

Brown, Nixon Have Their Work Cut Out As Primary Election Count Continues

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Gov. Edmund G. Brown and Richard M. Nixon have their work cut out for them in primary election results still accumulating today.

The Democratic governor's immediate job was to decide whether he'll call a special session of the legislature to resubmit defeated state bond issues to the November ballot.

Pearson Draws Scathing Attack

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. H. Carl Anderson, R-Minn., attacked columnist Drew Pearson on the house floor Wednesday for an article detailing Anderson's connection with the Billie Sol Estes case.

Anderson referred to the newspaper column as "the spewings of a degenerate mind," and said Pearson is motivated by "insane hatred for decent men and women with whom he cannot associate."

He referred to the columnist in such terms as "polecat," "liar" and "skunk."

Pearson, whom former President Harry S. Truman once called an s.o.b., said that "I am accustomed to being called names by presidents. I don't comment on vituperation from those of lesser rank."

Taking the floor on a point of personal privilege, Anderson said his Republican friends have been avoiding him since details came out two months ago that Estes purchased \$4,000 worth of stock in a family coal mine from Anderson. It is near Ravensdale, Wash.

The Pearson article covered the Estes coal mine stock deal, which was disclosed two months ago by a Texas Court of Inquiry.

Anderson, who previously has denied any wrongdoing in the stock sale, repeated Wednesday that he has asked the FBI to investigate and that he has offered to testify before the Senate investigations subcommittee after it opens hearings June 27.



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Brown said he would announce his decision within a few days. Nixon's obvious assignment was to try and unite the Republican party behind his candidacy for governor. He expressed confidence GOP regulars and conservatives would patch up their differences.

Nixon, who defeated conservative Assemblyman Joseph C. Shell of Los Angeles by 2 to 1 in the GOP gubernatorial primary, outlined plans for a harmony meeting with party leaders and candidates soon.

Shell, the choice of 35 per cent of the Republican voters, telegraphed his congratulations to Nixon Wednesday. But again he hedged on planting his banner in Nixon's camp.

"We can win in November only if we stand firm without compromising our principles," he said.

With 22,836 of 31,212 statewide precincts reporting, Nixon had 891,766, Shell 470,006.

Brown's total from 22,738 precincts climbed to 1,248,760 to maintain his 7 to 1 margin over three unknowns.

The returns signified another close race in the fall for U.S. Senate between Republican Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel and Democrat Richard Richards of Los Angeles, a state senator.

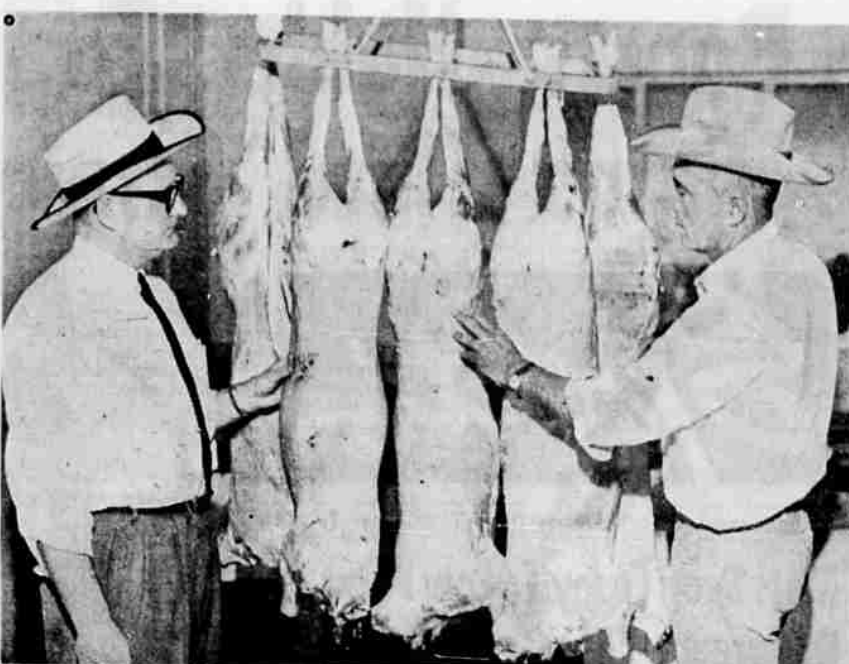
In plain language it said the envelopes of standard sizes are more easily and quickly handled through the mail.

Jacqueline Visits Her Father-In-Law

NEW YORK (AP)—Mrs. John F. Kennedy arrived here Wednesday to visit her ailing father-in-law, former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy.

The First Lady made the trip in the Kennedy family plane, the Caroline. She checked in at the Hotel Carlyle, her usual Manhattan quarters.

Mrs. Kennedy was joined at the hospital by her mother-in-law. After a 40-minute visit with her in-laws, the President's wife had a 10-minute conference with Dr. Howard A. Rusk, director of New York University's Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, where the elder Kennedy is recuperating from the effects of a stroke.

Dr. Rusk reported that Kennedy is making great progress.

SIGN ECONOMIC PACT

CAIRO (UPI)—The United Arab Republic, Syria, Jordan, Kuwait and Morocco signed an economic unity agreement Wednesday designed eventually to establish an Arab common market.

The agreement provides for the setting up of a joint economic council which will work to lift tariff barriers, allow freedom of work movement and capital investment, and free use of harbor facilities.

Communist China Boycotts Soviet Bloc Summit Confab

MOSCOW (UPI)—Communist China today was reported boycotting the Soviet bloc summit conference from which Albania has been banned.

While the conference was called to cope with economic problems and the challenge of the European Common Market, the absence of China and Albania indicated that the still-smoldering Moscow-Peking rift may be high on the agenda.

The conference opened Wednesday with government heads and Communist party chiefs in attendance from the Soviet Union, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria and East Germany. Details of the closed session in the Kremlin were not disclosed.

The Communist leaders were assembled at a plenary session of the Council for Mutual Economic Assistance which co-ordinates industrial development and trade within the Soviet bloc.

The presence of the Communist world's top figures indicated the conference would extend its discussions beyond economic problems of such key issues as Berlin and Germany, disarmament, rapprochement with Yugoslavia, and the Kremlin's ideological differences with Peking and Albania.

Marilyn Faces Possible Law Suit, Replacement In New Movie Role

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Actress Marilyn Monroe today faces a possible law suit or replacement in her new film for failure to appear for work.

Producer Henry Weinstein said Wednesday that 20th Century-Fox Studios definitely would take some action against Miss Monroe "to protect the picture, our stockholders and the other artists in the cast."

Weinstein said the blonde star had reported only 12 days out of the 32 she was supposed to have worked on "Something's Got to Give" which costars Dean Martin.

"She appeared for the picture several weeks late," Weinstein said, "then after working only three days she flew to New York to celebrate the President's birthday party."

"She has a responsibility to do this picture and now we have to take some kind of action. She has completely flouted professional discipline and is responsible for putting 104 crew members out of work."

A spokesman for Miss Monroe said, "Marilyn isn't being difficult. She's been ill and unable to work."

However, Weinstein claimed the actress had a low grade sinus infection and a temperature of 99 degrees. He said she failed to report for work last Monday and has not appeared for the past three days.

"It means taking the bread right out of the mouths of the men who are depending on this picture to support their families. Her running off to President Kennedy's party was enough to make Republicans out of everybody on the set."

Co-star Martin said, "we had some little kids in the picture when we started out. Now they're ready for college."

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
