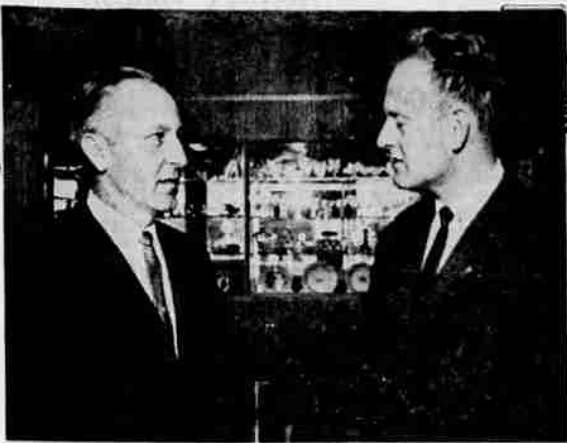

Sutherlin Board Hears Report On High School

The report of the visiting committee for Sutherlin High School was heard by the school board at a special meeting of the board, reports Mrs. Jerry DeMuth, correspondent.

Two full years of work have gone into this comprehensive study of the high school, the curriculum, the students, and the staff, according to Supt. Raymond A. Mullen.

Presentation of the report was given by Archie McCrae, high school principal, and two members of his staff. Praise was given to staff members for their cooperation and to the Board of Education for its support of curriculum improvement in the high school.

Deficient areas, in terms of state standards, were attributed to the shortage of available tax support within the school district. Curriculum was noted as a major area for improvement. Staff members in the fields of English and social studies have been assigned tasks of detailing improvements in these fields during the summer.

Shortages of curriculum materials or outdated materials were also listed as a major deficiency in the study.

Inadequacies in the building structure for the instructional areas will be highlighted further through the board-authorized study of capital outlay expenditures during the coming school year. Specifically mentioned were the unsatisfactory conditions in the physical educational facilities. A recommendation to implement the original plans for the completion of the high school building was made by the visiting committee.

Sutherlin High School is now eligible to apply for membership in the Northwestern Association for Secondary School Evaluations. A decision will be made later, by the School Board, whether to activate the application or not. Since the standards for such a membership are lower than that which the school has now met, no difficulty is anticipated if the board elects to make application.

Wash. Man Admits Burglary At Curtin
