

House Votes Unchanged By JFK-AMA Exchange

WASHINGTON (AP)—The exchange of salutes by President Kennedy and the American Medical Association on health care for the aged has changed no votes where at the moment they count most—in the House Ways and Means Committee.

This was the consensus today of committee members on both sides of the dispute over providing hospital and nursing benefits for persons retired under Social Security.

The key vote by the committee on Kennedy's bill, which would provide such benefits and increase payroll taxes to pay for them, probably will come during the second week of June. The committee has had the measure under consideration for a year.

Thirteen of the committee's 25 votes would give the measure a favorable report and a fair chance of passage this year. Without a favorable committee action passage is still possible, but extremely doubtful.

While most members of the committee are not saying publicly where they stand, opponents appear to have an edge which could be overcome if as many as four uncommitted members decided to go along with the administration.

"I think we'll make it," one supporter said today. "But this will be decided by a one-vote margin."

More flatly, an opponent said, "It won't come out."

The House Republican whip, Rep. Leslie C. Arends of Illinois, said in an interview he wonders

whether Kennedy wants "a law on issue this year." Arends is not a member of the Ways and Means Committee, but he said he does not think the widely publicized pro and con rallies and programs of the past few days have had any effect on committeemen.

Liz Taylor's Rome Romance Draws Woman Solon's Blast

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Iris Blitch, Democrat, a grandmotherly congresswoman, says Elizabeth Taylor's romance with Richard Burton will hurt the U.S. foreign aid program and leave the Communists chuckling.

She denounced the actress and actor Tuesday in the House and said she hopes Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy will take the measures necessary to determine whether the two are ineligible for re-entry into this country on grounds of undesirability.

Miss Taylor, an English-born American citizen, has announced plans to divorce her fourth husband, singer Eddie Fisher. Burton is a Welshman, a British citizen, and has a British wife.

Burton and Miss Taylor are in Rome for filming of the motion picture "Cleopatra."

Mrs. Blitch said producers of the film have hurt the prestige of American womanhood abroad. She called the Roman affair "the world's most assiduously publicized piece of sexual vulgarity."

The 50-year-old congresswoman asked Congress to serve notice that Americans do not "condone such behavior by their nationals and those under their responsibility."

Driver Jailed In Lieu Of Fine

Ernest Arthur LeBoeuf, 30, of 1046 SE Stephens St., was fined \$45 and costs in Roseburg Municipal Court Tuesday after being found guilty on a charge of driving on a suspended driver's license.

The case was tried without jury before Municipal Judge Warren Woodruff.

LeBoeuf was lodged in jail in lieu of the fine. The defendant was charged in a Roseburg City Police complaint issued April 25. He pleaded innocent on arraignment May 15 and requested a court trial.

Also in Municipal Court Tuesday, Marianne Dubinsky of Rt. 1, Roseburg, was fined \$45 and costs after pleading guilty to a charge of failure to leave name and address at scene of an accident. The defendant was charged in a private complaint by Delores Britton.

The complaint stemmed from a traffic accident April 30.

Three Citations Follow Accident

Three citations were issued in connection with an accident Tuesday afternoon at the intersection of SE Stephens St. and SE Mosher Ave.

Roseburg City Police said the accident involved a 1961 pickup driven by Judy J. Perrine, 24, of 1128 SE Stephens St., and a 1962 four-door sedan driven by Mary Ann Walker, 48, of 866 SE Pine St.

Investigating officers said the pickup was traveling north on Stephens and the car east on Mosher when the vehicles collided at the intersection. There were no reported injuries.

Robert Keith Presnall, 43, of Sutherlin, was cited for making a false statement in connection with the collision. Officers said Presnall professed to be the driver of the pickup at the time of the investigation, but later admitted Judy Perrine was driver.

Judy Perrine was cited for driving a vehicle without an operator's license and failure to leave name and address at scene of an accident. Presnall told officers he made the false statement because the woman had no driver's license.

The two were released from custody after posting a total \$205 in bail bond.

The vehicles were removed by Billy Mohr and Walt's towing services.

Ronnie Upright, 16, of 34 SE Pearce Rd., was cited for violation of the basic rule on control by Roseburg City Police Tuesday following an accident near the intersection of SE Rose St. and SE Cass Ave.

Police said the youth lost control of his car, a 1951 sedan, while turning a corner and his vehicle crashed into a 1952 sedan owned by William Everett Hogan of 1346 NE Fremont Ave. Upright and two passengers in his car were not injured.

Officers said all three cars were located in the Roseburg area where they had been abandoned.

Vehicles owned by James Wesley Owens of Rt. 1, Sutherlin, and Aubrey Henderson of Winston were driven off the parking lot at National Plywood. The third vehicle was reported missing by the Wesley Childers of Winston.

Reedsport Committee Okays \$118,704 Annual Budget

A city budget for the 1962-63 fiscal year within the six per cent limitation was approved by the City of Reedsport Budget Committee Monday night. General fund estimates total \$118,704, an increase of \$12,004 over the general fund budgeted for the current year.

Increases are for city payroll costs, including provisions for employing an additional city patrolman. The additional salary will be partially offset by the relief officer pay necessary at present. The city police force consists of the police chief, listed on the budget as city marshal, an assistant marshal or police sergeant, and two deputy marshalls or patrolmen.

Hourly wage rate of 20 cents per hour were approved with salary increases approved on an eight per cent basis. Some city employees, such as the police department office employees, have not received wage increases in four years.

A \$65,500 water department budget was approved; \$8,000 general building fund estimates and \$2,750 Community Building fund estimates.

State gasoline tax sources provide for the street fund, estimated at \$25,500. Sewer bond retirement expenditures of \$56,897.59 will complete the retirement of the entire sewer bond issue and will represent the final installment on general obligation indebtedness.

The outstanding indebtedness will be the revenue water bonds following next year's sewer bond payment.

Budget committee members were Mayor Jack Unger, councilmen Paul Hucker, Jack Dunn, Lin Swain, Dr. Jason Boe, Gordon Murphy and Grover Woods; budget members Paul Love, Wes Hillier, Ben Gawley, Jim McCulloch, George Williams and Bill Humphreys.

Thomas Floyd Cantrell of Ramp Rd. appeared for preliminary hearing Tuesday afternoon in Douglas County District Court. Judge Gerald R. Hayes ordered that Cantrell be held to answer to the complaint.

The defendant is accused of taking a shirt from a dwelling house at 1354 SE Pine St. According to the complaint, the shirt belonged to Jim Boaz.

Cantrell is being held in custody under \$500 bail.

Marcus James Mack, 31, of Merlin, pleaded innocent Tuesday in District Court to a complaint charging unlawful possession of firearms. The case was set for trial by jury on April 28.

Mack was charged with unlawful possession of a revolver which police authorities found in his automobile. Bail was set at \$150.

Also in District Court Tuesday, Johnny Wilford Houser, 19, of Roseburg, was fined \$25 after pleading guilty to a charge of angling for game fish without a license. A Roseburg state police complaint charged Houser with fishing without a license May 14 on the North Umpqua River.

Students Hear Gagarin

TOKYO (AP)—Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin delivered an uneventful hour-long address today at Waseda University, where leftist students badgered U.S. Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy last February.

Gagarin, 34, was the first man to travel in space. He was launched on a 15-minute mission April 12, 1961, aboard the Vostok 1 spacecraft.

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Game Commission Eyes Deer Season

PORTLAND (AP)—The state Game Commission is considering today whether to open the deer season in August or October.

Both proposals were before the commission at a public hearing Tuesday. The commission continued the hearing today, and delayed any decision until the end of the month.

The proposal for an August opening was for Western Oregon only. Foresters said it should be cancelled if fire conditions are hazardous.

There also were recommendations for statewide openings on Oct. 1 and Oct. 6.

A number of lumbermen urged the commission to authorize the killing of more deer and elk. They said it would cut down on tree damage. Some sportsmen's organizations, however, opposed that suggestion.

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
