

New Space Age In Education May Come To Roseburg With Fall Term

A new "space age" in education may come to Roseburg this fall. As a participant in the Oregon Program, the Roseburg School District in the next school year would embark on an experimental voyage designed to improve classroom instruction and teacher education.

Several startling changes in instruction technique are in prospect. New terms like "team teaching," "material aids center" and teacher "interns" will doubtless confuse patrons at first.

The Ford Foundation, through the Oregon Program, is making funds available to school districts willing to venture into the wilderness of new educational concepts. Many of the streamlined techniques which may be tried here in the next few years have worked successfully in other parts of the nation.

Time Saved

"The Oregon Program represents directions in which Oregon wants to go, regardless of foundation support will save us a generation of time," a state education leader recently pointed out.

Roseburg district anticipates receipt of about \$62,000 over the four-year program period but proposes

to augment this allocation with new and redeployed local budget funds.

Administrators prefer a slow and gradual entry into the program, but several important preparatory steps will be taken in the first year.

First, the district will step up its teacher training program in light of new instructional objectives. Eighteen teachers and administrators will attend a University of Oregon workshop during the next school year. Several administrators and teachers will visit schools where team teaching and intern systems are already in operation.

Plan Deferred

The district will employ college graduates as interns. The internship plan, however, will not be introduced until 1963-64. At that time the district plans to place eight interns at the elementary level and eight at the secondary level. The number of interns will increase each year.

A team teaching approach to mathematics will be introduced at Roseburg High School this fall. The upper cafeteria in the Social Arts Building will be remodeled to provide one large room and two smaller rooms. The larger room will accommodate about 80 students,

and this unit will be devoted to instruction of the general subject matter.

The plan is to change the pattern of organization for some mathematics classes by scheduling about 75 students a period into classes which would be taught by a team of two teachers with the assistance of a clerical aide.

Organization Starts

George Larsen, mathematics department director, is organizing the changes.

It has also been suggested the team teaching auditorium might also be adapted for similar programs in foreign language and science.

Another innovation will be a material aids center for teacher use in preparing overlays and constructing teacher aids. This will be an idea center.

The district will continue with its in-service training program for teachers and this program will assume added importance in the years ahead. Key personnel delegated to attend the special university workshop will be utilized to train those teachers who do not attend.

A curriculum improvement program will be perpetuated, since the changes in instruction techniques will necessitate certain changes in curriculum.

Wallstreeters Prepare To End Hectic Week In Stock Markets

NEW YORK (UPI) — Wall Streeters prepared today to wind up one of the most frenzied weeks of trading in the stock market's history.

Two days of rising prices wiped out the \$20.8 billion in paper losses suffered in Monday's sell-off. A total of 10,710,000 shares were traded during Thursday's session.

Closing prices, available at 6:25 p.m., EDT, nearly two hours after the market closed, showed the averages up again.

Dow Jones' 30 industrial stocks stood at 613.36, up 9.40 points on the day. Standard and Poor's index of 500 stocks was 59.63 up 1.55.

On the basis of Standard and Poor's indexes, the gain in paper

values was just over \$8.1 billion Thursday. Stocks on the "Big Board" gained about \$13.5 billion Tuesday. Total gain for the two days was \$21.6 billion, wiping out Monday's loss of \$20.8 billion.

Most Issues Advance

Issues traded totaled almost as many as in Tuesday's trading, 1,357 against 1,399. Advances were recorded for 1,071 issues, 190 declined and 96 were unchanged. Only six of the issues reached new 1962 highs.

Thursday's volume had been surpassed only four times in the history of the New York Stock Exchange. Three of those days were during the bleak month of October in 1929 and the fourth was last Tuesday.

Monday, Tuesday and Thursday of this week were second only to Oct. 28-29-30 of 1929 in volume. In the earlier year 36,349,000

shares changed hands during the three days. This week the total was 34,810,000.

From Pine Street in San Francisco, LaSalle Street in Chicago and in the American Exchange across Trinity Churchyard at Hanover Place, the story was the same Thursday. Continued high volume and higher prices.

Orders To Members

In anticipation of another heavy day of trading today, the exchange board of governors took the unusual step of telling member organizations to have representatives on the trading floor Saturday — although there will be no trading — to clear up the loose ends left by the "short" week of hectic trading.

Member organizations were told to have at least one floor member and an "adequate number" of telephone clerks on the trading floor from 9:30 a.m., EDT, to at least 12:30 p.m. Similar orders went to specialist units.

Stock Exchange member organizations outside New York were told to staff wire connections and have their offices staffed. New York firms were told to pass along the orders to their out-of-town correspondents.

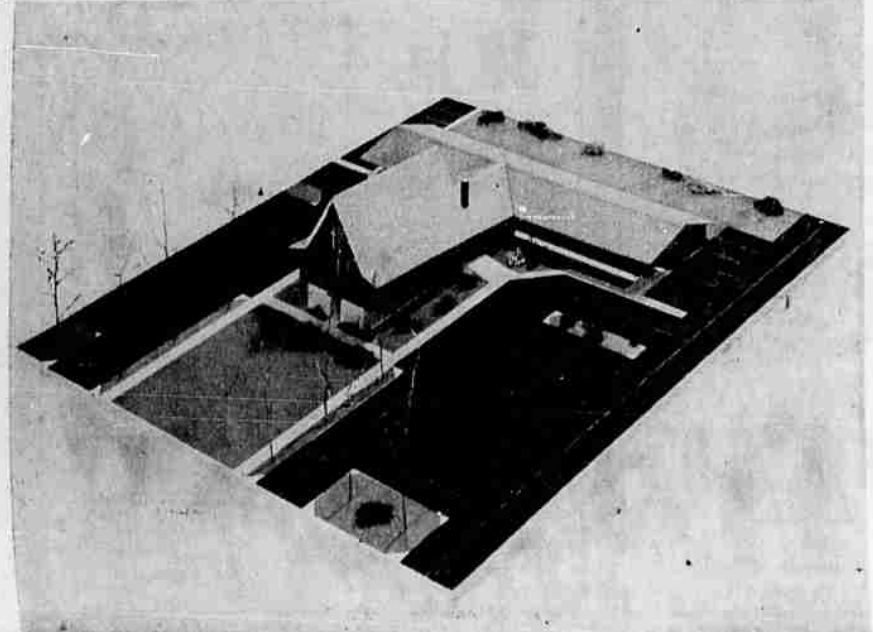
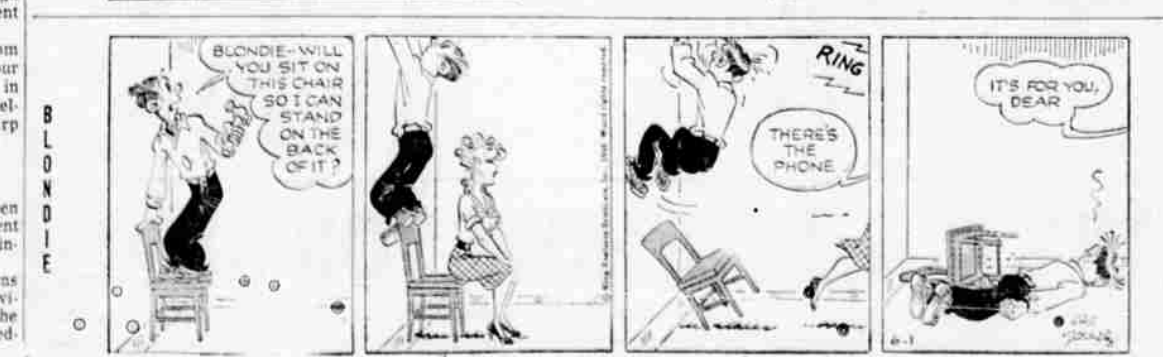

Bee Inspector Named

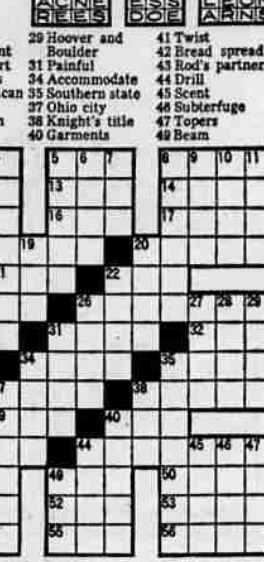
E. B. Shaw of Drain has been appointed by the state Department of Agriculture to conduct bee inspections in Douglas County.
