

Drain Set To Battle For A-2 Baseball Title

Drain's Warriors will tangle with the North Catholic Royals Saturday for the highest honor awarded in A-2 baseball — the state championship.

The Warriors and the Royals will square off in Portland's Multnomah Stadium at 7 p.m. (PDT). Preceding the A-2 battle at 5 will be a fight between the Condon Blue Devils and the defending champion Coburg Broncos for the state B crown. In the nightcap at 9 the South Eugene Axemen will be out to grab their second consecutive A-1 title in a game against the Hillsboro Spartans.

To reach the state playoffs Drain battled to a tie with the McKenzie Eagles for the Emerald League crown. In a sudden-death playoff battle Ian Cool tossed a no-hitter to give the Warriors the league title.

Next Victim
Next victim of the Drain attack was the Riddle Irish. The Warriors stopped the Irish, 3-2, in the state A-2 quarterfinals. In the semifinals Drain edged defending

champion Serra Catholic, 1-0, to earn the trip to Portland.

North Catholic started off with the District 1-A-2 championship, then dropped Yamhill-Carlton, 4-2, in the quarterfinals. Wednesday the Royals scored a single run in the bottom of the first inning and held on to squeeze by the Bandon Bulldogs, 1-0. As a result of the narrow win over Bandon, the Royals reached the state finals against the Warriors.

Drain will be going after its first A-2 baseball title, though the Warriors won the B crown in 1949, 1950 and 1951 behind the pitching of southpaw Jerry Cade.

Cool To Start
It will be another southpaw leading the Warriors in their quest of the A-2 championship — Cool. Cool has won 13 of 14 starts on the mound for the Warriors and has four no-hitters to his credit. Three no-hitters, including his first perfect game, came in league play. Cool's final no-hitter was in the playoff game against McKenzie to avenge his lone loss of the sea-

son. Completing the battery for the Warriors will be Gary Cox, three

time all-league catcher. Cox led the Warriors at the plate during league play with 20 hits in 40 at-bats.

Drain's infield will be composed of Larry Johns (.225) at first, Wes Anderson (.300) at second, Mike Blomberg (.454) at third and Gary McDonald (.175) at short. In the outfield will be Roger Rutledge (.138), Claude Kruse (.133) and John Sneed (.166).

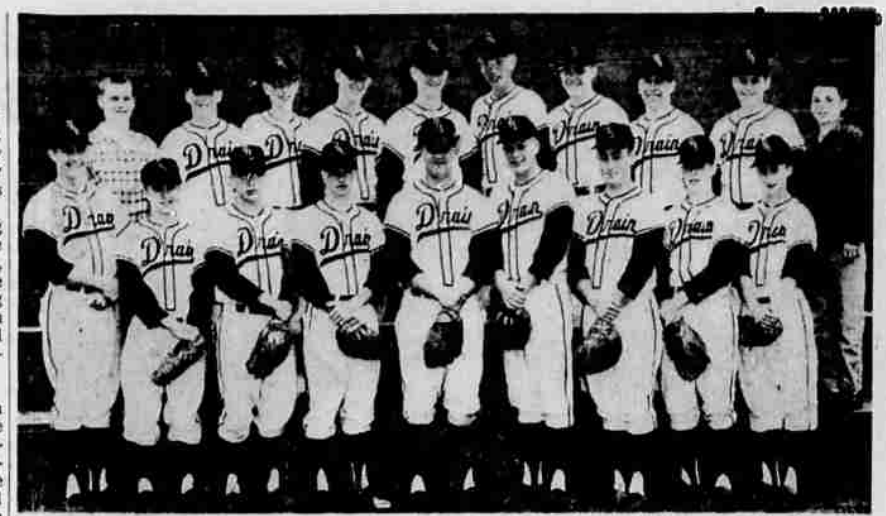
Team Average
The Warriors have a .266 team batting average. While not spectacular at the plate, Drain manages to get the job done. Cool uses his sharp-breaking curves to handcuff the opponents. In two playoff games Cool has struck out 30 batters. For the season Cool is averaging just under two strike outs per inning.

North Catholic's probable starting battery will be Ron Devall on the mound and Roy Henderson behind the plate. Devall scattered five hits to the Bulldogs in the semifinal outing, but proved tough

with runners on base. The Royals won their semifinal tilt with just three base hits, including a timely single by Tom Campbell after three walks had loaded the bases in the first inning.

In the B finale the defending champion Coburg Broncos will be favored to repeat. Wayne Swango, fire-balling right-hander, is the main reason the Broncos are being given the nod over the Condon Blue Devils. Swango has several no-hitters to his credit and is undefeated for the year.

Top Pitchers
The A-1 battle between South Eugene and Hillsboro will feature a pair of top chukkers. The Axemen will go with Don McNeal, undefeated left-hander, while the Spartans will depend on Wendall Glaze. McNeal put the Axemen in the finals with a four-hit shut-out over Pendleton, and Glaze tossed a brilliant one-hitter against Reynolds. South Eugene topped Medford and Pendleton to reach the finals after winning the Midwestern League title.

Fulltime Concessionaire Approved For City Links

An operational change at Roseburg Municipal Golf Course will switch responsibility of the Pro Shop from the park superintendent to a fulltime concessionaire.

The Roseburg City Council has authorized the city Parks and Recreation Commission to negotiate an agreement with a private concessionaire based on terms set forth in a proposal by City Manager Craig Mickelson.

One request for the concession has been received.

Negotiation Delayed

The commission this week endorsed Mickelson's recommendations concerning the Pro Shop but decided to delay negotiating an agreement to give all persons interested in the concession opportunity for consideration. Mickelson pointed out in his proposal to the City Council the city employs a park superintendent and six maintenance men to maintain not only the golf course but all city parks. During the golfing season, the golf course requires about three men full time.

Under the previous setup, Walter Brydges, the superintendent of parks held concession rights to the Pro Shop. This required him to work all week for the city and all weekend at the Pro Shop, requiring unusually long hours. Mickelson said the superintendent wished to be relieved of his concession responsibilities.

The new agreement will allow an operator to sell golf supplies, equipment and food. He will receive

10 per cent of green fees collected for the city.

Full Supervision

The new concessionaire will be required to provide full supervision over golf play and Pro Shop facilities. A condition in the agreement will stipulate the city can terminate the agreement on 90 days notice if a bonafide proposal on a driving range concession is submitted and meets with city approval. In such an event, the city would transfer the Pro Shop concession features to the driving range operator.

Green fees at the Roseburg course will remain the same this season. Weekday rates are \$1 for nine holes of play and \$1.50 for 18 holes. Saturday, Sunday and holiday rates are \$1.50 and \$2.50.

McMickelson said last season 376 monthly golf tickets were sold representing about 2,500 rounds of golf. Approximately 5,000 rounds were played on a daily rate basis. Stated another way, between 40 and 50 persons used the facility each day of the season.

Holding Its Own

The manager said the golf course is "more than breaking even" financially. Last year it produced \$11,981 in revenue, compared with an expense outlay of \$11,378. The Pro Shop matter was one of several items discussed by the Parks and Recreation Commission this week. In another action, the commission reaffirmed a standing policy on Stewart Park utilization. Under this policy, Stewart Park

has been designated exclusively for recreation use and any other type of structure or development is excluded. The only exception would be a building such as the present YMCA, it was pointed out.

A request from the Roseburg Jaycees to designate the new Stewart Park tennis courts as the "Jaycee Tennis Courts" was approved. The courts were a Jaycee project.

Lockwood Nine Shells Cubs For 17-0 Victory

Gordon Avery spearheaded the 1961 Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors hitting attack Thursday in an exhibition victory over the 1961 Roseburg Cubs.

Avery collected five hits and drove in four runs as the last year's Legion crew manhandled the Cubs 17-0.

Avery got his first RBI as the second man up in the game for the Legion. A sharp single through the box brought Phil Thormin around with the first run for the winners. Thormin had led off the tie for the Legion with a triple to left field.

Avery continued on around in the first inning to put the Legion on top, 2-0.

Second Frame

The second frame saw Avery triple to right-center for two more RBIs as the Legion moved away, 5-0. A single by Avery in the five-run third-inning rally kept the

flashy shortstop's record perfect at the plate. Avery ended the game with a double in the fifth and a single in the sixth.

In the final tally Avery had five of the Legion's 15 hits. Phil Thormin had 2-4 and Jim Beamer 2-5. Larry Burr had a perfect 2-2 game playing left field for the first half of the contest. Avery, Thormin and Beamer will all be in uniform when the 1962 Legion Juniors take the field Sunday in the season's opener against Crater.

While the bats of the Legion nine were booming, Arlan Foote and Lyle Charon turned in exceptional mound performances. Foote worked the first 3-2-3 innings, using his curves to fool the Cubs. Foote recorded three strike-outs, gave up three hits and did not walk a batter.

Speed and Control
Charon came on to pitch 3-1-3 innings of no-hit ball. Capitalizing on speed and control Charon fanned four and walked two. Charon's stint on the mound gave Legion fans a preview of what can be expected during the coming season. In addition to his mound work, Charon belted a two-run homer in the fifth.

The three hits for the Cubs were singles by Jerry Remick and Jon Burnham in the third inning and by Darrell Cellers in the fourth. Remick's penetration to second in the third inning was the furthest advance of a Cub player in the game. Burnham and Dick Williams handled the pitching for the Cubs.

All proceeds from the game will be used to underwrite the initial Douglas County Babe Ruth League expenses. Babe Ruth League play will open around the middle of June.

Portland 9 Loses As San Diego Sweeps Series On Beavers' Field In PCL Action

Home teams fared poorly Thursday night in Pacific Coast League play as the visitors won in the only three scheduled games. League-leading Salt Lake dropped an 8-2 decision to Tacoma. San Diego clipped Portland, 4-3, and Vancouver impotently tripped its host, Spokane, 4-2.

Tacoma scored six runs in a wild eighth inning three on Bill Hain's homer, to provide the difference in its victory over Salt Lake. The Giants' splurge broke open a tight 1-0 ballgame and gave Tacoma the series, three games to one.

San Diego completed a sweep of a four-game series by downing Portland in an error-filled game in the Beavers' park. The Padres made all of their runs in the third inning on singles by Ken Walters and pitcher Bob Risenhoover, a double by Bob Klaus, and errors by infielders Tony Frullo and Ron Debus.

At Spokane, Vancouver rallied for three runs in the seventh inning on Joe Taylor's two-run single and a costly error by third baseman John Werhas on Lamar Jacobs' double play ball. Taylor's bloop single drove in Jacobs and Ron Henry who had walked. Pitcher George Bamberger had scored earlier in the inning on a passed ball.
