

Diamond Lake To Get New Type Of Rainbow

Diamond Lake anglers will soon be taking a different race of rainbow trout than the one they've been catching each year since the lake was opened to angling following chemical treatment by the game commission in 1954.

This is the word from Chuck Campbell, chief of fisheries for the commission, who said that future stocking of Diamond Lake will be made from native rainbow stocks developed from McKenzie and Deschutes River fish. Eventually, Campbell said, the native rainbow will replace the Kamloops rainbow which now populates the lake.

Fish Released

To set the stage for the gradual change-over, 150,000 fingerling rainbows from the Game Commission's Roaring River hatchery near Seio were released in Diamond Lake two weeks ago followed by the

plant of another 150,000 this past week from the Oak Springs hatchery on the Deschutes.

These youngsters will be appearing in the catch as 6 to 10 inches by this fall. Campbell does not believe anglers will be able to tell the difference, though, between the native rainbow and the Canadian Kamloops since it is extremely difficult for even biologists to differentiate between the two.

The reason for the change-over is twofold, according to Campbell. First, the late spring spawning of the Kamloops rainbow found many fish in dark and undesirable condition from two to three weeks following the normal opening of the lake to anglers. Many fishermen voiced their disapproval of catching these spawning fish. Secondly, fishermen consistently voiced their dissatisfaction with the temperamental Canadian import, which seemed to strike on a hit-or-miss basis. This was especially true from midsummer to season's end when the fish would go on a hunger strike and refuse to hit bait or lure.

Fish Liked

Fly fishermen like the fish, Campbell said, since it readily hits wet or dry flies. However, too many anglers are not proficient in this type of angling and are unable to take the Kamloops rainbow during most of the season on regular baits and lures.

To solve the problem and provide better angling for everyone, the Game Commission will test out two different races of fish, a late fall spawning rainbow developed from McKenzie brood stocks and an early spring spawner developed at the Oak Springs plant. The two lots of fish already stocked in the lake represent fish from each race. Campbell believes these fish will produce eggs earlier in the season than do the present Kamloops stocks and over a short period of time, if this proves to be the case, the early spring spawners will be back in the lake and in fair to good condition when anglers move in on opening day.

Feelings Mixed

There are mixed feelings about the change-over, Campbell said, with opposition coming mostly from fly anglers who like the aerial gymnastics of the Canadian rainbow. But most anglers have voiced approval of the change-over, said Campbell, and old timers who fished Diamond Lake during its heyday insist the native rainbow will grow just as big if not bigger than its Canadian brother as well as being a better and more spectacular fighter.

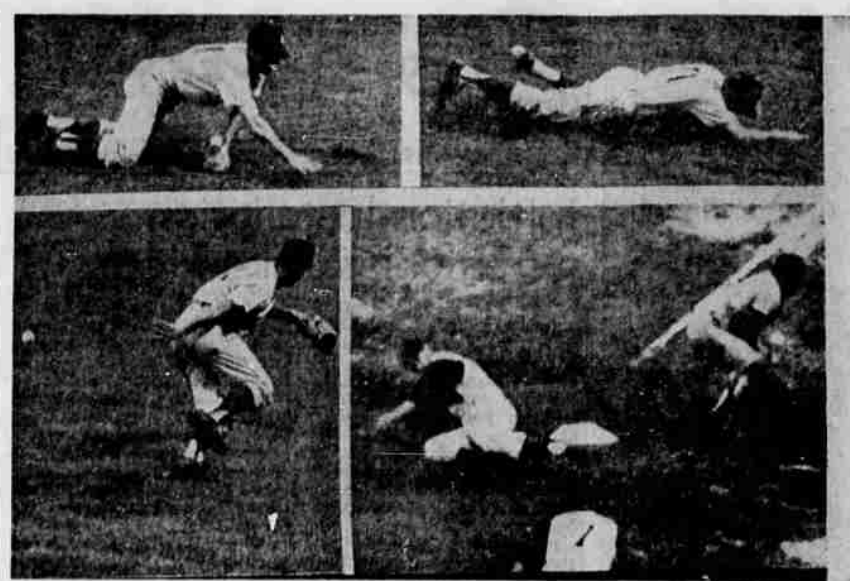
Spring Chinook Run Heavy At Winchester Dam Station

Spring chinook continued to pour over Winchester Dam during the last two weeks of May, according to the report received from the counting station.

A total of 1,303 adult chinook were recorded between May 18 and May 31 at the Winchester

Dam counting station. The total for the year stands at 2,877. Jack salmon counted at the dam now number 316, with 172 going through the counting station in the last two weeks of May. In addition to the chinook, 18 summer steelhead were counted, bringing the total to 35 for the run.

Musial Slams 450th Homer To Brake Plunge Of Cards

The United Press International Stan Musial has reached another milestone—and typically the event meant more to his St. Louis Cardinals teammates than to the great slugger.

The occasion was the 450th homer of Stan's career—a total reached by only five other major leaguers—but its chief value lay in the fact that it finally broke the Cardinals' eight-game plunge out of National League pennant contention.

The homer came in the 11th inning of Tuesday night's game with the Cincinnati Reds and lifted the Cardinals to a 10-9 victory after they had trailed by eight runs going into the bottom of the sixth inning. Musial had contributed two other hits to the Cardinals' attack but it remained for him to connect for the payoff blow against reliever Dave Sisler.

In what may be his final season, the 41-year-old Musial now is hitting .317 with six homers and 24 runs batted in. He looks headed for his best season since 1958 when he last batted more than .300.

Giants Beat Cubs

The San Francisco Giants wal-

loped the Chicago Cubs, 11-4; the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-2, and led, 7-3, when the second game of the two-night doubleheader was suspended after eight innings, and the Houston Colts defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 7-1, in other NL action.

In the American League, the Baltimore Orioles scored a 6-5 victory over the Washington Senators; the Kansas City Athletics edged the Minnesota Twins, 4-3, and the Chicago White Sox topped the Los Angeles Angels, 9-5.

Bob Purkey, seeking to become the majors' first 10-game winner of the season, carried a 9-1 lead into the sixth inning only to have the roof fall in. The Cardinals roughed him up for three runs in the sixth and then added five more in the seventh with the key blows a three-run homer by Bill White and a two-run homer by Ken Boyer.

Lindy McDaniel, sixth St. Louis pitcher and the only one to go more than 2-3 innings, shut out the Reds for the last four innings to pick up his second victory while Sisler suffered his second defeat.

Billy O'Dell pitched a five-hitter and struck out 10 for the Giants, who scored their 12th victory in 13 games. Orlando Cepeda's two-run single in the third inning and a homer by Felipe Alou were the big blows for the giants. Bob Buhl, tagged for seven runs and nine hits in seven innings, suffered his fourth loss.

A homer and double by Willie Davis and Larry Sherry's strong relief in support of Stan Williams enabled the Dodgers to top the Pirates in their opener. Don Drysdale's eight-hit pitching and four hits by Jim Gilliam helped the Dodgers to their second-game lead when the league rule that no inning can be started after 12:30 a.m. local time caused the suspension. The game will be completed before tonight's scheduled night game.

Bob Bruce pitched a seven-hitter and struck out 10 in his first complete game in the majors as the Colts moved to within a game and a half of the sixth-place Braves. Al Spangler, Norm Larker, Carl Warwick and Bob Lillis had two hits each in the Colts' 13-hit attack.

Hits Pinch Homer — Pinch hitter Whitey Herzog's seventh-inning homer with a man aboard was the decisive blow for the Orioles, whose second game with the Senators was rained out. Billy Hoft, who retired the only batter he faced, picked up the win although Wes Stock and Hoyt Wilhelm followed him to the mound. Ken Retzer hit two homers and Chuck Hinton one for the Senators.

Norm Siebern's two-run fifth-inning homer and the four-hit pitching of John Wyatt, Diego Segui and Gordon Jones enabled the Athletics to drop the Twins into fourth place. Camilo Pascual yielded all four Kansas City runs to suffer his third loss against seven wins while Wyatt gained his fourth victory.

Charlie Smith's third single of the game drove in two runs and sparked a four-run ninth-inning rally that gave the White Sox' Dom Zanni his third win. Bo Belinsky was chased by the White Sox after 2-3 innings but reliever Ryne Duren was tagged with the loss; Leon Wagner homered for the Angels.

Larkspur Wins Epsom Over 25 Other Colts

EPSOM, England (AP)—Larkspur, owned by Raymond Guest of New York, outsped 25 other 3-year-old colts today to capture the 183rd running of the Epsom Derby.

Second over the finish line in the 1½ mile classic with its five-nation field and winner's purse of \$97,404 was the French colt Arcor, followed by another French hope, Le Cantilien.

Larkspur won by 2 lengths, and Arcor was a half length in front of Le Cantilien.

Guest's colt started at odds of 22 to 1, Arcor was 40-1, and Le Cantilien 8-1.

Winetrou '9' Gets 11-4 Win

Winetrou Motors American Legion Juniors of Myrtle Creek celebrated its 1962 debut with a decisive 11-4 victory over Marshfield's Legion nine Tuesday at Coos Bay.

Ron Weakley, star chucker of the Riddle Irish in prep ball, tossed the win for the South Douglas team. Weakley scattered six hits over the seven-inning route, struck out five and walked four. Marshfield managed to dent the plate with single runs in the first and seventh innings, and scored twice in the fifth. Weakley now sports a 1-0 League record.

Triple, Double Hit
First baseman Bill Markham provided the Myrtle Creek contingent with power at the plate. He collected two hits for three appearances at the plate—and both were for extra bases. He drove in one run in the fourth inning with a towering triple to center field, then came back to the plate in the seventh to smash a double to right-center.

Myrtle Creek's six-run fifth inning uprising led the team to the opening win. The Winetrou Motors team had taken a 2-1 lead in the fourth frame, then rallied for six more to take a commanding 8-1 margin going into the bottom of the fifth. Marshfield was never able to overcome the lead, and Myrtle Creek went on to add three insurance runs in the top of the seventh.

Marshfield Scores
Marshfield opened the scoring in the first inning. Jim Girt led off with a single, took the next two bases on a pair of Myrtle Creek errors on the same play and scored on a passed ball.

The South Douglas Legion team moved out in front with two in the fourth. Tony Quinn was safe on an error, and Don Fisher sacrificed Quinn to second. Markham tripled to center scoring the tying run. Keith Hanson's base rap scored Bill Markham with the go-ahead run.

In the fifth frame the Myrtle Creek crew capitalized on two hits, one hit batter, four walks and five Marshfield errors to score six runs. A total of 10 Myrtle Creek batters went to the plate in the rally.

Trouble Starts
Tom Morrison started the trouble for Marshfield with a walk. He stole second and Quinn was hit by the pitcher. Both runners advanced on an error before Don Fisher doubled. Fisher went to third on a passed ball and scored on an error. Markham walked, Gary Paetz was safe on an error, Hanson walked and Mike Markham walked as the Myrtle Creek players continued to circle the bases.

The seventh inning rally which netted three runs for the South Douglas team was sparked by back-to-back doubles by Bill Markham and Paetz.

Winetrou Motors next outing will be a Doug-Lane Legion League game Friday against Drain. Game time at Drain is set for 7:30 p.m. with southpaws Ran Cool of Drain and Carl Burke of Glendale set to handle the pitching for their respective teams.
