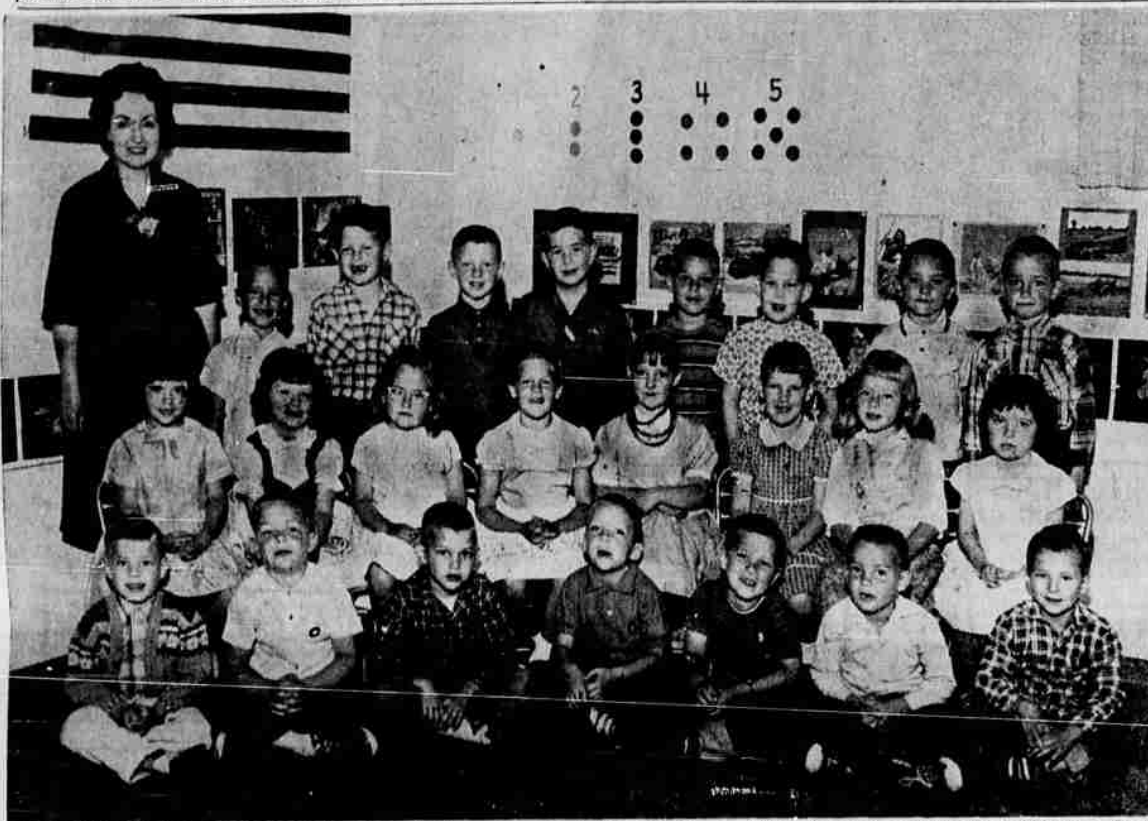

PORTLAND (AP)—Gov. Mark Hatfield says he wants farmers to get more consideration in future road-building in Oregon.

"Too long we have built highways in this state purely on an engineering basis with no consideration for agriculture," the governor told the Pacific Seedmen's Association Monday.

"Too often we have built our roads along a straight line which cut through rich fields when an arc would have avoided those fields."

"I am hopeful that in the future we will build highways in all our land for purposes of the highest value," he said.
