Berlin Customs Men To Carry Carbines

BERLIN (UPI) — The three Western Allies have approved arming with carbine of West Berlin customs officials posted along the Communist wall dividing East and West Berlin, it was announced today.

An Allied spokesman said the decision was made in mid-April but held confidential.

West Berlin city government officials said the customs officials will receive the carbines, probably Americans M-2 quick-firing models, within the next two weeks. They carry only steel truncheons now.

More than 1,000 customs officials are involved, sources said.

The Allies late last year approved arming West Berlin police along the borders with East Berlin and East Germany. These policemen, whose number is classified, received the M-2, which can fire up to 50 rounds a minute.

Communists border guards along both the zonal and East-West Berlin frontiers long have been armed with Russian-designed automatic machine pistols.

Proposal Would Curb Left Wing Influence In Presidential Voting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Joint Resolution No. 12 is a proposal to amend the Constitution to break the backs of the political pressure groups which unfairly dominate the selection of presidential nominees and their election.

The proposed amendment, notably, would diminish the political muscle of the dynamic left wing of the political influence in presidential elections of big labor, of racial groups, and of big cities in the big industrial states.

S.J. Res. No. 12, therefore, invites the support of conservative-minded Americans, regardless of party. The resolution was sponsored by Sens. Karl L. Mundt, R-S.D., Strom Thurmond, D-S.C., Thruston B. Morton, R-Ky., Hiram L. Fong, R-Hawaii, Roman L. Hruska, R-Nebr., Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz. and John L. McClellan, D-Ark.

The resolution has been approved by a subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee. The purpose is to establish the election of presidential electors as congressional delegations are elected: Two from each state at large as U.S. senators are elected; the others to be elected each from a congressional district as members of the House are elected.

The present system is that all electors are elected at large. This is deemed by sponsors of the resolution to be unfair. A pamphlet of the American Good Government Society of Washington, D.C., seeks to explain why the present system is unfair, in this way:

The present system has given the large pivotal states with big blocs of electoral votes a practical control over the nomination and election of presidential candidates. This system gives to organized pressure groups within a single big city the voting power to determine the outcome of the election in that state when the major party strength is closely divided.

The 1960 popular vote for major party electoral states in New York State was Republicans, 3,446,419 and Democratic, 3,423,900, giving a Republican plurality of 22,519. The Liberal party electoral slate, however, polled 406,176 votes. Liberal and Democratic electoral slates were identical. The liberal vote combined with the Democratic vote elected all of the Liberal-Democratic slate and defeated all of the Republicans. More than 70 per cent of the Liberal vote was cast in New York City.

Returns in California and Pennsylvania reflected the distortion of the 1960 election. Each state had two U.S. Senators and 30 representatives. Republican Nixon won California, Democrat Ken-
