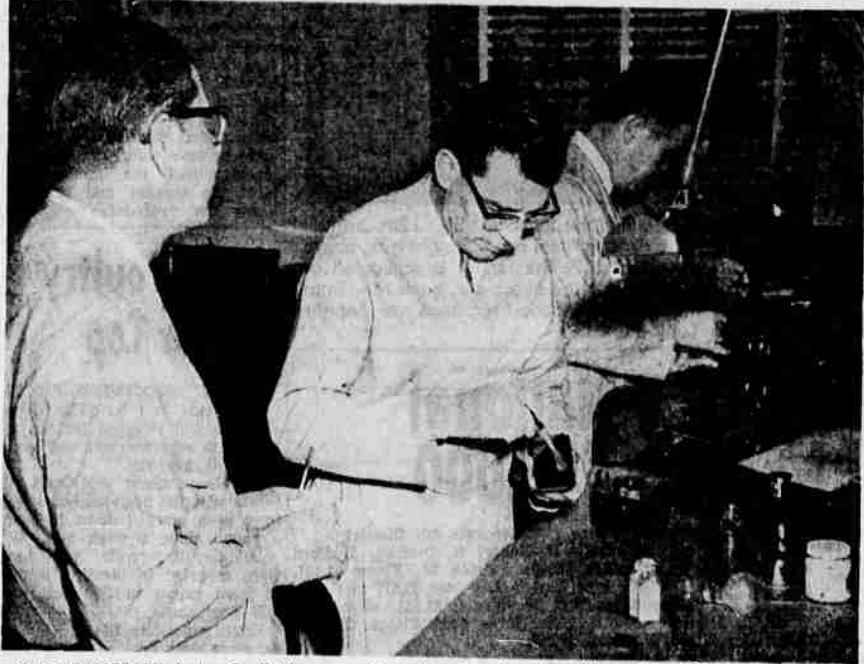

Former Sutherlin Woman Featured In Art Display

The paintings of a former Sutherlin resident, Lyla Riemenschneider of Los Osos, Calif., were recently on exhibit at the South Bay branch library in that area.

Mrs. Riemenschneider is the former Mrs. Harry Chenoweth, wife of the Sutherlin postmaster. After her husband's death, she married Frank Riemenschneider who owned and operated the Sutherlin Hardware store for several years. After spending six to eight years traveling by trailer, the Riemenschneiders settled in Los Osos and opened the Cascade Lumber Sales until their retirement in January of this year. The business is now being operated by Mrs. Riemenschneider's son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Chenoweth, also formerly of Sutherlin. Mrs. Riemenschneider, who was for several years the Sutherlin correspondent for The News-Review, is a self-taught artist. She states she has had a lifelong interest in art and painted extensively during her younger years. After the death of her son on Corridor during World War II, she put aside her brush and has only recently begun to think of painting again. She now paints for several hours each day. The pictures are all framed by her husband, and this gives him an interesting hobby for his retired years. This is Mrs. Riemenschneider's first California showing. Previously she had received a prize in an art show at the Douglas County Fair.

Douglas Undersheriff Completes Course At National FBI Academy

Douglas County's Undersheriff Lyle C. Dickenson was one of 80 specially selected officers who have just completed the 69th session of the FBI National Academy.

Graduation exercises were held Wednesday morning in Washington D.C. This brings the ranks of the academy alumni to well over 4,100, reports FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover. These men who are trained as instructors and police administrators will return to their own departments to impart the knowledge they gained during their training, he said.

The graduating class and their guests were honored with addresses by Charles L. Bacon, national commander of the American Legion; Sylvester C. Smith Jr., president elect, the American Bar Association; and Deputy Inspector Michael J. Codd, New York City Police Department, president of the graduating class. Diplomas were presented by Deputy Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach.

John H. Williams, special agent in charge of the Portland office of the FBI, said people of this area can be justifiably proud of Undersheriff Dickenson for his successful completion of the National Academy course.

The rigorous schedule included a thorough study of all the latest techniques and developments in law enforcement and their practical applications.

A previous graduate of the FBI National Academy was Chief of Police John T. Truett, Roseburg, and former chief Vernon Murdoch Jr.

The greatest number of the spectators were children. There were 174 adult admissions.
