

Patched-Up Reds Whip Houston 9; Dodgers, Giants Collect Victories

A week-hitting second baseman flashing a big stick, a parttimer plugging the shortstop hole and a guy nobody wanted filling a complete vacuum at third — and Cincinnati's problem-plagued Reds suddenly have started to act like defending National League champions.

The patchwork trio — Don Blasingame, Leo Cardenas and Don Zimmer — collected nine of Cincinnati's 14 hits Thursday night as the streaking Reds whipped Houston 9-0 behind Joey Jay's six-hitter and coasted to their ninth victory in 12 games.

Raised Mark
Benched earlier with a .219 batting average, Blasingame has raised his mark to .284. Cardenas has taken hold at short and is hitting at a respectable .270 clip.

Zimmer, who went to the New York Mets in the draft was acquired in a trade and now has been installed at third.

While the Reds were solving their problems, league-leading San Francisco regained its hitting touch when Willie Mays came out of the bench, powered homers No. 12 and 13 and led the Giants to a 7-4 conquest of Philadelphia. Los Angeles' Dodgers remained a game and a half back by beating the Mets 4-2. Pittsburgh defeated St. Louis 5-2 and Chicago's Cubs edged Milwaukee 4-3.

Yanks Win

In the American League, the first-place New York Yankees belted Kansas City 9-4, Boston knocked off Minnesota 7-5, Detroit nipped Baltimore 5-4 in 11 innings and the Los Angeles Angels beat Washington 7-4. Cleveland and Chicago were not scheduled.

Blasingame had two singles, a double and a triple; Cardenas a double and run-scoring single, and Zimmer a double and two singles.

Morgan said prizes will be awarded to visitors with the most novel attire. All lifts, including the new Riblet double-chair, will be operating full time through the entire weekend, he reported.

Bachelor Butte is perhaps the most ideal location in the northwest for late season skiing. Morgan explained, with the area's geographical location on the east side of the Cascades.

Sunshiny spring days with temperatures in the 70's and 80's combined with excellent snow conditions have made skiers almost as easy to acquire as an exhilarating sweep down the timbered hills, Morgan said. Last year nearly three-quarters of the several thousand visitors picked up healthy suntans by wearing shorts and swimwear on their final dashes down the slopes, he added.

Fish Outlook Told For Season Opening

Spring chinook angling is fair to good on the North Umpqua at Winchester and Idleyd areas but slow on the main river.

Trout angling is fair to good at Lemolo reservoir. Trout angling should be only fair at Diamond Lake on opening day, Saturday. Roads, campground, ramps, and other facilities are all open and in operation. Trout angling which opens Saturday should be fair to good on the North and South Forks of the Umpqua, Calapooya Creek, Cow Creek, and Little River as all have been stocked.

Lower Umpqua streams are clear and angling should be good for opening weekend. Best bet should be Smith River in the Halfway-Big Creek area due to planted trout. Loon Lake and Tenmile Creek trout angling is good.

Lots of stripers are in the lower Umpqua River but biting slow. Warmer weather and clear water should improve success. A few Salmon have been taken on the Winchester Bay bar.

Major tributaries of the Coos and Coquille rivers have received substantial plants of legal trout during the past two weeks. The South Fork of the Coquille should be good between Powers and Rock creek. The Middle Fork of the Coquille is expected to be best between Camas Valley and Remote. The East Fork of the Coquille should be good between Sitkum and Dora.

The North Fork of the Coquille should produce best above La Verne park. South Coos river should be good up to Fall Creek and the Millieoma River will be good in the area above Nesika park.
