Survey Shows Many On Welfare Without High School Diplomas

A survey by the state Public Welfare Commission has revealed that 55 per cent of wage earners in Douglas County receiving aid-to-dependent children-unemployed, have an eighth grade education or less.

This was told in a survey of Douglas, Linn and Marion counties conducted the last week of April. The study was made of 159 cases from a total of 332 families receiving such assistance in the three counties.

The survey determined that the greatest bulk of those aided by the program have been residents of the state for three or more years.

In Douglas County it was found that 58 per cent of the potential wage earners on ADC-Un were 35 years old or younger. A majority of the men were mill workers and

loggers. Jack Summerfield, Douglas County welfare administrator, said 20 per cent of those on emergency general assistance in the three counties were also studied. Again the great bulk of persons receiving aid were residents of Oregon for three years or longer. Among 133 cases, 44 families received such aid the previous year.

Also it was found in this group that half had less than an eighth grade education.

In Douglas County the age group was lower than in Marion or Linn counties.

Summerfield said this may be attributed to the fact that the median age level in the county is lower because the lumber economy requires younger people.

Air At Newport Now Odor-Free

NEWPORT (AP) — A busload of Chamber of Commerce members and Georgia-Pacific Corp. representatives went on a tour Monday to spread the word that the Newport air is once again free of odor from Georgia-Pacific's Toledo pulp mill.

A noon visit with Portland Chamber of Commerce representatives was to be followed by an afternoon visit with Gov. Mark Hatfield at Salem.

John Sutton, Newport Chamber of Commerce president, said elimination of the pulp mill odor—which had threatened to cut into the tourist business—was evidence that industry and tourism can go together.

He said the odor was eliminated as a result of considerable hard work both by local interests and the company.

Noted California Author To Visit, Speak At Roseburg VA Hospital

Dr. William R. Parker, noted author and associate professor of speech at the University of Redlands in California, will visit Roseburg this week under auspices of the U.S. Veterans Administration Hospital.

Following arrival in the city Wednesday night, Dr. Parker will move into a 2-day speaking schedule that will include talks before the hospital staff, ministers and the general public.

At 10 a.m. (Pacific Standard Time) Thursday the widely-recognized authority on speech correction will address hospital staff members and Roseburg ministers on the topic "Power of Prayer." The public is invited to hear this talk, which will be presented in the music room of the Recreation Building.

Closed Meeting Set

Members of the Roseburg Ministerial Association will hear Dr. Parker at a closed meeting slated at 12:30 p.m. At 3 p.m. he appears on a local television program "Talk of the Town."

Dr. Parker's Thursday schedule concludes with an appearance at 8 p.m. in the Roseburg Methodist Church. This program is also open to the public. The speaker's topic

for this occasion will be "Prayer Therapy—It's Use in the Family." Arrangements are being completed by the Rev. J. James Jenkins, Methodist minister.

Friday morning from 8 until noon the Californian will confer with the various professional

groups assigned to the veteran hospital. At 1 p.m. he will be at the First Christian Church to address a gathering of Roseburg ministers and their wives. His topic will be "Ministers' Mental Health."

Dr. Parker winds up his Roseburg schedule with a talk at 3 p.m. for ministers on the subject: "The Place of Ministers in the Prayer Therapy Group."

A text book by Dr. Parker published in 1951, "Pathology of Speech," was a top seller on the West Coast and is regarded by publishers as the most popular work on speech correction yet written. Another of his books, "Prayer Can Change Your Life," was published in 1957.

Dr. Parker bases his speech therapy on the premise that many speech defects in individuals have psychological roots.

As part of his university work Dr. Parker provides clinical experience for his graduate students through actual work in helping children regain normal speech habits.

Dr. Parker received his A.B. degree in 1939 and his M.A. in 1941 from the University of Redlands and his Ph.D. from USC in 1951.



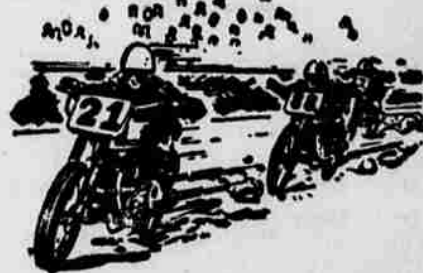

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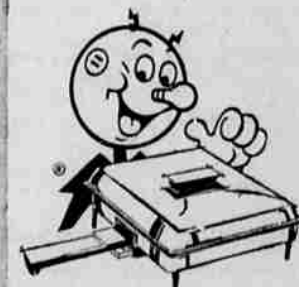
