Archdeacon Gives Parents A Guide On How To Turn Their Children Into Crooks

CHESTERFIELD, England (AP)—The Archdeacon of Chesterfield today gave his Church of England parishioners a handy guide on "How to turn your child into a crook."

Drawing a bead on indulgent parents, the Venerable Talbot Dillworth-Harrison listed these 12 rules in his parish magazine:

1. Begin from infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe that the world owes him a living.
2. When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. It will encourage him to pick up "cuter phrases" that will blow the top of your head off later.
3. Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he is 21, and then let him decide for himself.
4. Avoid the use of the word "wrong." It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later when he is arrested for stealing a car that society is against him and he is being persecuted.
5. Pick up everything he leaves lying around—books, shoes and clothes. Do everything for him so he will be experienced in throwing the responsibility on to others.
6. Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful the silverware and drinking glasses are sterilized but let his mind feed on garbage.
7. Quarrel frequently in the presence of the children. Then they won't be shocked when the home is broken up.
8. Give the child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?
9. Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort. See that every desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration. Take his part against the neighbors, teachers and policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.
10. When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying, "I never could do anything with him."
11. Prepare for a life of grief—"You will have it."

Leadership Must Remain With U.S., Adenauer Relates

DORTMUND, Germany (AP)—A convention of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's Christian Democratic party is proving a sounding board for kind words for President Kennedy's administration, a contrast to some remarks in the past.

Adenauer told the gathering recently there have been differences between him and Kennedy, but these have never affected the basic policy or goals of the United States and West Germany.

"It is absolutely essential that the leadership of the Western world remains with the United States and the United States must have in Europe a valuable partner," he said.

Economics Minister Ludwig Erhard pursued the same thought in an address Monday. He said the final answer to West Europe's longing for peace, freedom and security was not the Common Market or European cooperation but an Atlantic community.

Erhard, who is also vice chancellor, singled out Kennedy's initiative to intensify the economic ties between the United States and the rest of the non-Communist world as serving the cause of an eventual Atlantic political union.

Differences between Adenauer and Kennedy have arisen from international authority to control access to West Berlin. Adenauer had felt that such a move would give further recognition to Communist East Germany.

Willamette Plans New Development

SALEM (AP)—A \$5 million development program is planned at Willamette University.

Trustees have not announced details, but the project is expected to include a South Campus expansion.

This development, discussed last summer by President G. Herbert Smith, would give Willamette a new school campus, a new administration building, a new student structure and more student housing.

At a meeting Saturday night Willamette alumni named W. R. Thomas, a Lebanon attorney, president-elect, to take office 1963. Automatically moving up as president for the coming year is Otto J. Wilson, a Salem automobile dealer.

Five graduates were announced as winners of alumni citation awards, which they will receive at the annual Founders and Benefactors Day next February. They are Dr. and Mrs. H. Leslie Frewing of Vancouver, Wash.; Circuit Judge Arlie Walker of McMinnville; Mrs. Albert Nelson of St. John, Wash.; and M. E. Moore of Salem.
