Rogue River Valley will be opened to the motoring public June 1 when Gov. Mark O. Hatfield dedicates the Grants Pass-Evans Creek link of Interstate Highway 5.

This \$10 million section will connect Grants Pass and the city of Rogue River. It is the first freeway in Oregon highway history to have a continuous strip of concrete paving 24 feet wide with no "break" between the two 12-foot wide parallel lanes going in the same direction.

This unusually-wide paving is completed. The contractor, Peter Kiewit Sons Co., still has finishing touches, such as guardrails and signing to complete prior to the opening.

2.15 Miles Shorter
The new freeway section is 9.82 miles long, or 2.15 miles shorter than the old Pacific Highway that winds its way between Grants Pass and Rogue River. The biggest difference comes in time required to cover the distance. While the old route required 20 minutes of travel time, the new one avoids the congested developments between the two cities and requires only 9 minutes of travel.

The ribbon-cutting dedication ceremony will take place near the North Grants Pass Interchange at 11 a.m. PST. Glenn L. Jackson, Medford, chairman of the Oregon State Highway Commission, will preside over the ceremonies which will be climaxed by Governor Hatfield's official dedication of the new section. cluding Forrest Cooper, State Highway Engineer.

Other Sections Complete

Other sections of the Pacific Freeway are already completed on both ends of the Grants Pass-Evans Creek section. The new link will connect these and provide an uninterrupted freeway 24.23 miles long, making this the third longest single stretch of freeway in the state.

The longest continuous section of freeway is the 108 miles between Portland and Eugene, followed by the 33 miles between Portland and Bonville on Interstate 80N (US 30).

The new freeway will sweep above the picturesque Rogue River along much of its route, providing a view not possible from the old Pacific Highway located much lower along the bank of the river. Traffic going south will overlook Grants Pass and also will have a sweeping panoramic view of the mountainous terrain.

Southbound motorists will enter the new freeway at the foot of Sexton Mountain near Jumpoff Joe Creek north of Grants Pass. Traffic will return to the two-lane highway at Rock Point near Gold Hill.
