Rodgers Shows Giants Talents They Overlooked

Andre Rodgers, who exchanged his cricket paddle for a baseball bat, was traded for a manager and repudiated before he got to play a game with his new mates. He may have saved his latest job with a sudden display of power. The young shortstop stroked a bases-loaded single in a three-run fourth inning uprising against National League leading San Francisco, then tagged a homer in the sixth for the deciding run as the Cubs whipped his former teammates 4-3 Thursday.

Rodgers, 27, Bahamas-born cricket player, originally came up with the Giants, failed to make it as their shortstop and wound up in the trade that brought Al Dark from Milwaukee to become San Francisco manager. He didn't play a game for the Braves before he was shipped to Chicago.

Played For Grammas
Hitting only .263, Rodgers might have been on the bench if Alex Grammas, acquired in a trade two days ago, had reported to the Cubs. At game time Grammas still was missing. Rodgers played, and won it.

Second-place Los Angeles lost an opportunity to take over first place when Dick Stuart hit a three-run homer in the last of the ninth and gave Pittsburgh a 3-2 victory over the Dodgers. That kept the Dodgers a half-game back of the Giants.

Elsewhere, St. Louis won its third straight after snapping an

eight-game losing streak by belting Cincinnati 8-2 and Houston came from behind to edge Milwaukee and Warren Spahn 3-2. The New York Mets and Philadelphia were not scheduled.

American League
In the American League, Bill Stafford pitched a two-hitter as the first-place New York Yankees blanked Cleveland 4-0 and dropped the Indians to third. Minnesota moved into second with a 5-2 conquest of Kansas City. Boston nipped Detroit 5-4, and Chicago White Sox thumped Los Angeles' Angels 8-4 and Baltimore walloped Washington 12-5.

Rodgers' heroics tagged left-hander Billy Pierce with his first National League defeat after eight victories. Don Cardwell (2-6), who scattered six hits, went the route for the victory.

The Dodgers gave Johnny Podres a 2-0 lead on Willie Davis' homer with one on in the third and the southpaw had a four-hit shutout until the ninth when Dick Groat and Roberto Clemente hit consecutive singles leading off the inning. That chased Podres and brought on Larry Sherry, whose second pitch was hit by Stuart for the game-winning, Elroy Face (4-1) picked up the triumph in relief.

Stingy Pitcher
Backed by an 18-hit Cardinal attack, Ernie Broglio (2-2) held the Reds to seven hits.

Julian Javier and Julio Gotay each had three hits off Jim

O'Toole (4-6) and his successors. The Braves moved ahead 2-1 in the fifth on Ed Mathews' run-producing single. But singles by Jim Peardon, Norm Larker, Merritt Ranew and Billy Goodman gave the Colts two in the last of the ninth and left Spahn (6-6) with the loss. Former Brave Don McMahon (2-1) won it in relief.

Coach Don Severson, taking over head coaching duties in the absence of Harper, will choose between Lyle Charon, Jon Burnham and Dick Williams for tonight's pitching chores. Saturday night Jerry Boucock and Tom Hobbs will be on the hill against Springfield.

Hitters Limited
Hobbs, the fireballing right-hander, has limited the opposition to six hits in 14 innings, while racking up 22 strikeouts. The four runs scored against Hobbs have all been unearned. Boucock has tossed 2 1/2 innings of perfect ball for his

only performance of the season. The control artist fanned five of the seven batters he faced in his relief role.

Burnham and Williams will be seeing their first action, while Charon tossed 2 2/3 innings before being relieved by Boucock.

Hobbs leads the moundsmen with a 2-0 record, and Boucock has a 1-0 mark.

Leading the squad in hitting is Phil Thormin and Dennis Arana, both with .428 batting averages. Thormin and Arana each have three hits for seven at-bats, and Arana's four RBIs are tops in that department.

Beamer To Catch
Starting at catcher for Roseburg will be Jim Beamer (.375), who provided the local nine with the winning blow in Wednesday's thrilling 3-2 win over Grater.

Set for infield action are Arana at first, Gordon Avery (.142) at second, Bob Manning (.142) at third and Marv French (.000) at shortstop.

Tentative outfield starters find Glen Fortune (.286) in left field,

Thormin in center and Doug Coplin (.333) in right. Lockwood reserves include Doug Philow and Jim Wasson ready with Lance Casabeer out of action with a hand injury.

Myrtle Point fields a strong club composed mainly of players that competed for the Bobcats in prep action. The Myrtle Point High School team finished second in league play behind Bandon. Bandon reached the state A-2 semifinals before losing 1-0 to North Catholic.

Coburg Chucker

Wayne Swango, ace chucker for Coburg's state B co-champions, is slated to throw one game Saturday for Springfield. Swango is a fast dealing right-hander who led his high school team to the state B title two years in a row. During prep competition Swango was credited with several no-hitters and one perfect game.

Chiefs Muff Chance To Push Northwest Lead Up One Notch

The league-leading Wenatchee Chiefs, possibly bothered by piggy-back antics in the outfield, muffed a chance to increase their Northwest League margin Thursday night when they dropped a 7-4 decision to the Tri-City Braves.

In other league action, Yakima clobbered second-place Salem 12-0 and Lewiston edged Eugene 4-3 in a 12-inning encounter.

The piggy-backers came from Wenatchee Valley Junior College and they made 60 trips across the field via the fences during the nine-inning game.

The added attraction didn't bother the Braves—they pushed across four runs in the eighth, two of them on pitcher Lee Featherstone's double to win the game.

Bob Rudd and Gary Johnson blasted solo homers for the winners and Ken Fruchter homered for Wenatchee.

Six of Yakima's 14 hits went for extra bases as Roger Roy earned his second straight shutout with a four-hitter. Roy walked none and struck out seven and retired the first 14 men he faced. Kerry Buckner drove in two Yakima runs with a homer. Leon Douglas and Rico Carly, who had doubles, drove in four and three runs respectively.

A dropped fly ball gave Lewiston the victory in its extra-inning

game with Eugene. With two out in the 12th, Wayne Norton doubled to center and Luis Rodriguez lofted the fly that slipped through the hands of Joe McLaughlin.

Eugene had come from behind on Jose Calero's two-run double in the eighth to knot the count and scored one tally in the ninth to tie the score again. The Emeralds committed three errors and only one of Lewiston's runs was earned.

Dark Horse Enters Rich Belmont Race

NEW YORK (AP)—The inevitable surprise horse popped up in the entry box today when the virtually unknown Folk Dancer was entered along with seven other 3-year-olds for the \$125,000 added Belmont stakes Saturday.

The big four of Brandywine stable's Greek Money, El Peco Rancher's Decidedly, George D. Widener's Jaipur and Peter W. Salmen Sr.'s Crimson Satan dominated the entries and monopolized the first four post positions in the draw.

The other three are Frank E. Power's Vimy Ridge, Fred W. Hooper's Admiral's Voyage and Louis Wolfson's David K.

Folk Dancer is owned by a New York banker, Maurice Newton, and the entry was telephoned to the secretary's office at the last minute by trainer Tom Waller.

If all eight pay the \$1,000 starting fee to go to postward, the record purse will gross \$135,000. The winner would collect \$109,550 compared with the former high of \$104,900 by the 65-1 shot Sherlock last June.
