

Sandy Koufax Giving NL Batters Rough Time

If anything fits Sandy Koufax to a T, it's a K.

The Los Angeles Dodgers' whiff king added another flock of K's to his amazing strikeout total Monday night, fanning 13 batters en route to a three-hit, 6-3 victory over Philadelphia in the only game played in either league.

The triumph, moving second-place Los Angeles within two games of National League-leading San Francisco, boosted Koufax' record to 8-2 and further propelled the 26-year-old left-hander along the road to what he wants

most — a 20-victory campaign.

No Trade

"Strikeouts are nice to have," says Koufax, "but I wouldn't trade a 20-victory season for all the strikeouts records in the book."

Koufax has quite a bit to trade with.

He's the only pitcher in major league history to strike out 18 twice, hold the league record for 269 strikeouts in one season and fan 10 or more 36 times — all during an 8-year career. But his 18-13 record last year was the closest he's come to winning 20.

Koufax' stand-out effort against the Phils gave him a total of 123

strikeouts in 161 innings this season, marked his fourth consecutive complete game triumph and gave him a string of 10-16-10-13 set down via the strikeout route over the four-game span.

The Dodger swiftly allowed a leadoff single to Tony Taylor in the first inning, then retired 17 batters in order before Taylor walked in the seventh. He fired in the ninth, allowing John Callison's single, a walk to Roy Sievers and a pinch-hit homer by Jackie Davis with two out.

Chased Mahaffey

The Dodgers pulled ahead to stay against Art Mahaffey (5-7),

winless in seven starts against Los Angeles, with a run in the first on Maury Wills' single, his steal of second and bunt singles by Willie Davis and Tommy Davis.

The Dodgers chased Mahaffey in the second when Wally Moon and John Roseboro tagged consecutive homers leading off the inning.

The Dodgers moved over to Pittsburgh tonight for a two-nighter with the Pirates while the Giants, who have held the top spot by winning 11 of 12, will be at Chicago for a day game. Cincinnati is at St. Louis, Milwaukee at Houston and New York at Philadelphia for other neighbors on a full program.

It'll be Stan Williams (5-1) and

Don Drysdale (8-3) for the Dodgers against Earl Francis (2-2) and Bob Friend (5-6). The Giants will send Jack Sanford (6-4) or Billy O'Dell (6-3) against the Cubs Bob Olin (3-3).

American League

The American League spotlight falls on New York, where Cleveland's surprising Indians and the defending world champion Yankees open a 3-game series that will determine first place in the tight race bracketing five teams within 2½ games of the league lead.

The Indians will start Jim Grant

(3-0), on furlough from the Army,

while Ralph Terry (6-4) will take the mound for the Yanks. Grant defeated Terry and the Yankees (7-1) with a five-hitter in an earlier meeting. Cleveland has taken five of the seven games between the two clubs, tied for first place with 27-19 records.

Third-place Minnesota, a half-game back of the leaders, will be trying to gain ground by knocking off visiting Kansas City. Fourth-place Detroit, only one game out of first, is at Boston, fifth-place Los Angeles is home to Chicago and Washington is at Baltimore.

The entire American League program will be played under the lights.

Sam Snead, Top Golfers Ending Qualifications

Sam Snead and a host of the nation's leading golfers set out to top the score of little Fred (Butch) Baird of Galveston, Tex., today when the qualifying competition for the U. S. Open championship winds up at seven different sites.

Baird, a red-haired, 5-foot-9, 150-pounder who is playing only his third year in the pro circuit, had the best 36-hole qualifying score of Monday's competition at six different sites. Baird's 68-69 for a three-under-par 137 topped a crack field playing at Memphis.

During these final two days of sectional qualifying, a field of 497 golfers will be reduced to 131 for the National Open championship, to be played at Oakmont, Pa., June 14-16. Nineteen exempt players, including defending champion Arnold Palmer, will see the Open field at an even 150.

Toughest At Memphis

Memphis was the site for the toughest qualifying competition Monday because many of the leading pros had played there during the past weekend in the Memphis Open tournament. A total of 61 golfers played there for 27 berths in the Open.

Don January of Dallas, Don Whit of San Diego, Calif., and Dave Ragan of Sun City, Fla., were tied for second among the Memphis qualifiers with 138 totals.

Among the golfers who qualified there were: Dr. Cary Middlecoff, a former Open champion; Lionel Hebert, winner of the Memphis Open, and his brother, Jay; Art Wall, Mason Rudolph, Tony Lema, Jack Burke, Al Balding, George Bayer and Australia's Bruce Crampton, Frank Phillips, Bruce Devlin and Bill Dunk.

Among The Casualties

There were casualties, too, among the big-name golfers. Ken Venturi, Johnny Cupit, Jim Ferree, Fred Haas, Tony Pena, Howard Johnson, Jimmy Clark, Bill Collins, Kel Nagle of Australia and Harold Henning of South Africa.

The biggest field in today's sectional qualifying was entered at Upper Montclair, N. J., near New York. There, Snead was among 104 golfers (22 of them amateurs) seeking 32 berths in the Open championship.

Other qualifying competition also was scheduled for Washington, D. C., San Francisco, Atlanta, Chicago, Detroit and Pittsburgh.

Veek Blasts Webb, Yanks For 'Messing Up The AL'

NEW YORK (UPI)—Bill Veek, known as the "P.T. Barnum of baseball," blasted Del Webb and the New York Yankees today for "booting me out of baseball" and for "messing up the American League."

The charges, and several others, are made in a copyrighted article in the latest issue of Look magazine entitled, "How They Booted Me Out Of Baseball."

Veek, the colorful former boss of the old St. Louis Browns, the Cleveland Indians and Chicago White Sox, charged that Webb, co-owner of the Yankees, "messed up the American League and turned it into the secondary league it has now undoubtedly become."

Veek accused the Yankees of running the American League to suit their own aims.

He is quoted in the magazine article as saying that Webb's primary interest during baseball's decade of expansion has been "in getting the contracts to build the new parks." Webb is one of the nation's leading building contractors.

"Drummed Out"

Veek charged that the Yankees "drummed me out of baseball" in 1953, when he was president of the Browns. The man responsible, he said, was "Webb with some aid from his fellow predators."

The reasons, Veek said, were that he proposed an unrestricted draft program to strengthen the weaker clubs, and that he proposed to cut visiting teams in on the television receipts of the home club.

Veek wrote that the Yankees' lucrative television income, estimated at \$1,750,000 a year, enabled them to maintain their dominant position in baseball.

Estimating the new Washington Senators' TV revenue as \$150,000 a year, Veek asked: "Now, how in the world can the Washington

club, with every other conceivable disadvantage, possibly compete effectively when the Yankees start at least \$1,500,000 ahead of them every year on a purely subsidiary right?"

Make More Money

Veek pointed out that a team, at home or on the road, makes more money from night games than from day games. In the case of a game at Yankee Stadium, it is worth \$30,000 more at night to the visiting club.

Veek charged that the Yankees awarded extra night games "to their friends and withheld it from any operator who did not take kindly to their whip."

When other American League clubs tried to discipline Veek by not awarding any night games to his Browns, he felt he had "a cut-and-dried case of conspiracy against every team in the league."

"Being fond of wasting time,"

Veek wrote, "I appealed to Commissioner Ford Frick. The commissioner took the bull by the horns and ruled that it was none of his business."

Ducks' Jerome Ready To Meet Hayes, Budd

EUGENE (UPI)—Oregon's Harry Jerome is anxious to meet

Bob Hayes of Florida A&M and Frank Budd of Villanova again. It's simple. He wants to prove he's the best sprinter in the world.

Jerome, a 20-year-old junior from Vancouver, B.C., figures to get his chance this month. The occasion is the NCAA track and field championships here June 15-16.

"I'm looking forward to the meet," the soft-spoken Canadian said. "Hayes and Budd will be tough but I hope I can do my part for my school. We've (Oregon) been pointing to it."

Bill Bowerman's unbeaten Oregon forces, with the likes of Jerome, miler Dyrrol Burleson and hurdler Jerry Tarr, are favored to win the meet.

And anything could happen if all three sprinters get together in one race. Jerome nipped Hayes in the California Relays last month in the 100 and his last loss in the distance was to Budd in the NCAA finals last year. He was second.

Hayes holds an impressive win over Budd in 100 meters this year. He topped the fleet Easterner at the Los Angeles Coliseum Relays last month.

Record Co-holder

"They're both great runners," Jerome said when asked to compare the two. "It's tough to make a comparison. Either one could beat the other in a given race."

Hayes and Budd are co-holders of the world's record in the century at 9.2 seconds.

Jerome, who has galloped to four 9.3s and a 20.8 in the 220-yard dash this spring, explains he's much stronger this year.

"I'm stronger and that's why I am having a better year. It's because of maturity. I don't mean only physical maturity but mental maturity, too. I'm adjusting better to academic work."

Jerome had done only one 9.3 before this spring.

"I think it's only a matter of time before I get down to 9.2," he added. "But I'm not particularly worried about my times just as long as I win."

Holds Meter Mark

The 6-foot, 170-pound Vancouver athlete, who doesn't think the damp Pacific Northwest is a deterrent to his running, also is the co-holder of the world's record in the 100-meter dash at 10 seconds flat. He turned in the effort in 1960 in Canada.

And last month, in the same meet in which he beat Hayes, he teamed with three Oregon hurdlers to tie the world's record in the 440-yard relay at 40 seconds flat. Texas set the mark in 1957.

It was his anchor leg that led to victory and the record-equaling time.

Jerome has a tremendous start and a brilliant finish but he doesn't think there's any strong point to his sprinting ability. "I try to do everything well," he said.

Which race does he like best? "The 220," he answered. "I just like the distance better."

In addition to the NCAA meet, the Oregon star has several other goals.

He will compete for Canada in the British Empire Games at Perth, Australia, in November. And he is pointing to the 1964 Olympic Games.

After college, Jerome wants to coach and do government work in Canada.
