

Two Instructors At Glide Accepted For Peace Corps

Two Glide School instructors have been notified by the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. of their acceptance for the training program.

Jerry Lemert, upper elementary science instructor for the past four years, has been selected to participate in the Peace Corps project in Ethiopia with training to start June 25. It is expected he will teach science in that country.

Gene Rosaschi, high school world geography and journalism instructor during the past five years, will participate in the Nigeria project. His assignment, starting July 6, will be teaching geography and English. The new members of the Peace Corps, took their tests in Roseburg last fall.

Both men are to train at a U. S. University for a period of 7-9 weeks with possible additional training in Puerto Rico. Upon completion of successful training, they will be assigned to their respective countries.

Included in the training program will be intensive study of the countries covering the social customs,

language, history, geography, education and health, plus a refresher course in American history and culture.

Since Lemert has come to Glide, he inaugurated the annual school science fair. In recent weeks, the largest fair of this kind was held at Glide. Several of his students have won gold medals at the State Fair in Salem.

Rosaschi's efforts include the advising of the weekly high school newspaper and the school annual which received top national honors last fall. He is also the adviser and co-ordinator to Project 35 Glide High School's Mexico bound trip after school closes.

Days Creek Club Sets Flower Show

The Days Creek Garden Club will present its 14th annual flower show at the Canyonville Youth Center this Saturday, under the title of "Festival of Flowers," reports Mrs. Ralph Martin, correspondent. Individuals and organizations are invited to enter exhibits.

Displays by 4-H clubs, Boy Scouts, Camp Fire groups, federal and state Forestry Departments and nurseries are solicited. There will be a door prize.

Entries will be received from 8 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Saturday. No exhibits shall be removed before 4:30 p.m. Only one entry may be made in a class. All entries in horticulture classes must have been grown by the exhibitor and should be correctly labeled as to name of variety, if possible. However, entries will not be disqualified if not so labeled. Exhibitors must supply containers (pop bottles preferred) for all horticultural exhibits. Arrangements should be made stable enough to be moved easily. Owner's name should be taped on bottom of containers used for arrangements.

All precautions possible will be taken but the club cannot assume responsibility for personal injury, or loss of property by breakage or theft.

Late entries may be displayed but not judged. Show will not be judged by qualified flower show judges.

Entries may be made in any of the three divisions, horticultural, junior horticultural and artistic arrangement.

The horticultural division will include roses, lilies and other flower specimens as well as house plants and flowering vines or shrubs.

The junior horticultural division will include, besides single specimen entries, a division for miniature arrangements for children in the 5 to 12 and the 13 to 18 age brackets.

The artistic arrangement division will include corsages.

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November Date Set For Teacher Meet

"Instructional Media" is the theme tentatively chosen for the annual Douglas County Teachers' Conference in November, Leland P. Linn, county director of education, has announced.

Since the federal government has appropriated \$32 million for the field of educational TV, that area will receive much emphasis at the conference, he said.

The conference will be Nov. 5 in the Winston-Dillard School District. Secondary teachers will meet in Douglas High School while elementary teachers will meet in the Winston Upper Elementary School.

Further plans will be made by the committee during a meeting scheduled for June 5.

Speakers Favor Development Of Dunes Under Park Service

The Oregon dunes area could best be served by creating a National Seashore park under the National Parks Service in the National Park Service, according to two speakers who discussed the controversial proposal at the Monday noon meeting of the Roseburg (area) Chamber of Commerce.

They were Mark Pike, Portland, supervisor of recreation planning, division of recreational resources of the National Parks Service, and J. Michael McCloskey, Northwest conservation representative, Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs, Eugene.

Two proposals are before Congress: the Sen. Neuberger bill would place the dunes area under the park service, and the Rep. Durno bill would designate a much smaller area administered under the National Forest Service. A speaker from the Siuslaw National Forest appeared about a year ago.

Pike traced briefly the history of the proposal. The National Park plan would place about 32 miles of beach area between Florence and Tenmile Creek, ranging from one to five miles in width and containing about 35,000 acres, into a park area. Of this, about 14,000 acres would be public land, 4,500 acres in lakes and the remainder in private ownership, according to Pike.

A survey authorized in 1955 and completed in 1959 studied 1,700 miles of Pacific Coast line, of which one area in Washington, three in California and the Dunes area in Oregon were recommended as parks, said Pike.

He stated he would like to clear up one misconception. It has been claimed establishment of a park would be like drawing a green curtain around the area. This, he emphasized, would be further from the truth. National parks are not established to keep people out but to preserve the land for recreational enjoyment.

Economic Advantages
Pike quoted figures to show eco-

omic advantages, which would increase the value of the land and development, the official was quoted as saying.

McCloskey said the property has become depreciated by poor use, until it has become a disgrace with litter of rubbish and use of the dunes as a bombing range. He was critical of Forest Service methods for improving recreational areas.

Establishing the area as a park would further give it a place on a map for tourist identification, he said.

Electronics Firm Picks Portland Site

PORTLAND (AP) — Electronic Specialty Co., a Los Angeles-based firm that recently bought Iron Fireman Co. of Portland, plans to build a quarter-million square foot aircraft components manufacturing plant in Portland. The Oregonian said in editions today.

The newspaper quoted an "official" close to the parent company as saying work is due to start June 1, and that final approval of the project will be given at a meeting of Electronics' board of directors next week.

The report said the plant will be erected on the Port of Portland industrial tract, adjacent to the International Airport's access route. The main building will be across the street from the main runway area, according to the report.

McCloskey in his discussion was more vociferous in his claims for advantages under the park service, maintaining this service was set up for administering recreational uses, whereas the forest service, he maintains is not.

He listed three main advantages: 1. The park service would give better assurance of development and preservation of the natural resources; 2. It would assure better recreational management, and it would greatly increase tourist use.

Encroachment Noted
He said there has been logging and highway encroachment of the dunes area. He claims also there has been a tendency to stabilize shifting dunes to a much greater extent than necessary. Both men were emphatic on this point. Pike claimed it would take 500 years to fill Cleowax Lake with sands, as feared by some people unless stabilization is accomplished.
