

Beamer's Bat Boosts Hobbs To Victory; Lockwood Nine Earns Third Straight Win

Roseburg Catcher Cracks Double In 7th For Triumph

Jim Beamer smashed a double to right-center field in the top of the seventh to provide the Lockwood Motors Legion nine of Roseburg with the necessary punch for its third consecutive victory of the season Wednesday at Camp White.

Beamer picked on a three-and-two pitch with the bases loaded and sent the ball sailing to the outfield fence 400 feet from the plate. Two runs scored on Beamer's two-bagger and the winning run came home when the throw got by the

catcher. The three-run uprising provided the Roseburg squad with a thrilling 3-2 win over the host Cheney Studs Legion team of Central Point.

While Beamer's was the big blow for the Lockwood Motors contingent, Tom Hobbs was the mound hero. Hobbs limited the Cheney team to two hits, walked two and struck out 15. Hobbs' blazing fastball had the Cheney batters swinging wildly all evening. His curves were breaking just enough to keep the opposition off balance.

Hobbs' Trouble
Most of Hobbs' trouble came as the result of fielding errors behind the ace right-hander. Once Hobbs was given the lead he made short work of the Cheney Studs in the final inning when he struck out the side to pick up his second win of the young Legion season.

Roseburg's winning rally came with one away in the top of the seventh. Gordon Avery worked his way for a free pass. The Crater shortstop bobbled Doug Coplin's grounder and both runners were safe. Dennis Arana loaded the bases with another walk.

Beamer watched three balls sail away from the plate, then took two called strikes. Pouncing on the next pitch Beamer drove in the tying runs with his mighty double. Arana crossed the plate when the throw in from the outfield got by the catcher. His run proved to be the winning tally for Roseburg.

Cheney Threatened
Earlier in the game Roseburg had watched several threats go by the boards as the Cheney Studs turned in an outstanding performance. In the sixth frame three walks loaded the bases for the Lockwood Motors team, but a

strike-out ended the uprising before the plate could be denied.

Crater took the lead in the first inning capitalizing on a pair of Roseburg errors. Mike Glines reached first on a throwing error by Marv French. A sacrifice sent Glines to second and he moved on to third on a passed ball. Jeff Anhorn sent a sharp grounder at the second baseman, who elected to try for Glines at the plate. Glines slid in safely as the catcher dropped the throw.

In the fifth frame Crater picked up its second run. Glines led off with a triple to deep center field. A Roseburg error again allowed Glines to score.

Cheney Pitcher
Larry Mason handled the pitching for the Cheney Studs. Mason struck out three, gave up six hits and walked six. Throughout the early innings Mason kept the hits and walks scattered, but wildness in the final stanzas cost him the win. Five of Mason's six walks were issued in the final two innings.

Beamer was the only Roseburg stickler to get more than one hit. The Roseburg catcher singled in the second inning and doubled in the seventh for a 2-3 record at the plate. Glines' triple and a first-inning single by Jeff Anhorn were the lone hits for Crater.

Roseburg now sports a 3-0 record—with all three wins being over the Cheney Studs. The local nine

Mets Drag Casey To Low Point Of Career—17 Losses In Row

It's official today that the New York Mets have dragged Casey Stengel to the lowest point of his 50-year career in baseball.

The suspicion that this might happen had been growing on people for some time, but it wasn't until Wednesday night when the Philadelphia Phillies extended the Mets' losing streak to 17 games with a 2-0 and 2-1 victories that it became as plain as 71-year-old Casey's drooping shoulders.

No team that Casey ever managed or played for ever lost 17 in a row before and it doesn't help the old man, either, when he glances over at the American League standings and notes that the New York Yankees—the club which fired him after the 1960 season—are right up there in first place as usual.

Things could become worse before they get better for Stengel, too, because now the Mets are only six losses short of the modern big league record of 23 straight suffered by the 1961 Phillies. The 17 straight defeats are also the most ever suffered by any New York big league team.

Cal McLish pitched a seven-hitter to blank the Mets in the first game of Wednesday's twin-nighter and then Art Mahaffey turned in

a four-hitter to complete the sweep. Tony Taylor figured in both Philadelphia runs in the opener and Wes Covington singled in the ninth inning to drive in the decisive run of the nightcap.

Meanwhile, back at Casey's old stand in The Bronx, the Yankees regained the AL lead with a 5-0 triumph over the Cleveland Indians. Ralph Terry's four-hit pitching and back-to-back sixth-inning homers by Roger Maris and Johnny Blanchard paved the way for the Yankee victory which tagged Jim Grant with his first defeat of the season.

The Los Angeles Dodgers moved to within a half-game of first place in the National League when they completed their suspended game of Tuesday night with an 8-3 win and then downed the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-3, in a regularly scheduled night game. The Chicago Cubs defeated the San Francisco Giants, 4-3, the St. Louis Cardinals downed the Cincinnati Reds, 4-3, and the Milwaukee Braves beat the Houston Colts, 6-3, in other games.

In other AL games, the Detroit Tigers beat the Boston Red Sox, 3-2, after a 2-1 loss; the Washington Senators edged out the Baltimore Orioles, 2-1; the Los Angeles Angels shut out the Chicago White Sox, 1-0, and the Minnesota Twins topped the Kansas City Athletics, 7-0.

Bob Feller, newest member of baseball's Hall of Fame, is slated to attend Eugene's fifth Annual All-Star tournament June 15-17.

June 15 he will be guest speaker at the banquet for the teams; while June 16-17 he will watch the games at Bethel Park.

Feller started pitching at the age of 15. In 1936, at the age of 17, he was signed by the Cleveland Indians.

In his first season of major league ball he tied Dizzy Dean's record of 17 strikeouts in a single game. Continuing to break records, he pitched a no-hitter in 1940 against Chicago.

Returning to baseball in 1945 after the war, it looked like he had lost the touch. But in 1946 Feller proved that he was the same pitcher. In this year he won 26 games, including 10 shutouts and broke "Rube" Waddell's 42-year-old strike-out record for one season.

In recent years Feller has written a book called "Strikeout Story" and has opened a baseball school in Tampa, Fla.

Two local stars, Tom Hobbs, Roseburg, and Gary Cox, Drain, will be seeing action for the State All-Stars. Hobbs is slated for outfield duty, while Cox is set to go behind the plate.
