Billy Casper Takes '500' Open While 'King' Arnold Relaxes

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — When the king of golf is away, the gang will play—and profitably, too.

In the absence of Arnold Palmer, priming for the U.S. Open, Billy Casper, Sunday won the \$50,000 "500" Festival Open with a record-smashing 264 total, 20 strokes under par.

Along with Casper, runner-up to Palmer in this year's PGA money-winning list, no fewer than five other golfers shattered the Speedway tourney record of 270 set by Doug Ford in 1960.

Ford, seeking a third straight Speedway title, didn't do so well. His 277 put him in a six-way tie for 29th and earned him only \$291.

The hot-shooting Casper's \$9,000 take swelled his 1962 purse to \$41,208.

It seemed for a few minutes in

the Speedway that a sudden death playoff might be in order. Jerry Steelsmith and husky George Bayer each stormed to a 19-under-par finish with closing eagle three just ahead of Casper, last to play.

But Casper birdied the 71st hole to go 19 under par and then came up with another birdie on the last hole for his closing 64.

Bayer, whose last victory was in the 1960 St. Petersburg Open, delighted the crowd with a 20-foot eagle putt for the day's best round, an 8-under-par 63. Steel-smith finished with 64, matching Bayer at 265. Each collected \$3,800.

Sharing fourth place at 268 were Bruce Crampton and Bill Collins, each getting \$2,450, while Dave Ragan took \$2,100 with his sixth-spot 269.

Alou's Key Punching Aids In SF Triumphs

Felipe Alou didn't throw any haymakers in that big brawl at San Francisco's Candlestick Park, but he did do some key punching where it counted—at the plate.

Alou combined with Orlando Cepeda and Willie Mays, main eventers in the wild-swinging fight, to produce a flurry of telling hits as the Giants routed New York's last-place Mets Sunday 7-1 and 6-5 and protected their National League lead over the sizzling Los Angeles Dodgers.

Felipe batted in three runs in each game, collected five hits, scored three times and stole three bases. He was the clutch man in the Giants' winning four-run rally in the eighth inning of the second game, singling in Mays and Cepeda, then coming around with the clincher on a wild pitch, a steal of third and a passed ball.

Cepeda had five hits, one RBI and three runs scored. Mays registered four hits, one RBI and scored four. When the dust had settled, the Giants had their fifth successive victory and the sizzling Mets' loss string had been extended to eight.

In Los Angeles, the Dodgers kept 1½ games back of the Giants and ran their winning streak to eight with a sweep over Philadelphia, 5-2 and 2-1. Cincinnati took over third place by winning its fourth in a row, 10-0 over Chicago, behind the four-hit pitching of Bob Purkey. Milwaukee edged St. Louis 4-3, and Pittsburgh trimmed Houston's error-plagued Colts 7-2.

Cleveland Leads

Cleveland took a half-game lead in the American League with a 5-3 victory over Washington while New York split with Detroit, win-

ning the first 4-1 and losing the second 5-1. Minnesota moved into a virtual tie with the Yankees with a sweep over Chicago 5-4 and 8-6; Kansas City and Los Angeles divided a pair, the A's taking the opener 3-2 and the Angels winning the second game 5-3; and Baltimore beat Boston 4-2 in 11 innings.

Winner Jack Sanford and relief star Stu Miller checked the Mets on five hits in the opener at San Francisco and Jim Duffalo won the same game in relief. Roger Craig and Craig Anderson were losing pitchers.

Tim Lincecum struck the winning blow for the Dodgers in their second game with a bases-loaded single after two were out in the bottom of the ninth, giving Righthander Don Drysdale his 12th straight victory over the Phillies. Drysdale (7-3) pitched an eight-inning tight shutdown with Art Mahaffey.

Frank Howard was the key hitter in the opener with three singles and a triple and three runs batted in. The huge outfielder also committed an unusual base-running error, failing to touch third and being declared out on a homer by John Roseboro. Stan Williams was the winning pitcher with last-out relief from Ron Perranoski.

Purkey won for the eighth time in nine decisions by holding Chicago to four singles in Cincinnati's runaway. The ace right-hander yielded only two hits and a walk through eight innings, then two singles in the ninth as the Reds continued their climb by taking the 12th of their last 15 starts. They bombed Don Cardwell and two successors for 14 hits, including homers by Vada Pinson and Gordie Coleman in a six-run fourth inning.

Milwaukee bunched its four runs in the fifth inning and held on for its close one over St. Louis. The Cards got to winner Bob Shaw for a run in the ninth when Ken Boyer tripled and Carl Sawatski singled, but Stan Musial killed the rally by grounding into a double play.

The Braves hammered Bob Gibson in the fifth as Eddie Mathews singled, Hank Aaron doubled and Mack Jones doubled—all following two walks after two were out. Pittsburgh put together a five-run sixth inning with the help of Houston's erratic fielding in whipping the Colts. Vern Law pitched an eight-inning for the Pirates, who took advantage of five Houston errors and racked up five unearned runs.

Liberal Deer, Elk Seasons Await Hunters Under Tentative Ruling By Commission

Big game hunters will again enjoy liberal deer and elk seasons this fall under tentative regulations approved by the commission last week following an all-day public hearing.

A reduction in antelope tags for this year's hunt was given approval in addition to an increase in the number of permits to be issued for the unit deer seasons.

Tentative regulations adopted by the commission call for an antelope hunt scheduled Aug. 25 through 29 with 600 tags to be issued for the six antelope hunting areas. However, no antelope hunting would be allowed in the Interstate and Klamath units.

The general buck deer season would begin on Sept. 29 and extend through Oct. 21, and the permit season for antlerless deer from Oct. 6 through Oct. 21. General season tag holders would be allowed buck deer with visible antlers east of the Cascades and not less than forked horns west of the Cascades.

A total of 136,100 antlerless permits would be issued, an increase of 7,200 permits over last year. Three extended deer hunts would be on tap, taking in most agricultural areas in the Willamette Valley, orchard areas around Hood River and The Dalles, and orchard lands along the South Fork of the Walla Walla River.

Hunters eager to take two deer during the season would have 24 controlled hunting areas in which to try their luck. Just over 23,000 controlled season tags would be issued with season dates for the hunts varying from early September through late November.

Elk hunters would have a similar season to last year, with the coastal hunts scheduled from Oct. 27 extending through Nov. 9, and the rest of the state from October 27 extending through Nov. 25. Bull elk with antlers longer than the ears would be the bag limit in the coast, Cascades, and northeastern Oregon management units, while either-sex elk would be allowed in southeastern Oregon units.

The Clatsop area would be hunted on a permit basis only, the same as last year, with 5,000 permits to be issued. A five-day hunt would be allowed in the Wilson unit with 600 permits to be issued. These permit hunts would allow the taking of bull elk only. In addition to these two permit hunts, 22 additional permit hunts would be allowed in areas and units along the coast and game management units in eastern Oregon. As was the case last year, hunters who applied for elk permits in areas where no other elk hunting is allowed and are unsuccessful in obtaining a permit would be eligible for refund on their elk tag.

Archers received a break in both deer and elk hunting with 11 areas open for early and late hunts. Eastern and Western Oregon management units would again be opened as last year in addition to the old stand-bys of Hart Mountain, Canyon Creek, Malheur, and others. Archers would also be allowed a long season for deer and elk in the Clatsop and Coquille agricultural areas extending from late December into March.

Bear Classified

The commission classified the bear to be a game animal in all National Forest areas between highway 97 and 59, and within one mile of the Rogue River between Graven Creek and Astoria. Open season would be Sept. 1 through Dec. 15 with a bag limit of one bear.

Important changes in the general hunting regulations would require big game hunters to bring out the entire head of deer, elk and antelope. The head would be in possession of the hunter while in the field, forests, or on any highway or road in the state.

Another change would require a big game hunter to not only validate his big game tag in the customary manner upon killing any big game animal but also to write in the date, species, and county of kill in the space provided on the back of his hunting license.
