

Here's Biographical Sketches Of New School Administrators

Here are background sketches on the three educators who will assume new administrative roles when the next fiscal year begins:

Romayne R. Brand — Brand has a bachelor of science degree from the University of Oregon (1926), a diploma of graduation from Oregon Normal School (1927) and a master of arts degree from Stanford University (1929).

Brand taught seventh grade and was vice principal at Wichita elementary school, was a critic instructor and later principal at Oregon Normal School. He was dean of boys and social studies instructor at Raymond (Wash.) High School, later principal. He became principal of Roseburg Junior High School in 1931, later moving to Joseph Lane.

education degree in 1937 and a master of education degree in 1958—both from the University of Idaho.

He taught math and science at Lyle (Wash.) High School during 1937-38 and math at Gilroy (Calif.) High School from 1939 to 1961. He has been dean of boys and math teacher at Joseph Lane during the past year.

Trowbridge has also had coaching duties at each of the three schools where he has instructed. He is a member of Phi Kappa Epsilon, physical education honorary fraternity.

Jacklin Gets Golf Course Concession

The city Parks and Recreation Commission has awarded the pro shop concession at Roseburg Municipal Golf Course to Arlo Jacklin of River Bend Rd.

Jacklin, a former mayor here, operates the Roseburg Bowl.

The action, taken at a commission meeting Thursday, follows a recently-announced city decision to switch responsibility of the pro shop from the park superintendent to a fulltime concessionaire.

Plan Outlined

The new concessionaire will be required to provide full supervision over golf play and pro shop facilities. An agreement will allow the operator to sell golf supplies, equipment and food. He will receive 10 per cent of green fees collected for the city.

In other business Thursday, the commission approved a request from the Roseburg Softball Association to locate a softball diamond between the YMCA building and Legion Field at Stewart Park.

Seimar Hutchins, it was reported, has offered "to provide a grader for use in preparing the field and Al Flegel will haul to location a backstop which was acquired previously."

The softball association will install the lights.

Brittill Appointed

Commission Chairman Jack Davis announced appointment of Walter Brittill as commission representative on a governing committee for the Pee Wee Baseball Program.

A policy restricting Stewart Park to outdoor recreational use was reaffirmed by the commission. A resolution approved Thursday noted that restricted recreational use was the intent of the original developers.

The policy was reaffirmed in the light of increasing requests for various uses at the park. The resolution leaves the door open, however, for joint development of park uses with the Roseburg School District.

Donnelly Named Vice President Of Public Health Association

A former county sanitarian and the present county health officer were in the spotlight at the Portland meeting of the western branch of the American Public Health Association.

The annual conference ended Thursday with resolutions and election of officers.

An outstanding service award was given former Douglas County Sanitarian Verne C. Reiersen, chief of the environmental sanitation section of the Oregon Board of Health. Reiersen served in the county for some time in the mid-1950s before being boosted to a state post.

Reiersen received his award for writing of legislation and establishment of programs for the Board of Health over the last eight years.

The other county man given notice at the meeting was Dr. John Donnelly, county health officer. He was named vice president of the organization. Mrs. Vivian E. Runte, public health nurse, was named president, the United Press International says.

Dr. Robert D. Anderson, assistant surgeon general of the U. S. Public Health Service, said medical research in general has increased from \$45 million in 1940 to \$800 million last year. He said research in the public health field has lagged behind other medical research except in the field of epidemiology.

Reach For Moon Carpenter Tells Young Graduates

BOULDER, Colo. (AP)—Astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter urged a starry-eyed Boulder High School graduating class Thursday night to reach for the moon.

"Your horizons are limited only by your own vision," said the Navy lieutenant commander, who was graduated from the same school 19 years ago.

Carpenter, 37, received a standing ovation from the 316 seniors and 2,500 relatives and guests.

The hometown hero, who two weeks earlier orbited the earth, said: "Going to the moon is no longer fantasy. There's a slight chance that men my age might someday be on the moon. Possibly people of your age will land not on the moon, but on the moons of Mars, and then on Mars itself."

Recalling his youth, Carpenter termed the world one of chaos when he was graduated in 1943.

"But the world you enter, in case you've heard news to the contrary, is rich with promise," he said. "You really don't know what riches await you. They await but they're not going to drop into your lap. You have to go get them."

Carpenter said the graduates have their work cut out for them.

"We are engaged now in a battle with another ideology for the minds of men, the effects of which may be felt for another 1,000 years," he said. "It is your responsibility, whether you like it or not, to see that our God-fearing way of life continues and that freedom survives."



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Myrtle Creek Man Draws Prison Term

Harley Eugene Cahill Jr., 34, Myrtle Creek, Thursday was sentenced to serve one year in the Oregon State Penitentiary by Circuit Judge Don H. Sanders.

Cahill pleaded guilty to the district attorney's information charging him with receiving and concealing stolen property. The property is listed as belonging to Ken's Dry Cleaning, owned by Kenneth and Jessie Glass, 530 NE Garden Valley Blvd. The property was taken in a burglary at that location.

Property Found

Cahill, arrested by Myrtle Creek police for vagrancy, had the additional charge preferred by the sheriff's department after a search of his apartment by the Myrtle Creek police and sheriff's deputies revealed the missing property.

Also sentenced to the penitentiary was Augusta Yarber, 41, transient, who drew 2½ years from Judge Sanders on a plea of guilty to larceny from a motor vehicle.

Yarber was accused in the district attorney's information with the theft of suitcases from the car of Clarence and Rosemary Loderback on May 7. He was arrested by the Roseburg City Police and the suitcases were found in Yarber's room in a local hotel. Yarber told officers he had served previous time in prison.

Time Requested

Two other men, indicted by the Douglas County Grand Jury on charges of assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon, asked for additional time for entering a plea, when arraigned before Judge Sanders Thursday. They are William Mathew Simmons, 25, Winston, and Bill Ernest Hunter, 27, Sutherlin, accused of the recent armed robbery of the Hill Crest Flying A Service Station. They were arrested by State Police at Roseburg.

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Threat Of NW Lumber Strike Continues

PORTLAND (UPI)—Wage negotiations between the International Woodworkers union and Simpson Timber Co. recessed after only a few hours here Thursday with no agreement and the threat of a lumber strike appeared strong.

The talks followed almost the same pattern as all earlier ones between two large lumber unions and employers. The unions are asking wage increases of 30 cents an hour. Employers say the industry cannot afford any increases now.

"Unless the employers' position is changed, there will be a

strike," Harvey Nelson, president of the IWA's Western Regional Council, predicted after Thursday's meeting.

He said his union has a policy meeting scheduled the week of June 18 and may decide then whether to call a strike. Both the IWA and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union have strike authorizations from their members.

The IWA has meetings scheduled with two independent producers, St. Regis Paper Co. and Mountain Tree Farm, next Tuesday in Tacoma, but four other independents and the 191-member Timber Operators Council have failed to budge in their stand

against wage increases. Simpson and the IWA did conclude a pension agreement at Thursday's meeting. The general outline was agreed upon a year ago and committees were appointed to work out the details.
