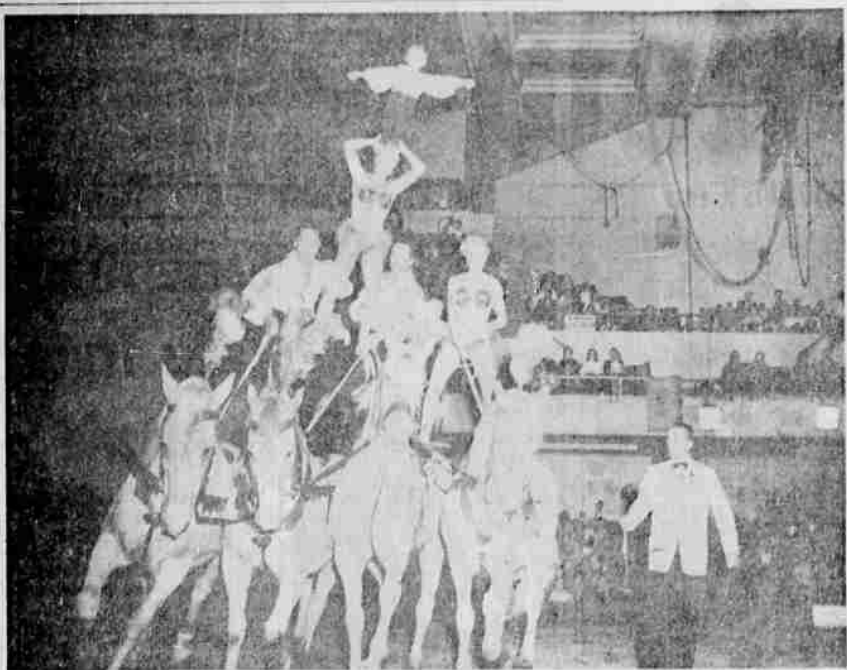

Nine Tracts Of County Timber Sold To Bidders At BLM Sale

Ten tracts of timber containing an estimated 11,724,000 board feet were sold by the Roseburg District of the Bureau of Land Management Friday for \$261,197.10. The tracts were appraised at \$228,626.50.

The winning bidders and tracts they won were:

L&H Lumber Co. of Sutherlin paid appraised price of \$20,543.70 for a tract of 958,000 board feet located north of Coles Valley. The 929,000 board feet of Douglas fir sold at \$21.75 per thousand. Boucock and Dupper were the only other qualifying bidders.

Ralph McDole Logging Co. purchased the second tract of 609,000 board feet on Cleghorn Creek for \$20,661.70. It was appraised at \$11,626.50.

2 Arrested As Suspects In Grave Opening Prank

CORVALLIS (AP) — Benton County sheriff's deputy Ed Ream said a Oregon State University student and a former student dug open a grave as a lark.

Arrested Friday on a charge of violating a grave were Joseph Martin Lebensfeld, 19, New York City, and John Stephen Perry, Salem. They were jailed in lieu of \$3,000 bond.

Lebensfeld is a student but Perry dropped out of Oregon State in the Spring term.

The grave of John Williamson was found opened in the IOOF cemetery on the edge of Corvallis April 29. He was born in 1867 and died in 1918.

Grand Jury Indicts Two Holdup Suspects

The Douglas County Grand Jury Friday returned indictments against two men accused of assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon in connection with the armed robbery of the Hillcrest Service Station May 22.

They are Bill Ernest Hunter, 27 and William Matthew Simmons, Gray, 25, both of Winston.

The indictment accuses them of pointing and aiming a loaded revolver at Clarence Edgar Lemon and taking \$200, the property of Norman Berna.

Also indicted was Tommie Joe Thrasher, accused of burglarizing the Idle Hour Tavern, the property of Vernon O. Woodruff, last Jan.

JFK's Economic Program Draws Blast From Ike

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower has blasted away at the Kennedy administration's economic program.

He said he and other Republican leaders are "deeply concerned about the direction in which our economy seems to be going."

Eisenhower opened fire on his successor's domestic policies at a news conference after a political council of war Friday with GOP congressional leaders and eight of his former cabinet members.

Too much control is being vested in the federal government, said Eisenhower, and some people seem to be losing faith in the ability of individual Americans to make their own decisions.

"No central group can sustain the strength of a free economy and the liberty guaranteed by our founding fathers," he declared.

The way to stop the trend, Eisenhower said, is to elect a Republican House this year, "and that is what we expect to do."

Repeatedly he struck at what he called administration spending policies and measures such as the farm bill, which he said helped centralize federal control.

Eisenhower did not directly blame the Kennedy administration for the recent tumble of the stock market. He said he was baffled by its causes but suggested one of them might be "a lack of confidence, some of which could be traced to the government."

Direct Distance Dialing Due Sunday In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — All Portland telephone calls will have direct distance dialing service Sunday, and two-thirds of the state will be on the network by July 15.

This means most Oregon residents will be able to dial directly to all parts of the United States. Pacific Northwest Bell said Eugene and Springfield would not join the direct dialing system until around 1965.

Those joining Portland in the network Sunday include North Plains, Oak Grove, Oregon City, Lake Oswego and Milwaukie, and a number of independent phone companies.

Several communities outside Salem will join the network July 17, while the Grants Pass-Medford-Ashland area hooks up July 15.

Packey Now Has 2 Teeth, Weighs 75 Pounds More

PORTLAND (AP) — Packey, the seven-week old baby elephant, is growing fast.

Zoo officials said the bull calf has grown four inches, added 75 pounds and two teeth since his birth.

He now measures 40 inches tall and weighs 300 pounds.

DOG Central Committee Renames John Richmond

James Richmond has been re-elected chairman of the Douglas County Republican Central Committee.

Richmond was elected during the committee's organization meeting Friday night in the Umpqua Hotel.

During the meeting the committee also adopted a statement of principles. This statement will be presented at the state convention in Bend, July 7.

Pete Serafin, chairman of the principles committee, proposed the statement which was unanimously approved by the committee.

Statement Adopted

The statement reads:

"1. We believe that the Constitution of the United States is the most inspired document written by man under the guidance of God for the governing of a nation of free men."

"2. We believe in a government subservient to the people and not a master of the people. Vast power concentrated in a central government usurps local government, and history proves it terminates in dictatorship."

"3. We believe that government should do for the people only that which they cannot logically do for themselves."

"4. We believe in the free enterprise system that has made this the greatest country in the world, and we believe that freedom should be economic, as well as spiritual and physical. Neither we nor posterity should be burdened by irresponsible government debt or regulation."

"5. We believe that every person should accept the individual responsibility that goes with the many privileges and benefits he enjoys."

"6. We believe that these are a reaffirmation of the principles inherited from our founding fathers that has elevated our country to the highest peak from which we shall continue to descend if we continue to depart from these principles."

"7. We believe that we in Oregon are fortunate that this is a part of the last frontier with vast remaining resources, and that we must strive to maintain these principles in order to preserve this heritage for future generations."

Harley Eugene Cahill Jr., 34, Myrtle Creek, appeared for arraignment before District Judge Gerald R. Hayes Friday on a charge of receiving and concealing stolen property. Portland Boy Hit By BB Gun Pellet

PORTLAND (AP) — A boy riding a bicycle was shot in the eye by a BB gun Friday afternoon. Today a 15-year-old boy admitted firing the shot.

It was uncertain whether Larry G. Goforth, 12, would lose the sight of his eye. He underwent surgery and a hospital spokesman said his success would not be determined for about three days.

Juvenile officers at the police station said the boy who admitted firing the shot said at first it was an accident.

Officer Norman Brown said that after the gun was taken apart and the boy was shown it could not fire accidentally, he admitted firing at the young Goforth.

The reason, though, was not learned.

Five boys were in the car from which the shot was fired. None attempted to help young Goforth or to report the shooting, Brown said.

Goforth's father is vice president of the Industrial Branch of the First National Bank.

Memorial funeral services for John Ulrich, 39, who died Thursday in his Fisher Rd. home, will be Monday at 1 p.m. at Wilson's Chapel of the Roses.

The Rev. James Smith of the First Christian Church will officiate. No graveside service will be held.

Ulrich was born Aug. 17, 1902, in Syracuse, N. Y. He lived in the Roseburg area for the past 20 years, moving here from California. He was married to Ida Robinson in 1925 in Philadelphia, Pa. Ulrich built homes in the Roseburg area until ill health forced his retirement.

Survivors include his wife, Ida; a daughter, Mrs. Robert (Jeanne) Holmquist, Eugene; a son, John R. Lemley; two sisters, Mrs. John Lemley and Mrs. Lena Abert, both of Syracuse, N. Y., and two grand-children.

The family has asked those who wish to make memorial donations to the Cancer Fund in lieu of flowers.

State Legislator Proposes Pay Hike

SALEM (AP) — State Rep. Stafford Hansell, R-Hermiston, said today that the legislature should pay its members \$1,200 a year, plus \$15 for each day of the legislative session.

They now get \$600 a year, with no daily expense allowance.

Legislators won the right to fix their own pay by vote of the people at the May 18 primary election.

"My proposal, made after a survey of the members of the legislature, would almost exactly reimburse the legislators for their actual costs of serving in the legislature," Hansell said.

He made his proposal at a school conducted for Republican candidates.

Under his plan, the lawmakers would continue to receive money for actual expenses incurred during the session, such as postage and telephone costs.

Hansell said his survey was made two years ago. He added that 75 of the 90 members reported what it cost them to serve.

The average cost, he said, was \$3,561 for a session. Hansell figures it would be 10 per cent higher now, or \$3,917.

He asked each member to add up the cost, including lodging, meals, travel, business loss and telephone.

Senate President Harry Boivin, D-Klamath Falls, said Friday he would appoint a committee of non-legislators to recommend what the pay should be, and whether it should go into effect in 1963 or 1965.

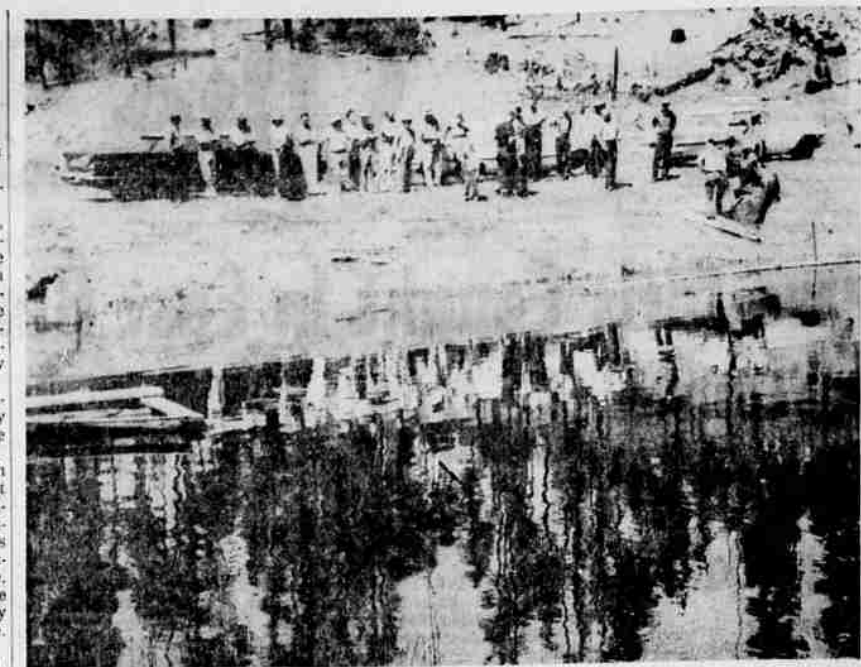
Nixon Headquarters Braces For Primary

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Richard M. Nixon's headquarters braced today for the possibility that Nixon's vigorous rival for the Republican nomination for governor, Assemblyman Joseph C. Shell of Los Angeles, may receive a sizable vote in Tuesday's primary.

At Moscow, special assistant to Nixon, distributed a memorandum to campaign workers noting that Shell is backed by what he termed the ultraconservative wing of the Republican party "as well as that of the right-wing extremists."

"With this kind of backing," he said, "Shell can be expected to poll between 30 and 40 per cent of the vote. He might even get one or two percentage points above 40. But he will not win."

His statement stood out as the first public acknowledgment by a Nixon spokesman of the extent of Shell's strength.



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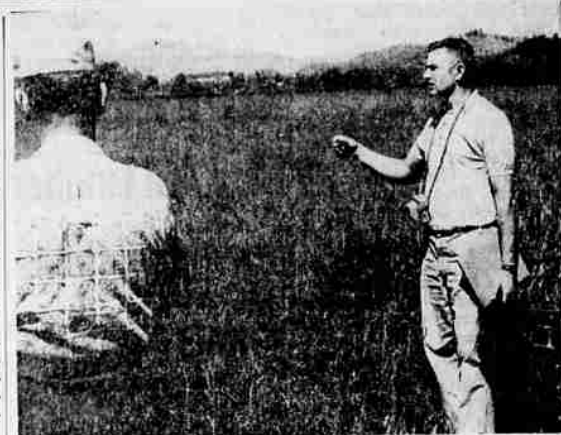
Edwin Pearce

Soviets Proclaim Goodman A Genuine Artist Of Jazz

MOSCOW (AP) — Benny Goodman may be too academic for some Soviet jazz buffs, but Soviet cultural authorities today proclaimed him a genuine artist of jazz.

This was the verdict handed down in a review published in the newspaper Sovetskaya Kultura.

The glowing words of praise in the official organ of the Soviet Ministry of Culture appeared to bestow the official seal of approval on Goodman's performances in the Soviet Union.

"One would wish to call Goodman a clarinet-conjuror," the reviewer, Yuri Dimitriyev wrote. "It seems there are no difficulties he cannot overcome."

"He broadens the expressive possibilities of the clarinet to literally unbelievable limits. Goodman is a true poet of the clarinet—each sound of his instrument is inspiring."

Of Goodman's hand-picked group of musicians, Dimitriyev wrote: "Before us performed a highly professional, well-integrated group of musicians who easily overcame the most complicated virtuosic difficulties."

"This is a band that is able—and this is most important—to uncover the essence and soul of music, and evoke the lyricism, drama and gay humor of the works performed."

The review described Goodman's first three concerts here as an unquestioned success.

It noted, however, that: "A part of the young 'jazzmen' as they call themselves, who in their musical ignorance suppose that jazz performances come down to extravagant cacophony and noise which irritate the nerves, were probably disappointed."

Dimitriyev said that compared with Soviet jazz performances, which usually feature more entertainers, Goodman's band was more academic.
