

Eichmann Seeks U. N. Help To Keep Him Off Gallows

JERUSALEM (AP)—Adolf Eichmann is seeking United Nations and West German help to save him from an Israeli gallows.

Sources said Eichmann pleaded with his defense counsel, Dr. Robert Servatius, to petition the United Nations and Bonn to intervene on his behalf. Servatius said he would, but cautioned the former Gestapo colonel that he might be executed before either body could act.

Eichmann reportedly replied that he would rather be executed than spend the rest of his life in

Summer Program Registration Friday

Salmon Harbor Produces Fish

All at once the salmon are in! Harry Ludwig, manager of Salmon Harbor reports that all but one of the boats going out Memorial Day came back with their limits. Up to Wednesday, Ludwig said, only three salmon had been caught during the season.

Morning and afternoon fishing were equally good, Ludwig said—mostly silvers, with a few Chinook being taken.

The fish apparently had been waiting for good weather. According to Ludwig, Wednesday was a perfect day at the coast — blue skies, hardly any wind and no fog. He said the fish are close in because of plenty of feed in the area. Sturgeon fishing at the mouth of the Umpqua River was good, too, but striped bass fishing was slow, Ludwig said.

Policeman Resigns

Chief of Police John H. Truett has announced the resignation from the police force of Ray Cleveland, effective as of May 26. Cleveland had been with the force about a year.

Chief Truett said applications are being taken for a replacement, but that preference will be given men in the police reserve if they apply and are qualified.

Rescuers Find Body Of Young Mine Victim

GHOST PINE CREEK, Alta. (AP)—A mother's vigil, a father's hope ended when their 4-year-old son was found dead Wednesday night 34 hours after he tumbled into an abandoned mine shaft.

Rescue workers found the body of Kenny Kowalchuk caught between the steps of a mine ladder 54 feet below the surface. His head was buried in loose earth and the two-man team said the chubby dark-haired boy appeared to have suffocated. He also had broken bones.

Mine officials believed his fall started a trickle of loose earth that eventually buried him.

The body was raised gently to the surface in the bucket of a power shovel. Unknown to officials, the mother was in the hushed crowd at the pithead. She rushed forward just as the bucket was lowered to the ground. A policeman restrained her while the body was taken to a funeral home at nearby Three Hills.

Faint cries of "Daddy, Daddy," soon after Kenny plunged through the weak earth and timber covered shaft Tuesday raised hopes that the boy would be found alive. But the shaft soon fell silent, and the last hours were spent in grim realization of what lay ahead.

Kenny's father wandered aimlessly around the scene as rescue workers dug deeper and finally shattered his hope.

Some of Kenny's 11 brothers and sisters took up the grim vigil at varying times. Speaking of the shaft, one said, "Nobody knew better than Mom and Dad how dangerous it was."

Yoncalla Board Hears Reports

It's Back To Work For Carpenter Today

LANGLEY AIR FORCE BASE, Va. (AP)—It was back to work today for astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter.

Today's schedule called for the Navy lieutenant commander to join his fellow astronauts and Project Mercury officials in a study and evaluation of the films Carpenter took during America's second orbital flight last week.

Carpenter, his wife and four children arrived at their home here Wednesday night after a flight from Denver, where earlier on Memorial Day the Colorado-born spaceman had wound up a three-day visit to his home state.

By Saturday morning, all seven

astronauts are scheduled to be at this air force base to receive awards from several civic groups on Virginia's lower peninsula.

Walter C. Williams, Project Mercury operations director and Lt. Col. John S. Powers, the project's public information officer, arrived in advance of Carpenter to be ready for the film-evaluation study.

There was no indication how long Carpenter and his fellow spacemen would remain here.

Carpenter indicated Wednesday he hoped to return to Boulder, Colo., his hometown, early next month — to deliver the commencement address June 7 at Boulder

High School, where he graduated in 1943, and to speak the next day to the graduating class at the University of Colorado.

The climax to Carpenter's Colorado visit came as he rode at the head of a Memorial Day parade through Denver before a crowd estimated at 300,000—one of the largest in the state's history. Powers said it was the biggest crowd to greet an astronaut outside of New York City.

Some three hours before the Denver celebration, Carpenter said goodbye to his mother, Florence Carpenter, at Boulder.

Graham Pleads For America To Recover Lost Frontiers

CHICAGO (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham pleaded Wednesday for America to recover its lost frontiers while pursuing new frontiers.

Some 33,500 persons heard Graham say that there are some things which cannot be discarded just because they are old.

"We do not discard the multiplication table because it is old," he said. "Neither should we discard moral laws because they are old."

The Southern Baptist preacher spoke in the arena of McCormick Place, a vast exposition center on the lake front near the downtown district.

Another 5,000 persons were attending a Metropolitan Opera performance in a theater in the 11-acre building.

Crusade officials said it was the largest opening night crowd the 43-year-old evangelist has addressed since he began his "Crusades for Christ" in 1946. The crusade continues in Chicago through June 17.

"There has never been a time when there was more humanitarian effort, more good and more interest in religion and social justice than there is today," he said. "But our best does not seem good enough to halt the rising tide of greed, lust, hatred, prejudice and war."

"We have forgotten how to blush in America," and the nation is no longer shocked at crime, wickedness and scandal, he said.

Graham emphasized racial strife as one of mankind's sins and said, "Chicago is one of the cities in the United States that is a racial tinder box."

The answer to racial strife, as well as to other sins, he said, is in the Bible. He said that love cannot be legislated but that he favors legislation in the achievement of racial equality.

He termed sex and television the gods which many worship today and lamented the lack of Bible-reading and praying.

The lost frontiers to which people need to return, he said, are: the Ten Commandments as a basis for our moral life; a new sense of sovereignty and power of God; recognition that Christ demands lordship in every department of our lives, and a deeper realization

of a personal encounter with Christ.

Crusade officials estimated that 450 persons made "decisions for Christ" when called upon to do so by Graham at the end of his sermon.

Judge Turns Down Defendant's Bid

Walter Hazard Browning, 44, of Rt. 1, Myrtle Creek, was denied court-appointed counsel on appearance Tuesday in Douglas County District Court in connection with a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses.

His application for court counsel was turned down by Circuit Judge Charles Woodrich. Woodrich ruled that the defendant has assets with which to employ counsel.

A complaint dated May 22, 1962, charges Browning with presenting a worthless \$20 check at Drive-N-Save Market in exchange for merchandise and cash.

Hartfiel Appointed

Gerald Nixon, 64, of 559 W. Umpqua St., appeared for arraignment before District Judge Gerald R. Hayes and asked to have an attorney appointed. Thomas Hartfiel was appointed through Circuit Court.

Also, an attorney, Paul Geddes was appointed to represent Dale Noland Lee, 42, Florence, who faces a charge of larceny over \$75. Arraignments of Nixon and Lee were postponed until they could consult with their attorneys.

James L. Rose, 64, Myrtle Creek, appeared before Judge Hayes on a sodomy charge. He was bound over to the Grand Jury and released in \$2,000 bail.

In Circuit Court, Larry L. Parker, 22, Portland, pleaded innocent before Judge Charles S. Woodrich to non-support, after waiving Grand Jury action and appearing on the district attorney's information. His trial was set for 10 a.m. July 10.

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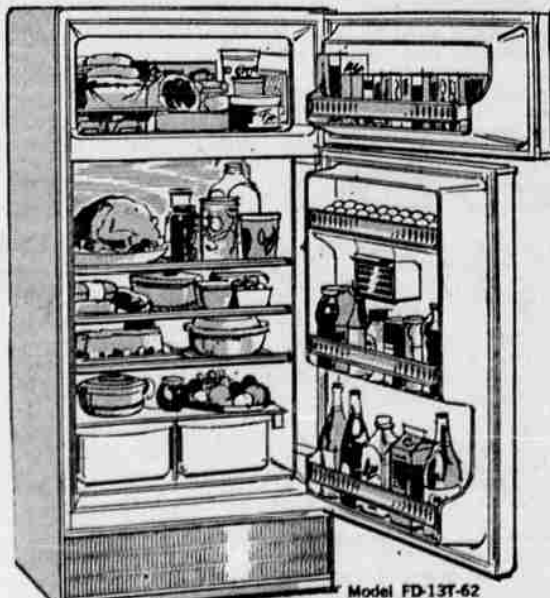
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
