Project 35' Group Readies For Exciting Tour

Fifty-eight Glide High School students, members of Project 35, are tense with expectation and excitement awaiting the dawn of June 8 the start of their tour of Mexico.

Members of the club for 15

months, have planned and carried out many fund raising projects under the leadership of their officers and advisers. Baked food sales, community calendars, ham and turkey dinners, pony tickets and candy selling, were only a few of

the many projects. The community calendar was the most profitable of all the projects, earning a total of \$1,300 for the club, according to the treasurer, Arlene Paulson.

Gene Rosaschi, world geography instructor and chief adviser of the group, made the official announcement at a recent meeting of the club, that the original goal of \$5,000 had been passed as a total of \$6,191 had been raised by the club.

To prepare for the trip, students made weekly trips to the Douglas County Health Department for immunization shots.

Glide High Principal John Thompson and one of the advisers of the club stated, "I think this trip is an excellent project. It should be a great educational experience for the students involved."

The young travelers, together with their seven chaperones, Miss Patricia Mayo, language instructor; Miss Ann Beckley, girls physical education director; Jerry Lemert, science instructor; Rosaschi; Principal Thompson and Mrs. Floyd Haas, will board the two buses at 4 a.m. June 8 at the Glide High School. The four men will drive the buses, for the exciting holiday through the great state of Oregon and down through the states of Nevada, Texas and on to Mexico.

They first drive up the North Umpqua highway then via Klamath Falls and Mount Shasta to Yerington, Nev., Rosaschi's home town. This will be an overnight stop. The boys will sleep in their sleeping bags on the grounds of Rosaschi's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Rosaschi, and the girls will sleep in the town's school gymnasium. The following day, the entire group will be guests of the Rosaschis for luncheon. Then they pass through Las Vegas, Nev., and Phoenix, Ariz., to Nogales, Mexico, which is a 24-hour drive.

Arriving in Nogales Sunday, June 10, the tourists then board a train departing at 4:45 p.m. Arriving June 11 in the afternoon at Mazatlan, the group will stay at the hotel La Siesta overnight. Leaving that city June 12 for another night on a train, the group arrives June 13 at Guadalajara. They will be met at the station for a city tour and sightseeing which includes a glass factory, a tile and pottery factory and a visit to Orizaba's home.

The capital of Mexico is a major stop. The group will stay at the hotel Monte Casino for the next four nights. The first day will be spent with an extensive tour of the city. June 15, the tourists will be taken on an excursion to the beautiful countryside outside of Mexico City to Cuernavaca and Taxco, the silver city.

June 16, will be another day of sightseeing, the archaeological ruins of the Pyramids to the Sun and the Moon, the Shrine of Guadalupe and Monastery of Acolman. Sunday June 17 is planned as a day of excitement and pleasure. The group will see a bullfight. Following the bullfights in the evening, Project 35 members will be guests of the Mexican City Center of Bilingual Studies. This school of 4,000 students, plans to present a short program of Mexican songs and Mexican dances in costumes. After this program, there will be a social dance with a marimba orchestra.

June 18, after visiting University City, colonial Coyacan, San Angel and "El Pedregal," "the most modern suburban development in the world," the group take the train for the return to the border. June 18 and 19, they spend two nights on the train arriving at Nogales and meet their buses at 7 a.m. The tired tourists expect to arrive in Glide June 23.

The arrangements for this Mexican Holiday have been made by Montgomery Ward Co., Inc., Travel Section, Chicago, Ill., in cooperation with Mexico Travel Advisors, Chicago, Ill., and National Railways of Mexico and Pacific Railways of Mexico.
