

Brown Promises 'Great Fight' As Nixon Wins GOP Primary

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Dick Draws Lop-Sided Party Vote

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Republican Richard Nixon and Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown emerged today as triumphant choices of their parties to face each other in California's 1962 race for governor.

The count of nearly 4½ million ballots in Tuesday's primary election carried both nominees toward the one million mark as the foundation for their campaign.

Nixon, in his first political outing since losing the presidency in 1960, defeated conservative Assemblyman Joseph C. Shell of Los Angeles by a never-challenged 2 to 1 margin.

Margin Two-To-One

The tally from 17,439 of 31,212 precincts: Nixon 587,108, Shell 313,559.

Shell, an aggressive campaigner, was carrying only Sacramento and seven small northern California counties. Nixon swept the big population areas.

There never was any doubt that Brown, with only nominal opposition, would be tapped by the state's preponderant Democrats to head their ticket.

But the size of his vote—almost equaling the combined Nixon-Shell total—uncovered solid party support for the governor.

With returns from 16,618 precincts, Brown had 781,880, Alfred Hamilton 42,066; Phillip Moore 48,000; and John C. Stuart 45,660.

The governor's showing was in sharp contrast to the 600,000 votes against his favorite son state in the 1960 Democratic presidential primary.

Nixon immediately made peace overtures to Shell, who denounced his rival during the campaign as a "me-tooer" and a "loser" intent on running for president again. Nixon pledged to serve his full four-year term if elected governor.

Shell Leaves Doubt

Shell left a sizable doubt as to whether he'll swing his support to Nixon.

Brown, radiating confidence, declared: "You can expect the greatest fight you've ever seen."

Republican Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel drew a lopsided party vote in withstanding a highly vocal right-wing challenge for his candidacy for another six years in Washington. The results, he said, showed that the voters "want a Republican party in the Lincoln tradition."

Two Republican congressmen who belong to the John Birch Society won re-nomination, however. Voters selected party candidates from 38 congressional districts in all.

Oakland Slates Budget Hearing

Public hearing on the Oakland city budget will be held at 8 p.m. June 28 in the City Hall, the Oakland City Council decided at a meeting Tuesday night.

Total budget is \$30,835, with \$15,835 of this amount to be raised by taxes. No election will be required as the budget proposal is within the 6 per cent limitation, reports Edith Dunn, News-Review correspondent.

The 1962-63 budget proposal was drafted by a budget committee composed of L. F. Stearns, R. D. Bridges, Harry Smith, Ronald Copland and William Gildersleeve, along with Mayor Paul Schulze and council members Eugene Cherry, Lyle Stuve, Willard Lee and Harry Hakanson.

In other action, the council approved a motion by Cherry calling for council committee appointments. Stuve and Cherry were named to the police committee and Lee and Hakanson to the street committee.

Fire Chief Fay Stearns reported on fire equipment after which the council voted to purchase 100 feet of fire hose and one hydrant.

The council was advised that repaving work has started on several city streets.

South Oregon Electric Rates Highest In State

Residents of most Oregon cities in 1961 paid lower rates for electrical service than did city residents of most other states, a report from the Federal Power Commission and the Oregon Public Utility Commissioner said today.

However, Roseburg and southern Oregon are exceptions, the report said.

Average bill nationally was above \$6.50 for 250 kilowatt hours in all but six states. The average cost for the same amount of power for residential service in Oregon cities of 2,500 population or more was \$5.62.

Comparison Made

In Roseburg and most southern Oregon cities the cost for the same power was \$7.51 which compares to the average bill in Montana.

The report indicates average bills in other states in cities over 2,500 population for the same amount of power are: \$4.74 in Washington; \$5.02 in Tennessee; \$5.39 in Alabama; \$6.57 in Idaho; \$6.71 in Nevada; and \$6.90 in California.

Highest average bill was paid in New Hampshire—\$8.96.

At the same time Eugene's city-owned utility provided the same amount of power at the lowest rate in the United States—\$3. Another city-owned utility, Forest Grove, nationally has the third lowest rate for the same power for cities in its population group. Its rate was \$3.75.

The state has five privately-owned utilities serving 83 per cent of the state's customers. Eleven municipally-owned utilities serve 8 per cent, 17 cooperatives serve 6 per cent and four people's utility districts serve 3 per cent.

Rates charged by privately-owned utilities for 250 kilowatt hours in cities of 2,500 or more vary by company and to some extent by geographical location, the report said.

Thus Pacific Power and Light Co. charges \$4.50 for power in The Dalles and \$7.51 for the same power in Roseburg.

Much of southern Oregon including the cities of Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, Klamath Falls and Lakeview was being served by California-Oregon Power Co. in 1961 (merged that year by PP & L) with charges of \$7.51 (the highest for 250 kilowatt hours reported in Oregon cities, the Federal Power Commission said).

The same power in People's Utility Districts ranged from \$4.50 in The Dalles to \$5 in Tillamook; \$5.13 in Reedsport, Newport and Toledo; and \$6 in Brookings.

Earthquake Shakes San Francisco Area

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A sharp earthquake shook the San Francisco Bay area and portions of northern California at about 10:50 a.m. PDT.

Two shocks were felt in downtown San Francisco. Simultaneously a report of a temblor was made in Ukiah, about 100 miles to the north.

There was no immediate report of damage.

Reports of the quake also were made in other communities in the San Francisco Bay area, the temblor being felt in Santa Rosa and Berkeley.

At Ukiah, George Hunter, managing editor of the Ukiah Journal, said the whole building shook while he was talking on the telephone. The building continued to shake for almost a minute. He reported that a survey showed no damage except for goods being tumbled off grocery store shelves.

The economy of the entire Pacific Northwest was flirting with disaster today as labor disputes continued to grow in two of its largest summertime industries — construction and lumber.

The lumbering industry was being plagued from Southeast Alaska to Northern California and from Missoula, Mont., to the Pacific Coast.

Construction was being stymied throughout Washington, Western Oregon and Northern Idaho.

French Forces Capture 17 Algerian Terrorists

ALGIERS (UPI) — French security forces raided a farm house 18 miles south of Algiers today and captured 17 members of the terrorist Secret Army Organization (OAS).

The raid came as the outlawed OAS extended its one-sided truce with the Moslems against the background of a message from one of its former leaders that the cause for a French Algeria is lost.

The terrorist hideout was pinpointed by three OAS suspects arrested previously. The security forces found seven French army deserters among the 17 arrested, and picked up a small arsenal of stolen weapons.

While the OAS truce continued, police found two murdered Europeans in the Algiers suburb of Guyville this morning. It was believed they were former OAS men who had been "executed" by the terrorist organization.

A pirate OAS broadcast imposed on Radio Algiers Tuesday night said the suspension of terrorism, in effect in Algiers for the last five days, would last at least through midnight tonight.

From his cell in Fresnes prison in Paris, the No. 2 OAS leader, Edmond Jouhaud, issued an appeal for an end to the battle to keep Algeria French. He appealed to his OAS commander, former Gen. Raoul Salan, to join him in the plea.

Jouhaud is trying to get President Charles de Gaulle to com-

Soviet Bloc Leaders Meet

MOSCOW (AP) — Leaders of the Soviet bloc assembled here today to plan measures to deal with economic problems at home and the growing power of the Common Market in Western Europe.

Present were premiers and party chiefs of seven East European countries with Mongolia and Red China represented by observers. The absence of foreign ministers indicated foreign affairs would be discussed only generally. Representatives of the economic and trade sections of each government were present.

Omitted from the list was Albania, the little country on the Adriatic which has fallen out with the Kremlin and has been supported in its independent stand by Communist China.

Chief among the problems facing the group was the constant problem of agriculture. Farm production has consistently fallen behind industrial production in the bloc, by sharp contrast with the Common Market area.

In a dramatic step last week the Soviet government increased the retail price of meat 30 per cent and butter 25 per cent.

The aim of the operation was to raise more money to build fertilizer and farm machinery plants and to pay Soviet farmers more so they will work harder on the cooperative and state farms.

The Soviet Union is not alone with its agricultural troubles. Throughout the Communist bloc farm production has not kept up with comparable areas in Western Europe.

Two Successful Candidates Fail To File Report

Two Democratic candidates successful in their primary races for county offices failed to meet the deadline for filing of campaign expenses and contributions. One indicated he was filing today.

Ivan Edwards, seeking the post of county commissioner, and Roy Cox, county assessor, failed to file contributions and expenses reports with the office of G. D. Myltenbeck by Tuesday afternoon, a day after deadline.

Third Hasn't Filed

A third Democratic candidate, but unsuccessful in his bid for nomination for county clerk who failed to file expenses was William Meeks.

Edwards said he was filing today. He reports expenses, all personal, totaling \$482.93.

John Robertson, successful bidder for the Democratic nomination for county clerk lists expenses of \$778.31, largest expenditure in either primary on the county level.

Other reports filed for the county clerk post show incumbent Republican G. D. Myltenbeck's expenses as \$92.75 and \$10.26 in contributions; Edith L. Metz, Democrat, \$211.70 in expenses and \$43.50 in contributions; Richard Yost, Democrat, \$194.48 in expenses and \$130 in contributions.

In the commissioner filings, successful Republican bidder, Elmer Metzger, incumbent, had expenses of \$209.32; Herbert A. Lindner, Democrat, none; Eugene V. Lincoln, Democrat, \$199 expenses and \$199 contributions; Carl Smith, Democrat, \$253.95 expenses; John Musgrove, Democrat, \$311.68 expenses; William S. Carlson, Republican, \$187.19 expenses; and Clifford L. Thrasher, Republican, \$67.25 expenses.

Candidates Report

In the assessor primaries, incumbent Leland S. W. Svarverud Jr., Republican, filed \$100 expenses; and Ken Linder, Democrat, \$38.20 expenses.

In the Glendale non-partisan race of the peace race, incumbent A. V. Mohr filed \$32.60 expenses and James R. Cox filed \$5 expenses.

Warren T. De La Vergne filed \$5 expenses in his unopposed race for Drain Justice of the Peace.

State law provides a \$25 fine per day for reports of expenses and contributions not filed with the county clerk 15 days following the primary election.

The school, slated in Roseburg for the second consecutive year, will be conducted at Douglas Electric Cooperative, 1881 NE Stephens St. Douglas Electric is the host organization.

Ruralite Services, Inc. and A. B. Chance Co. sponsor the event to keep public utility linemen up to date on new tools and methods used in maintenance construction.

Directing the school will be Jack Davidson, Portland, Ruralite Services safety director, and Bob Bond, western region representative for the Chance firm. Classroom sessions will be held in the mornings and practice sessions in the afternoons.

During practice, the linemen will work under simulated "live" wire conditions.

Joint Russ, U.S. Satellite Hinted

GENEVA (UPI)—Soviet sources said today America and Russia have agreed to launch a joint weather satellite.

The project, the sources said, is the first fruit of the exchange of letters on outer space cooperation between President Kennedy and Premier Nikita Khrushchev last March.

The sources said the two space giants also have agreed to join in a project to measure the earth's magnetic field and are near agreement on a joint launching of a communications satellite.

The agreement was reached, the sources said, in talks here between Hugh Dryden, assistant director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), and Prof. Anatoli Blagonravov, a senior Soviet scientist.

Dryden refused to confirm the Soviet report. He said it would be "an indiscretion" to reveal what he and Blagonravov have talked about.

Copies of the resolution were sent to the Oregon Congressional delegation.

George C. Gratke, executive vice president of the First National Bank of Roseburg, Tuesday was elected to the executive committee of the Oregon Bankers Association at its annual convention at Gearhart. The association represents 228 banks in Oregon.

Oregon Program Money Received

SALEM (UPI) — The Oregon Education Department has received \$970,000 from the Ford Foundation.

It is the first installment in the Foundation's \$3.5 million grant for the Oregon Program to improve education. The \$970,000 covers costs of the first fiscal year of the three year program, starting July 1.

Twelve colleges and 26 school districts have signed up for the program which involves teacher training and new classroom techniques.

Roseburg School District is among the applicants for Oregon Program funds. The district hopes to receive approximately \$62,000 over a four-year period from the Ford Foundation grant.

Kennedy Tells West Point Cadets Military Must Help To Deter Wars

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP)—

President Kennedy told West Point's 1962 class of brand new lieutenants today they have an unprecedented chance to serve the cause of national security and freedom.

Kennedy, addressing the U.S. Military Academy's festive and tradition-laden commencement, said graduates of all the service institutions within the next 10 years will encounter "greater opportunities for the defense of freedom than this academy's graduates ever had."

"They may find themselves 'heavily involved' in crises around the globe," Kennedy said. And they should consider themselves privileged to protect the

interests of their country, he added.

Bear Responsibility

In the flag-decked fieldhouse at this birthplace of the Army's corps of officers, Kennedy declared military men bear a responsibility to deter wars as well as to fight and win them.

But he added the basic problems pressing on the world can not be solved by military action. Kennedy warned the hearts of at least 20 cadets by issuing orders to release them from detention. This sort of amnesty is traditional for visiting heads of state but Kennedy granted it as commander in chief of U.S. armed forces.

The crowd of cadets and proud parents who packed the fieldhouse cheered when Kennedy made the announcement.

Kennedy had his own reward for attending the climax of another year at this citadel on the Hudson River. The class of 1962 made him an honorary member. He was the first chief executive and the first commencement speaker accorded an honorary place in a West Point class.

Fagan Top Man

The President personally shook the hand of the first 30 graduating cadets who came to the stand for their diplomas. The top man in the graduating class was Cadet John H. Fagan, 21, of Northamp-

ton, Mass., who received the first diploma.

Kennedy's stay at the Academy was brief. He arrived near 9:30 a.m. and left shortly before 11 a.m., flying back to Washington from nearby Stewart Air Force Base. He was back at the White House by 12:10 p.m.

Kennedy told the newly commissioned officers that they must be qualified not only to fight and win wars but also to deter conflict. At the same time he asserted that "basic problems facing the world are not susceptible of a military solution."

Sheriff Charles Strawn said Bacon, arrested by Coos Bay city police nine days ago, is charged with attempted burglary of a Coos Bay gun shop. Post Office investigators have issued a hold on him, on a breaking and entering charge.

The bond for each charge is \$5,000.

A companion, Rutherford B. Oliver, 42, Los Angeles, was arrested at the same time. Oliver is charged with attempted burglary of the gun shop also, held in lieu of \$5,000 bond. Federal officials have not placed a hold on him, however.

The Newberg post office was ransacked and an undetermined amount of mail was taken.
