Hold That Face Paint, Say The Boys
(But That Doesn't Mean Abolish Makeup)

If a girl wants to wear makeup in addition to lipstick, she can count generally on the approval of boys, as long as she doesn't overdo it, especially in daylight hours.

"Did you ever see a girl in the morning without it?" asked Lindsey Rye, 15, of Russellville, Ark.

Among the 900 young people we talked to, he was with the 70 per cent of the boys who favored makeup. Girls voted for it 67 per cent.

Our researches also confirmed that:

Young men still prefer blondes, and curly blondes at that.

Young women reject long hair for men, prefer crew cuts.

The most common objection to makeup, as voiced by Elaine Shultz, 17, of Revere, Mass., was: "It cheapens a girl's appearance."

"If she wants to look like a witch," said Patsy Croker, 14, of Tolono, Ill., "it's her own business." But Carol Bussey, 16, of Sadorus, Ill., thought the schools should have a say because "in some cases girls go ape over cosmetics."

When Should She Start?

The boys were more liberal than the girls, again, on the question of whether girls tend to use too much of the stuff. No, said 57 of the boys as against 44 per cent of the girls.

"The better girls don't show off by putting it on four feet thick," commented Stephen Deter, 17, of Austin, Minn.

When should a girl start using cosmetics? Fourteen was the age most favored by both boys and girls.

"They start looking more like adults then," explained Don Facetti of Bartow, Fla., from the viewpoint of 17 years.

Most young people frown on girls wearing heavy makeup before nightfall. The girls were against it almost unanimously, and

the boys by 86 per cent.

"It gives boys the wrong idea," said Tim Kelley, 17, of Monticello, Ill.

While half the young people feel that girls generally spend too much on cosmetics, 81 per cent of them think it does improve their looks. "No matter how beautiful a girl is, a little makeup never hurts," opined Kenneth E. Gray, 18, of Huntington Park, Calif.

Did You See That Hairdo?

Jumping from face-dos to hairdos, we collected some caustic comments on styles that call for "teasing," but found that about 44 per cent of both boys and girls approve them nevertheless.

"I think it makes girls look like frightened porcupines," said Patsy Croker of Tolono, Ill.

"It makes them look like they have a fat head," asserted Larry Patuano, 16, of Detroit.

And Jean Beaird, 17, of Sacramento, Calif., cautioned that "it ruins the hair, splits the ends, and is going out of style."

It also appears that young gentlemen do indeed prefer blondes, especially curly blondes. Fifty-five per cent go for curly hair and 49

Sen. Morse Objects
To Claims Misuse
In National Forests

PORTLAND (UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., has expressed concern over misuses of mining claims on national forests.

Morse said the comptroller general had reported to Congress frequent violations of the purposes of the mining law, including several in Oregon.

He said one of the major Oregon violations was use of mining claims for removal of timber when no mining had been done or was being done. The Al Sarena case was cited by the comptroller general, Morse said, as an example of one where no minerals had been removed since the patent was issued, but "over five million board feet of timber had been cut."

Morse said that in another case, 400 million board feet of National Forest timber and 200 million board feet of private timber was being blocked from access by action of mining claimants on the Rogue River National Forest. He said mining claimants also were holding up sales on the Siskiyou National Forest.

Morse said he was advised by Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, chairman of the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, that steps had been taken to have secretaries of agriculture and interior make a full report and submit corrective legislation.

Morse said both he and Anderson were firm that legitimate mining on National Forest land be protected. But, Morse said, the comptroller general's report showed mining claims being used not only to block timber uses but also as summer homes, hotels, business establishments, and in some cases, undesirable activities.

Tiny Thailand Village Gets Special Attention Of Police

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI)—Here, where the Mekong River forms the east-west boundary between Laos and Thailand, a barren sandbar stretches out from the steep river bank nearly a mile toward the Thailand shore.

A mile or so upstream, huddled listlessly on the far shore, is a small Thai village.

The village and its thatched huts ordinarily scarcely would be worth a second glance. But today it gets special attention from Thai police on guard against Pathet Lao infiltrators hoping to read the Communist guerrilla war in Laos across the river into Thailand.

It is not too difficult a trick because more Laotians live in north-

east Thailand than in all of Laos itself. Rainfall hits the northeast plateau only during the two to three months of the monsoon season and the poverty of the people makes them natural targets for the Communists.

Monsoon Coming

The Mekong now is not the impressive river it will become in a few weeks. When the monsoon hits it will run a mile and a half wide, brimming from bank to bank. The monsoon will fill the paddies, turn the few roads into bottomless pits, and nature will take a hand in military strategy.

The Mekong is impressive now because it represents a deep, new commitment for the United States.

It is a new fixed line of defense which could become as significant for Americans as Berlin, the 38th Parallel in Korea or the Straits

of Formosa.

Across the river, just 35 miles away at Udorn are U.S. Marines, and scattered up and down the line from Chiang Mai in the north to Ubon in the south are other token Allied forces of Great Britain, Australia and New Zealand.

Conquest Easy

Western military and diplomatic representatives here accept the fact that the Pathet Lao and their Communist Viet Minh allies from North Viet Nam could, if they wished, complete the conquest of Laos in one lightning blow.

Then would come a test at the Mekong if the Communists should decide to expand their offensive into Thailand.

Despite the imminence of military defeat and their promises to negotiate, evidence still remains

that Premier Prince Boun Oum and strongman Gen. Phoumi Nosavan hope to retain their position. Such could be accomplished only if a minimum of 300,000 U. S. troops entered Laos.
