

Democrats To Choose Today Between Teddie And Eddie

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP)—Rickering Massachusetts Democrats try to simmer down enough tonight to get a preliminary answer to this politically explosive question: Who will it be, Teddie or Eddie?

In more formal language, will the Democrats endorse Edward M. (Ted) Kennedy, brother of the President, or the state attorney general, Edward J. McCormack Jr., nephew of House Speaker John McCormack, for U.S. senator?

Party chieftains will put in a full day before reaching their big decision, probably late tonight. Both men—Teddie is 30, Eddie is 38—flashed brilliant, confident smiles and claimed victory.

Kennedy—"We will have a clear majority" with possibly 1,000 votes.

McCormack—"I have 916." Since it takes 862 votes to win if all the delegates are present, somebody's arithmetic is remarkably shoddy.

Charges and counter-charges flew. McCormack told a news conference he is "doing the President a favor" by attempting to defeat his brother.

"There is a lot of talk about the national dynasty issue now," he explained. "The Republicans would have the greatest domestic issue if Ted is elected, but if Ted is defeated the dynasty issue is dead."

Kennedy denied emphatically at his own news session rumors that income tax investigations, deportation proceedings and promises of postmasterships were being used to swing delegates into his camp. McCormack specifically mentioned 52 postmasterships left unfilled.

Kennedy answered that such charges "insult the integrity" of McCormack supporters.

McCormack charges pressure and "arm-twisting" have been used to lure his delegates. He said

World Madmen Had Religion, Graham Relates

CHICAGO (AP)—"It is a strange quirk that the great madmen of history all have had some form of religion," evangelist Billy Graham said Thursday night.

Graham's ninth sermon of his current 19-day Chicago Crusade for Christ was heard by 18,000 persons—the smallest crowd of the crusade. The largest audience was 44,000 last Sunday. Graham devoted much of his talk to the recently executed Adolf Eichmann, comparing the ex-Nazi with the infamous Biblical king, Manasseh.

"Probably in our day, the most wicked man you can think of is Adolf Eichmann, the man who planned and executed six million people. Eichmann was guilty of idolatry."

"Instead of God, Eichmann believed in the super race. He believed man was God and this was responsible for the degeneracy whereby he could murder six million people."

But, Graham said, Eichmann did have a certain belief in God. "He had an intellectual concept of God, which was not sufficient. It was a quirk that the great madmen of history all have had a form of religion."

"Stalin once studied for the priesthood. Nazi propagandist Joseph Goebbels went to Sunday school. And Manasseh, who did the most abominable things, even he turned to religion and God forgave him."

"God could have forgiven Eichmann too, if Eichmann had accepted Him."

Southern Baptists Object To Banning Disputed Book

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Troubled by a book, Southern Baptists don't want it banned outright. But they want their agencies to be more careful about what they publish—and teach.

This was the policy-setting word from the big church body's annual convention as it neared a close today.

More than 10,000 assembled "messengers" also turned down a proposal that they expand their organizational territory beyond the country's borders.

Opponents said such a step would cause dangerous, divisive and damaging rivalry with Baptist bodies in other nations.

However, it was the doctrinal

teaching and publishing controversy, flaming through the 10-million-member denomination in recent months that roused the convention heat.

Conservative forces, charging liberal theological tendencies in seminaries and other agencies, centered their protests on a book, "The Message of Genesis," by an Old Testament scholar, Dr. Ralph Elliott of Midwestern Seminary in Kansas City.

In a tempestuous, see-saw battle, moves were twice launched to force Broadman Press, run by the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board, to suppress the book and call in all copies from outlets.

One Midwestern minister, at the urging of Baptist leaders, voluntarily withdrew his motion for such action. But another pastor, the Rev. Ben D. Windham of Portland, Ore., Thursday night again pressed the same proposal.

It was narrowly defeated, by a standing vote.

In his book, Dr. Elliott takes the view that some sections of Genesis present religious truth in figurative rather than literal terms.

Methodists Schedule Ordinations Tonight

SALEM (AP)—Ordination of four ministers and retirement of four others is scheduled tonight at the Oregon Methodist Conference.

To be ordained into the organization's executive session are Rev. Eugene Groves of Sutherlin, Wilbur Church; Rev. Lochlen Gregory, Gold Hill Church; Rev. Wesley Hall, Odell Church; and Rev. Everett Kennedy, who will receive a congregation appointment.

Retiring from the session are Dr. Robert M. Gatke, Salem, a professor at Willamette University for 45 years; Rev. Fremont Paul of Sellwood Church in Portland, a minister for 41 years; Dr. C. V. Gustafson, a professor at Lewis and Clark College and a minister for 39 years; and Rev. Giles V. Wilson, a minister for 33 years who is currently with the Sheridan Methodist Church.

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Winners Agree Fortune Makes Champ Speller

WASHINGTON (AP)—The co-winners of the National Spelling Bee contest agree that luck, more than anything else, makes a champion speller.

"Most of the words I never heard of," admitted Michael Day, 14, Hardin, Ill., who shares the 1962 title with tall brunette Nettie Crawford, 13, Roswell, N.M.

"It was pretty rough," Nettie thought.

Because most of the words were so difficult the two eighth graders waged what amounted to more of a guessing game in Thursday's final round of the 35th annual spelling bee. Their battle finally was declared a draw.

Nettie and Mike became champions by spelling correctly such tongue-twisters as "unguiculate," meaning having claws or nails, and "monocotyledon," a botanical term referring to seed plants.

The two winners each pick up bronze trophies and a \$1,000 prize at a win-win banquet tonight and then they'll head for an all-expenses paid sightseeing weekend in New York City.

Nettie's father runs a 600-acre cotton and alfalfa ranch and Mike's dad is with the Social Security Administration in Hardin.

Indians Release Grounded Yacht

PORT ANGELES, Wash. (AP)—A spokesman for an insurance company says the Makah Indians have agreed to let a salvage crew remove a luxury yacht from the beach about 14 miles south of Cape Flattery.

The 42-foot yacht Phoebe, bound from Portland to Seattle with Mr. and Mrs. Russell Woodruff and their son, Russell Jr., of Portland aboard, ran out of fuel in a storm June 1.

The Coast Guard removed the Russells, and the \$70,000 claim they towed the Makahs craft to shore to save it.

The Insurance Co. of North America awarded John Sweatt and Ron Little, co-owners of a Port Angeles charter boat and salvage firm, a \$9,000 contract to remove the boat.

When they arrived early this week to remove the Phoebe, however, a group of Makahs ordered them away, saying they were on reservation land.

But the Makahs changed their minds. Bob Jeffery of the insurance company said Thursday the tribe agreed to let a salvage crew remove the boat after the Indians were assured the removal would not prejudice their financial interest in the Phoebe.

Khrush Objected To Paris Summit

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev disclosed Thursday night that he did not want to attend the ill-fated 1960 Paris summit conference with President Eisenhower but did so apparently to satisfy other Kremlin leaders.

Khrushchev made the disclosure at a reception during which he attacked the European Common Market and urged Italy to quit the trading group and expand commercial relations with Russia.

The economic challenge presented by the Common Market was believed to be a main subject of discussion at the Soviet bloc summit meeting that ended here Thursday.

Khrushchev appeared in a gay mood as he went from the meeting in the Kremlin to the reception for Italian Foreign Trade Minister Luigi Preti. He held the spotlight at the social event with a series of quips, anecdotes and serious remarks about foreign and economic policies.

At one point Preti attempted to switch the conversation from politics to the value of human contacts.

"These are not always positive," Khrushchev said. "Sometimes they are frustrated."

"In 1960 I went to Paris. I knew in advance it was useless. I was convinced of it. But in order to convince the others who thought it might be useful and believed in these contacts, I went."

The Paris summit foundered before it began over the issue of the American U2 plane that went down over the Soviet Union.

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
